THE GOOD SOLDIER

of Jesus Christ

(II Timothy 2:3, 4; Ephesians 6:10-13)

THE APOSTLE PAUL knew soldier life. No doubt in Tarsus, where he was born and raised, a Roman garrison was located, giving him a first-hand opportunity to see much of the activities of Roman soldiers as they maintained their army maneuvers from day to day. Certainly Paul was able to draw on such knowledge for his references in II Timothy and Ephesians. It is in similar fashion that I draw on my experiences as an oversea's soldier during World War I (1917-1919). I served under the "Old Regular Army" regulations, or "Articles of War." So, keep that in mind as we make this parallel between a good soldier of "Uncle Sam" and a "good soldier of Jesus Christ," from the time of enlistment onward. Take note of the following:

1. TO BE A "GOOD SOLDIER" ONE MUST ENLIST AS A VOL-UNTEER.

I enlisted about five months before a "conscript" law was passed by Congress and under the spell of a "wave of patriotism" sweeping America at the time. I presented myself to a recruiting officer. I was subjected to a rigid physical and mental examination before being accepted.

So it is that to be a soldier of Christ one must present himself to Jesus Christ on his own free-will. There are no "conscripts" or "draftees" in the Lord's army—only volunteers. As one goes through the experience of regeneration, the Holy Spirit knows what takes place in the heart and mind. If the candidate for salvation has met the Lord's requirements, then of course, he is accepted. The terms, of course, are those of the "King of kings"; not of any mortal or earthly organization of mortals.



II. TO BE A "GOOD SOLDIER" ONE MUST DON A UNIFORM.

As soon as a recruit is moved into camp, he is told to send his civilian "things" home; that he will be supplied with army clothes and all the other personal needs (even razors, etc.). Why? Because he is "no longer his own"; he has become "Uncle Sam's" man.

Likewise the good soldier of Christ must don the uniform of Christ. Paul, an authorized recruiter, says, "Put ye on the Lord Jesus Christ," (Romans 13:14); "I bear in my body the marks (uniform) of the Lord Jesus" (Galatians 6:17).

Therefore, the soldier of Christ is supplied with something that "marks" him as God's man, not a material suit of clothes as such, but of an obvious and unmistakable distinguishing nature.

When the world sees a man in a uniform, they know to whom he belongs.

III. TO BE A "GOOD SOLDIER" ONE MUST SUBMIT TO TRAINING.

Life for a U.S. A. army man begins in a training camp where he is sent after his enlistment. There the schedule




A WAR IS GOING ON-GET INVOLVED!

Signs of Alcoholism

DR. ROBERT SELIGER was one of the leading authorities on alcoholism. Before his death, he prepared this group of questions to help individuals to know whether they are alcoholics.

A person for his own sake should honestly answer these questions.

- 1. Do you need a drink at a definite time every day?
- 2. Do you prefer drinking alone?
- 3. Do you find yourself getting drunk every time you drink?
- 4. When you drink do you have loss of memory or blackouts?
- 5. Do you have the shakes after drinking?
- 6. Do you get the inner shakes unless you continue drinking?
- 7. Do you sneak your drinks?
- 8. Do you have week-end drunks?
- 9. Do you have mid-week drunks?
- 10. Do you crave a drink in the morning?
- 11. Do you hide your drink or protect the supply?
- 12. Do you desire food while drinking?
- 13. Do you lose time from work while drinking?
- 14. Has your initiative, ambition, or perseverance decreased?
- 15. Has drinking made you careless of your family's welfare?
- 16. Do you turn to an inferior environment while drinking?
- 17. Do you show marked moodiness as a result of drinking?
- 18. Is it jeopardizing your job, business, or career?
- 19. Has it made you irritable or belligerent?
- 20. Have you ever admitted to yourself or another that you were unable to control your drinking?
- 21. Has your drinking made you sensitive?
- 22. Do you become argumentative when drinking?
- 23. Is it endangering your health?
- 24. Is it making your home life unhappy?
- 25. When drinking do you wake up early in the morning?
- 26. While drinking are you restless in your sleep?
- 27. Do you drink to relieve feelings of inadequacy?

- 28. Has drinking made you harder to get along with?
- 29. Have you ever felt a religious need?
- 30. While drinking have you become extravagant in be-
- 31. Has your drinking pattern changed?
- 32. Do you ever have a remorse feeling while drinking?
- 33. Do you have any antisocial behavior?
- 34. Do you become jealous of your husband or wife?
- 35. Is it affecting your peace of mind?
- 36. Have you lost any friends as a result of drinking?
- 37. Have you lost any job as a result of drinking?
- 38. Do you continually seek occasions for drinking?
- 39. Has your life become alcohol centered?

NOTE: Any six "yes" answers DEFINITELY INDICATE ALCOHOLISM!

Face the facts squarely.

Admit what the facts tell you.

Seek help.

Beware of excuses for drinking.

Do not rationalize your drinking behavior.

It is not the amount one drinks when he drinks, or how frequently he drinks, which determines whether one is an alcoholic or not, but what happens when he drinks.

