It is our desire to trace the Christianity of the first century to its source and drink from its fountainhead of purity.


What was the Christianity of the first century really like?

I. IT WAS UNDENOMINATIONAL IN NATURE.

This is what Christ had in mind.

Judaism had its denominationalism or sectarianism. There were two major denominations, the Pharisees and Sadducees, who were as far-reaching as Catholics and Protestants in their differences (and there was also a lesser religious party known as the Essenes). Modern so-called Christianity is plagued and paralyzed by denominationalism, and its potential for good is greatly neutralized.

This is not Christ's plan! The Great Commission invisioned the one gospel being preached to one world, and all of saved humanity being united in one body in Christ. Had not Jesus said in John 10:16b, "... and there shall be one fold, and one shepherd"? Ephesians 2:16 tells us that we have been reconciled "unto God in one body by the cross." (There is only one body, Ephesians 4:4). All of this is in keeping with Christ's prayer in John 17:20-22. God's over-all plan simply stated is: "That in the dispensation of the fulness of time he might gather together in



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one all things in Christ, both which are in heaven, and are on earth; even in him" (Ephesians 1:10).

The execution of the Great Commission showed the universal. undenominational nature of Christianity.

The resurrected and glorified Lord had given this farreaching commission: "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world" (Matthew 28:19,20). The good news of salvation was to be carried to "all nations" (Greek ethnos from which comes our Eng-



THE GREATEST STUDY YOU WILL EVER MAKE

THE PERSON who has spent little time studying the gospel accounts of the life of the Lord Jesus Christ (Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John) is in for a delightful treat when he sets his sights in this direction. The vigor with which these accounts is presented ("Behold," "straightway," "forthwith," etc.) is matched only by the interest that is generated. Even as the writers continually state, you will be "amazed" (existamai, literally be standing out of yourself) by the wonderful things you will be reading about the Son of God. The presentation of the material is very much like a fountain gushing up and sending its refreshing spray in all directions at once. It is much like someone excitedly telling a story with spontaneous emphasis upon outstanding events rather than having intention of always putting them in exact sequence. We must keep this in mind when studying the gospel accounts. Over-all chronological sequence is there, but sometimes the approach is more of a topical nature (or a blend of both).

Matthew, written for a Jewish reading audience, traces the genealogy of Jesus from Abraham (and the genealogy, for legal purposes, seems to be that of Joseph's side, although in reality he was not the actual father of Jesus. Mark omits genealogy, and we are introduced to Jesus by John the Baptist in the wilderness with the baptism of Jesus. We are at once ushered into a position to view the active ministry of Jesus (which rapidly ensues). Luke traces the genealogy of all the way back to Adam (no doubt, this genealogy being that of Mary, the fleshly line of the Saviour of men). In profound inspired reflection, John begins his account with Jesus being the Word with God (and God) from etemity.

The first three "gospels" (Matthew, Mark, and Luke) are fittingly called the SYNOPTIC ("seen together") GOSPELS (and gospel means "good news"). They approach the life of Christ in much the same way. Then John, written late in the first century, fills in some gaps of information not found in the others. A Bible principle is that in the mouth of two or three witnesses every word is to be established. In the four gospels we have this plus one. We get a three-dimensional view of the life of Christ, then from mount Scopus (John) we get another impressive perspective of the mighty Son of God.

It is as John testified that these things were "written, that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing ye might have life through his name" (John 20:30, 31). And we assure you that with an intensified study of the life of Christ you will never be the same again.

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lish word ethnic). All of the peoples of the world (Mark 16:15, 16), all the far-flung ethnic groups of mankind, were to be the glad recipients of the gospel.

And the book of Acts shows this unfolding in a mighty way. They were to begin in Jerusalem, sounding out to Judaea and Samaria, and finally "unto the uttermost part of the world" (Acts 1:8). When Peter told the Jews on the day of Pentecost to repent and be baptized for the remission of sins, he appendaged his statement by saying, "For the promise is unto you, and to your children, and to all that are afar off, even as many as the Lord our God shall call' (Acts 2:38, 39). Then Acts 3:25, 26 has Peter quoting Genesis 12 (where it speaks of Abraham's descendants): "And in thy seed (Christ) shall all kindred of the earth be blessed." Although the Jewish Christians had to be supernaturally shaken from their parochial moors (Acts 10 & 11), they soon moved on out to the larger Gentile world with the gospel. Earlier when the church was persecuted, "they that were scattered abroad went every where preaching the word" (Acts 8:4). Later when Paul and Silas came preaching in Macedonian Greece (Thessalonica), it was said. "These that have turned the world upside down are come hither also" (Acts 17:6). Even later in reference to the spread of the gospel, Paul would write, "Yes, verily, their sound went into all the earth, and their words unto the ends of the world" (Romans 10:18).

The gospel of Jesus Christ was undenominational and designed for all men. It was not to be cramped by a narrow sectarian outlook. The great success of the first century Christianity is reflected in this hymn that we sing:

"Like a mighty army

Moves the church of God; Brothers, we are treading Where the saints have trod; We are not divided, All one body we; One in hope and doctrine, One in charity..."

Churches of the New Testament were undenominational.

The churches of the early New Testament era were decidely undenominational. (And the word "DENOMINATION" means that which has been divided off, separated, and named, i.e., DE + NOMINATE). Let us hurriedly skim through the New Testament books, especially the epistles of Paul (for illustrative purposes), and you will see what we mean. Paul, in writing to the Roman Christians, said, "The churches of Christ salute (greet) you" (Romans 16:16). "Unto the church of God which is at Corinth" reads I Corinthians 1:2. Galatians 1:2 says, "Unto the churches of Galatia." And note that I Thessalonians 1:1 and II The ssalonians 1:1 say, "Unto the church of the Thessalonians." Take notice that church is spelled with a little "c," and these expressions are not used as wooden, artifical denominational labels, separating one group from the other. Human names and even Scriptural designations were not used by Paul as denominational banners behind which sectarian groups could rally their narrow cause. They were simply thankful to be humble Christians. They dare not divert the church from the purity and universality of its purpose and outreach.

II. IT WAS CHRIST-CENTERED IN CONTENT.

If anything stands out about the Christianity of the first century, it is that it was Christ-centered in content.

This was true in the preaching

The Great Commission had said, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the GOSPEL to every creature" (Mark 16:15). In a "nutshell" I Corinthians 15:1-4 tells us what the gospel ("good news") is, and it is Jesus Christ. Listen. "Moreover, brethren, I declare unto you the gospel which I preached unto you...For I delivered unto you first of all that which I also received, how that Christ died for our sins according to the scriptures; And that he was buried, and that he arose again the third day according to the scriptures." Because of this we have no problem in understanding why Paul said what he did in I Corinthians 2:2. "For I determined not to know any thing among you, save Jesus Christ, and him crucified." Christ is the good news of salvation from sin for all. "For he hath made him to be sin for us, who knew no sin; that we might be made the righteousness of God in him' (II Corinthians 5:21). And because he lives we too shall live beyond the grave (I Corinthians 15:20, 54-58).

They believed and obeyed the gospel in becoming a Christian, in embracing Christianity.

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Paul said in Romans 1:16, "For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to everyone that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek (Gentile)." Men personally believed in the death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus in their hearts (Romans 10:9,10), but that is not all. Paul declared earlier in Romans, "But God be thanked, that ye were the servants of sin, but ye have obeyed from the heart that form of doctrine which was delivered you" (6:17). Technically speaking, this is called "obeying the gospel" in Romans 10:16; II Thessalonians 1:8; I Peter 4:17 (and elsewhere, "obedience to the faith" - Acts 6:7; Romans 1:5; 16:26). One believes in the death, burial, and resurrection of Christ; then he obeys it. How? He dies to sin in repentance, he is buried with Christ in the waters of baptism as the old man of sin is put away, then he is raised with Christ to "walk in newness of life" (READ Romans 6:1-6). That is why when Philip preached Jesus unto the Ethiopian (Acts 8:35-39) that he responded by saying, "See, here is water, what doth hinder me to be baptized?" In preaching Jesus you preach about his death, burial, and resurrection and then how the sinner must obey his death, burial, and resurrection (as well as believe). The Ethiopian ended up being baptized and going on his way rejoicing.