Dr. E. M. Jellinek, the No. 1 authority on alcoholism gives the general pattern of alcoholism:

Early Symptoms (Incipient alcoholism averages 10 years in duration):

Breaking promises

Lying about drinking

Gulping drinks

Drinking before a party

Drinking at regular times

Rationalization

Irregular eating

Blackouts

Middle Symptoms (Mostly a continuation of early symptoms, lasting 2 to 5 years):

is fixed. Up at 5:30 a.m. at the sound of "first-call," he routinely dresses and by the time he hears "second-call" he hastens to line up in "company-front" formation along the company-street where, facing an officier, he is "called to attention" and answers to a roll-call, which is followed by "setting-up exercise" (to you, calisthenics), in turn, followed by breakfast. After "policing" the grounds (picking up all bits of paper and other trash), the company is marched to the drill grounds where the rest of the day is spent in drill, drill, drill, and more drill. In other words a recruit learns to do many things thought to be impossible before becoming a soldier. He learns to wash his mess-kit; work in the kitchen; do his own washing and sewing; shine his shoes unto a mirror surface; and many other "detail" jobs, to use the military term.

The schedule of the Christian soldier is also fixed. In I Corinthians 6:20 Paul says, "Ye are not your own, ye are bought with a price." That price is the blood of Christ. Ephesians 5:15 reads, "See that ye walk circumspectively (routinely)...redeeming the times..."In his loyalty to Christ the life of a Christian is routine. After joining Christ, he learns to do many things he never thought he could do before becoming a Christian, such as praying, studying the Bible, regularly attending public worship; giving his tithe; testifying; giving up questionable worldly pleasures; overcoming bad habits; letting his speech be with grace (Colossians 4:6); etc., etc.

IV. THE ULTIMATE OF BEING A"GOOD SOLDIER" IS TO SEE ACTION.

In World War I this meant being in the "front-line trenches" in France. At some points of that line the American and German trenches were very close to each other, exposing the trenches to the use of trench-mortors; even hand-grenades in some cases. In rainy weather, or snow, you can imagine the extent of the hardships and suffering soldiers endured, to say nothing of what enemy shells could do to trenches when a "hit" was made. II Timothy 2:3 says to "endure hardness as a soldier of Christ." A strange psychology is experienced when a soldier faces enemy fire. A single soldier on his way to "the front" wonders if he will be able to engage heroically in death combat, or suddenly become a coward, seeking safety to the rear as quickly as he can get there. In the case of the vast majority, however, in the midst of the din, the roar, the pandemonium of explosions of many kind, the intense excitement, seemingly, all fear vanishes; they do the very thing they have been trained to do: Fight.

So it is with the "good soldier of Jesus Christ." After becoming a Christian, and after having become versed in the Scriptures, supplied with the gospel armor (Ephesians 6:10-13), he wonders whether he will be able to put it on, and engage in actual confrontation with Satan's host of unbelievers and do what Paul said, "fight the good fight of faith" (I Timothy 6:12), or whether he will become fearful and fail to give his testimony by maintaining his silence. However, it is the Holy Spirit who can make the difference in the soldier of the Cross, once he lets himself become "involved." To meet the challenge he (or she) becomes stout-hearted and some attempt is made to teach and warn the unbelieving souls around him of their true condition. To do that is not simple. Don't

let anybody tell you it is. The brethren of the first couple of centuries of Christianity had the kind of experience American soldiers did on the "front line in France in 1918. They demonstrated courage they previously didn't know they possessed.

IN CONCLUSION to these provocations, no better summary could be furnished than II Timothy 1:8b and 9: "Be thou partaker of the afflictions of the gospel according to the power of God; Who hath saved us, and called us with an holy calling, not according to our works, but according to his own purpose and grace, which was given us in Christ Jesus before the world began."

THE YEAR was 1843. Expectant faces eagerly scanned the eastern sky. Waiting. Watching. For the Lord's return. Hours passed. Anticipation turned to anxiety. "Where IS He?" Shadows deepened. And as night fell, so did their hopes. For Christ had not returned to earth as William Miller, leader of Seventh-Day Adventism had predicted. Puzzled, Miller refigured his data, based on the prophecies of Daniel, and discovered his chronology somewhat off. A follower, Samuel Snow, then changed the date of the autumn of the next year. And when the Lord did not appear on October 22, 1844, yet another adherent of Miller, Hiram Edson of New York, claimed that in a vision it was revealed to him that the time had been right but the place was wrong! Rather than coming to earth, he explained, Christ actually entered a second compartment of Heaven and was there busily engaged in a cleansing process. A similar explanation would also be taken up by the Jehovah's Witnesses in 1914 when the Lord likewise "failed" to comply with their projec-

Jesus said, "But of that day and hour knoweth no man, no, not the angels of heaven, but my Father only" (Matthew 24:36). Despite this truthful revelation, men continue to claim to know what angels don't! Several years ago, a group of Americans went prepared with billowing ascension robes to the Mount of Olives, there to await the Lord's advent. Following their "disappointment," they turned their venture into a business enterprise and built the American Colony Hotel in Jerusalem! And so, ever since Jesus' day, men have been foolishly setting dates for the Second Coming. It would seem that nineteen centuries of mistakes certainly constitute no argument for the truth of a theory, yet every now and then we read or hear of someone setting still another date.