Their obedience was Christ-centered in living the Christian life.

Coming up from the waters of baptism (Colossians 2:12), Paul admonished the Colossians, "If ye then be risen with Christ, seek those things which are above, where Christ sitteth on the right hand of God. Set your affections on things above, not on things on the earth. For ye are dead and your life is hid with Christ, who is our life...Mortify therefore your members which are upon the earth; fornication, uncleanness, inordinate affection, evil concupisence, and covetousness..." (Colossians 3:1-4). It was even as Paul himself personally testified, 'I am crucified with Christ nevertheless I live; yet not I, but Christ liveth in me: and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by the faith of the Son of God, who loved me, and gave himself for me" (Galatians 2:20). Therefore, Paul instructed the Corinthians, "Be ye followers of me, even as I also am of Christ' (I Corinthians 11:1). In I John 2:6 John in essence said the same thing, "He that saith he abideth in him ought himself also to walk, even as he walked." So their lives were centered and engulfed in the very life of Christ (and may ours likewise be).

The very existence of the church itself was visualized as the continuing body of Christ upon the earth as they were in spiritual union with him and embodied his teachings. Ephesians 1:22b and 23 tell us that Christ is "head over all things to the church, Which is his body, the fulness of him that filleth all in all."

What tremendous thoughts! What a great life to live! Such was the Christianity of the first century.

III. IT WAS FAR-REACHING IN ITS IMPACT.

The Christianity of the first century was revolutionary, but by its very nature it was so radical that it could change lives and society without producing a revolution (as we think of the word today). And it did!


A New Man

The teachings of the Lord Jesus, like found in the sermon on the mount, can only be put into practice by a new man (and that by God's grace). The unconverted world will say that Christianity is not practical. And it is not to them, for did not Jesus say, "Except a man be born again, he cannot SEE the kingdom of God" (John 3:3)? If a person truly surrenders his life to Christ he knows that what Paul said is true, "Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new." A radical change of life style was evident among the first century Christians, when Paul said, "Be not deceived: neither formicators, nor idolaters, nor adulterers, nor effeminate, nor abusers of themselves with mankind, nor thieves, nor covetous, nor drunkards, nor revilers, nor extortioners, shall inherit the kingdom of God. AND SUCH WERE SOME OF YOU: but ye are washed, but ye are sanctified, but ye are justified in the name of the Lord Jesus, and by the Spirit of our God' ([Corinthians 6:9b-11).

What an impact Christianity bore to change such men (and it can do the same thing today)!

Genuine Love

In the Roman Empire love was not one of the things that stood out (to say the least). The most popular national amusement involved the gladiators. In their society a very large segment were slaves. Human life was cheap. Then



when they did speak of love, they knew not whereof they spoke. It was more like the eros kind (even as today). Then Jesus made his appearance in the course of human history. He told his disciples, "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends" (John 15:13). He gave his life for a sin-sick and dying world (John 3:16), as well as teaching about true love. He also said, "A new commandment I give unto you, That ye love one another, as I have loved you, that ye also love one another. By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another" (John 13:34,35).

This is the fire that the Lord lit and not man (how unlike the natural man). Peter told about it when he said, "Seeing ye have purified your souls in obeying the truth through the Spirit unto unfeigned love of the brethren, see that ye love one another with a pure heart fervently; Being born again, not of corruptible seed, but of incorruptible, by the word of God, which liveth and abideth for ever" (I Peter 1:22, 23). John said, "We know that we have passed from death unto life, because we love the brethren. He that loveth not his brother abideth in death" (I John 3:14). The chief fruit of the Holy Spirit is love (Galatians 5:22).

There is nothing like genuine, unfeigned, unselfish love. When you see it, you know that you have seen the real thing. This kind of love rolled back the brutality of paganism, and man being no more than an animal, to the dignity and beauty that comes from God alone.