Jesus IS coming again, make no mistake about it! Every writer in the New Testament heralds this: Matthew (25:31), Mark (8:38), Luke (21:27), John (14:3), Paul (I Thessalonians 4:16), James (5:8), Peter (I Peter 5:4), and Jude (14,15). It is said that one verse in every twenty-five in the New Testament mentions or alludes to the coming of Christ. Over 300 times this fact is mentioned in the Bible. But as to the EXACT day and hour we know not. According to Mark 13:32, even Jesus didn't know. It is not for us to know the times and seasons which the Father has set within His own authority (Acts 1:7). One reason why the Second Coming is purposely

concealed may be to prevent ungodliness followed by last-minute "repentance." However, we CAN know that He is coming after several things are accomplished. The Bible states that before Christ comes:

- 1. False "Christs" and prophets would arise. Mark 13:21, 22.
- 2. A ''falling away'' would occur. II Thessalonians 2:1-3.
- 3. The "days of Noah" would be duplicated. Matthew 24:37-39.
 - 4. Scoffers would come. II Peter 3:3-5.
- 5. The Gospel would be preached to all nations. Matthew 24:14; Colossians 1:23.

With the fulfillment of all of these it would seem that the only thing barring the coming of Christ is the fact that God is "not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repantance."

We can understand also HOW He is coming. Christ likened His coming to 'lightning' (Luke 17:24). He will come quickly (Revelation 22:20); visibly (Revelation 1:5); in the clouds (Acts 1:9-11); with the angels (Matthew 25:31; II Thessalonians 1:7); and as a thief in the night (I Thessalonians 5:2). Some have said that He will come "spiritually" or "in the hearts of men"; in the same manner as he arose "spiritually" from the grave. Both of these ideas are foreign to the Scriptures. Every eye shall see Him!

Perhaps more important, WHY will Christ come? The Bible is clear as crystal here. The first time He came it was to save (John 3:17). The second time (Hebrews 9:28) it will be to judge the dead (John 5:28, 29; I Cor. 15:51,52; I Thessalonians 4:16).

By the way, I have searched in vain for the so-called "RAPTURE." Strong's Exhaustive Concordance, listing every word in the Bible, does not contain it. In fact, the most prominent place I have seen it is on bumper stickers-"Warning! In case of RAPTURE this car will be unmanned." Amusing but unorthodox. Paul points out the danger of confusing divine truths with human terminology, "words which man's wisdom teaches" (I Cor. 2:13). The "rapture" ruptures under apostolic teaching! We could call Hell "the big burn" but we don't. Why call "meeting the Lord in the air" anything but that? Some fundamentalists are missing the fundamentals and stressing the incidentals. Perhaps they may be termed more correctly "Incidentalists." They would certainly be true to the Armstrongs' "wonderful world tomorrow" plan which explodes under apostolic teaching (II Peter 3:10) as will the world. The same could be said of those who try to change a Christ who deplored physical violence in any form into a cruel military leader storming the gates of Jerusalem, restoring the kingdom to Israel, and sitting on an earthly throne.

Additionally, the Lord is coming to separate the sheep from the goats (Matthew 25:31-46). He is coming to render vengeance on them that don't know God and haven't obeyed the Gospel (II Thessalonians 1:7-9). He is coming to reward the victors (Romans 8:18). He is coming to deliver up the kingdom to God (I Corinthians 15:23, 24) and present His church to Himself (Ephesians 5:25-27). If you are not a part of His church then read what you must do to be added to it in Acts 2:37-47.

Paul told us, "For we wrestle (fight) not against flesh and blood, but against principalities (kingdoms), against powers, against the rulers of darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness (wicked spirits) in high places" (Ephesians 6:12). As a soldier of the cross, you are to engage in combat with the forces of darkness. Many so-called Christians don't seem to know there is a war going on. Many are casualties and don't know it! Others are traitors to the enemy.

We are at ease in Zion today. Although there is a war of eternal consequence raging, many, who are supposed to be soldiers, won't fight. They are too involved in self-endulgence and worldly pleasures. They don't act like a war is going on. We are against camal warfare. but let us illustrate from it. During the II World War, to help the cause and hasten victory, this country put into operation an austerity program. There was rationing of many things, people worked longer hours, etc. People were made to realize there was a war going on and they backed the government. But the war in Vietnam didn't work out that way. They tried to fight a war without it being declared. The nation went on as in times of peace—no austerity program. Many did not back the government. There was no clear-cut victory—just sort of a stalemate. And that is just the way it is with many professed Christians and churches today. They are trying to live "normal" lives as if a war were not raging all about them. There is no self-denial. But Christians can't live like "normal" people. There is too much at stake—their own souls, the triumph of truth, eternity! They are soldiers of the cross.

Beloved, if Christians ever needed to be involved, they do today! We must! As children of light, soldiers of the cross, let us turn back the forces of darkness. There is no such creature as an "inactive church member."






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NOTHING BUT THE BLOOD OF JESUS