Purity

The Roman Empire was a world polluted and corrupted to the core. Men had forgotten how to blush. To the Christians who resided in Corinth, a city noted for its carnality, Paul admonished, "Wherefore come out from among them, and be ye separate, saith the Lord, and touch not the unclean thing; and I will receive you, And will be a Father unto you, and ye shall be my sons and daughters, saith the Lord Almighty" (II Corinthians 6:17,18). Peter likewise admonishes the follower of Christ "That he no longer should live the rest of his time in the flesh to the lusts of men, but to the will of God. For the time past of our life may suffice us to have wrought the will of the Gentiles. when we walked in lasciviousness, lusts, excess of wine. revellings, banquetings, and abominable idolatries: Wherein they think it strange that ye run not with them to the same excess of riot, speaking evil of you" (I Peter 4:2-4). For a person to practice holiness would be a marked difference from the world. In a world that's rotten and putrid morally speaking they were (and we are) the salt of the earth.

Relationships

Christianity has much to do with relationships. Jesus taught, "Therefore all things whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them..." (Matthew 7:12). As we know, this is commonly called the "golden rule." Ephesians 5:21 reads, "Submitting yourselves one to another in the fear of God." The writer Paul continues here to show the different human relationships (husband/wife; children/parents; servants/master) where we are to submit one to another (it's not just a one way street). Paul also in Colossians 3:23 says, "And whatsoever ye do, do

it heartily, as to the Lord, and not unto men." Now...that is all-inclusive; that is far-reaching. If all these principles just noticed were put into practice, think of the implications. What respect! What dignity! Talk about a revolution of improvement in human relations in every realm and walk of life! The world could see that we meant business in our religion, and perhaps we could re-enact the Christianity of the first century (the real thing)

Other Worldly

One thing about the early Christians, "They confessed that they were strangers and pilgrims on the earth" (even as the patriarchs of old). "But now they desire a better country, that is, an heavenly: wherefore God is not ashamed to be called their God: for he hath prepared for them a city" (Hebrews 11:16). It is even as Paul said, "If ye then be risen with Christ, seek those things which are above, where Christ sitteth on the right hand of God. Set your affection on things above, not on things on the earth" (Colossians 3:1,2). John had the same thing in mind when he said. "Love not the world..." (I John 2:15-17). The Thessalonians were looking forward to the second coming of Christ (I Thessalonians 1:10). Everything about this earth has the taint of sin and death upon it. Corruption is on every hand. There are too many heartaches and shortcomings. But in the "world" to come this will be no more. "And God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes; and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there be any more pain: for the former things are passed away" (Revelation 21:4). This blessed assurance made them endure the most severe persecutions and hardships. Things would get better. They knew that they were "more than conquerors" through the Lord Jesus Christ. Amen!

Explicit Trust

The Christianity of the first century was more than abstract thought and empty formality. The impact of its reality can be seen in the explicit trust produced in the lives of its adherents. They firmly believed that they fitted into the plan of the God of eternity. Paul said, "Andweknowthat all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose" (Romans 8:28). More than once this apostle said that he would do thus and so "if the Lord will" (I Corinthians 4:19; etc.). May we, too, have more explicit trust into taking God into consideration in all that we say and do (James 4:13-16).

CONCLUSION: This consideration of the Christianity of the first century has been brief and somewhat incomplete. However, some very important Scriptures and an outline of thought has been called to your attention. Review this. It is our desire to drink from the fountainhead of Christianity in all its purity and be one with the early church. Too many times today it is not a matter of Christianity being tried and found wanting, but still wanting to be tried. Let's try it! It's from God, and it's real!

After viewing the unusual sight of a gigantic size bun with a midget hamburger on it, the person next to the one ordering blurts out, "Where's the beef?"

On the surface, this may sound and be funny, but when we stop and think about the example behind this commercial, it reminds us of a lot of so-called "churches." No doubt we all know of some congregation, that on the outside looks huge, gigantic, enormous. But once we get inside that congregation, though there may be 200, 400, 500 people attending, after listening to the sermons and the lessons, we turn to our wife or husband and ask the question: "Where's the beef?"

The trouble with a lot of congregations is that THERE IS NO BEEF! There may be a great number of people attending, but no meat in the semmons! Usually this is the way they pack people in. If you don't use (BEEF) in sermons, the people won't get their toes stepped on, thus they won't get mad, thus they will be content to stay where they are.

Preacher, when you are finished with your messages, do the elders ask: "Where's the beef?" Do the deacons ask, "Where's the beef?" THE AMERICAN WAY OF BEATH





TO SOME PEOPLE this title may seem to be a contradiction of terms. Doesn't God want people to be "religious"? If one is "religious," is he not right with God and safe from God's judgment? In answer, we must say that, although the Christian will want to practice "pure and undefiled religion" (James 1:27), religion in itself is insufficient to save anyone. In fact, undoubtedly most "religious" people will be eternally lost in hell. This is a frank statement but altogether true, however shocking it may seem.

The Bible records the account of numerous "religious" people who were in a state of separation from God. The Pharisees were surely religious, but apparently most were bound for Gehenna fire (Matthew 23:15,33). Cornelius was a devout man who feared God, gave charity to the poor, prayed to God continually, and had a good reputation (Acts 10:1-4, 22), but he was lost in sin (Acts 11:14; 10:43). The Ethiopian traveled hundreds of miles to worship in Jerusalem, yet he was lost (Acts 8:27-39).

Saul of Tarsus was zealous and righteous, sincerely seeking to observe the regulations of the law (Philippians 3:4-6; Galatians 1:14), but he also was lost (I Timothy 1:12-16). The people of Athens were "very religious in all respects" but they too were lost in their sins (Acts 17:22-23, 30-32).

Today there are hundreds of millions of "religious" people on the earth. Some pray five times a day, facing Mecca (the Moslems). Others carry out prescribed ceremonies and rites seeking to add favorable karma to their merit (the Hindus). Still others follow the "Four Noble Truths" and the "Eightfold Path" (the Buddhists). Yet with all of these religious acts of devotion, they are "separate from Christ, excluded from the commonwealth of Israel, and strangers to the covenants of promise, having no hope and WITHOUT GOD in the world" (Ephesians 2:12). RELIGIOUS but LOST!

Is the same not true of those who PROFESS to follow Christ but have departed from His true and perfect way? In the first century some preached "another Jesus" and a "different gospel" (II Corinthians 11:4; Galatians 1:6-8). Some taught "strange doctrines," "different doctrines," and "varied and strange teachings" (I Timothy 1:3; 6:3; He brews 13:9). Surely many of these who perverted the truth and went astray from the Way were "religious" in character and in deed, but they did not know Christ and He did not know them (cf. Matthew 7:21-23).

A serious danger confronts the "religious" person. He may actually be deluded and deceived, but he seeks to convince himself that everything is all right. The religious person stimulates himself by going to "high-powered" meetings, perhaps "speaking in an unknown tongue," reading religiously mystical and devotional literature, fasting, or listening to big-name speakers—yet he is still far from the kingdom.

Because of his religious commitment, the person may go to all the "church meetings," go door-to-door "witnessing," spend much time in prayer, take special religious training courses, even enroll in a Bible college or theological seminary—all of which effectively convinces him that he is right and his cause is likewise right. He thus SUBJECTIVE—LY believes himself to be "safe and sure," but OBJECTIVELY he is still lost in sin.

Imagine a monk living in a medieval monastery some eight centuries ago. Day after day he severely disciplines his body. He deprives himself of food or subsists on bread and water. He spends long vigils of prayer in his lonely, cold, bare cell. He has vowed to remain silent, speaking not one word. He owns nothing and is under total subjection to his superiors. Is this not the height of religious devotion?

But THINK AGAIN. The monk has retreated from the world, manifesting a selfish lack of love for others and disobeying Christ's command to take the gospel to others (Mark 16:15). He is devoted to the adoration (worship) of Mary who is thought of as a mediator, a mere human saved from sin (Acts 10:25-26; I Timothy 2:5; Luke 1:47). He prays to 'saints' (often false teachers of a former day). He regularly celebrates the "mass" (a re-sacrifice of Christ) who has been sacrificed in death once-for-all (Hebrews 9:26; 10:10). He pledges allegiance to a so-called "Pope," the epitome of pride and false teaching (cf. Romans 16:17.18; I Timothy 4:1-3). He is fanatically loyal to a false, seim-pagan. apostate religious institution, thereby neglecting the simplicity of the primitive community of Christ. He accepts the idea of a ritualistic sprinkling of "holy water" that supposedly regenerates an infant, rather than an adult response of faith embodied in a water burial of baptism (cf. Romans 6:3-4). He believes in a salvation by meritorious works rather than a salvation by grace through faith based on Christ's finished saving work. RELIGIOUS—but LOST.

Surely we can see that it is entirely possible for one to be religious—VERY religious—and yet be utterly lost. This should give each of us cause to seriously ponder our our own live and experiences. Our religious commitment and religious activities cannot save us! (In some cases they may only increase our guilt before God.

God alone saves and He does so through the mediation of His Son, Jesus Christ. Christ saves by virtue of His sacrificial work at Calvary. Only those who humbly acknowledge their unworthiness and their inability to save themselves can receive the salvation offered by unmerited grace. Only those who turn away from their own religious works of

self-salvation, from the false doctrines, practices and traditions of men, and turn to the true and right way of God can receive the blessing of God. Paul learned quite dramatically that although he THOUGHT he was right with God because of his religious fervor, in fact he was NOT right. He was completely wrong and opposed to the truth of God (cf. Acts 23:1; 26:9).

There will be many who face God in the judgment who THOUGHT they were "offering service to God" in life, but who actually were opposing His will (John 16:2). There will be those who claim to prophesy, exorcise demons, and perform many miracles in Christ's name who will be rejected (Matthew 7:21-23).

Let this be a timely warning to not rely upon our works of religious devotion or our "churchianity." Let us not place our confidence in our subjective feelings, our "spiritual intuition," or "inner voices." There is danger in all of these.

In an entirely different context, but applicable to this present point, we might say of such subjective feelings: "Behold, you rely on the staff of this crushed reed... on which if a man leans, it will go into his hand and pierce it" (Isaiah 36:6). Let us not be destroyed by relying (leaning) on the "staff" of religious devotion. Rather, let us rely on God Himself and place our entire confidence in His objective, authoritative, eternal revelation—His written Word. Beware of being "religious," but lost!—R. Holderman



THE LETTER THAT WAS NEVER ANSWERED (Now over ten years later, and the letter still goes unanswered):

THE SWORD AND STAFF is a religious paper devoted to the restoration of simple, undenominational, New Testament Christianity and does not cater to any denominational position. The Scriptures are simply taken at their face value and expounded as such. In the course of the paper being published, samples are sent out. A sample copy fell into the hands of the Baptist minister whose letter appears first below. The second letter was written by the editor of THE SWORD AND STAFF. The whole discussion hinges around an article that appeared in the sample paper which was received. Simply stated, the article concluded that ACTS 2:38 meant what it said. "IF your BAPTISM is essential for ter Baptism, Revelation 12:11 should Salvation or remission of Sins, then the man who performs the Baptism is just as essential in God's Plan of Salvation as Jesus Christ. Since a person can't baptize themselves, having to depend on another to do it for them or to them, the one performing the rite is coequal with Jesus Christ, meaning that the Bible is not true and Romans 5:9 should have said, Justified by His blood and water Baptism; Ephesians 1:7—Redemption through His blood and water Baptism; Ephesians 2:14 should have said, We are made nigh by the blood of Christ and water Baptism; Colossians 1:14 should have read, Redemption through His blood and water Baptism; Hebrews 9:22 should read, Without shedding of blood and water Baptism is no remission of sins. I Peter 1:19 should have read, With the precious blood of Christ and water Baptism. Revelation 7:14 should have said, And have washed their robes and made white in the blood of the Lamb and wa-

have read. And they overcame him by the blood of the Lamb and water Baptism (HOGWASH!).

"Mr. Gibbons, What you need is to get saved by Grace through faith, and that not of yourself, but the gift of God, Not of Works (baptism, etc.). Do me a favor and take our name off your mailing list. I'll stand on God's Word.'

DEAR MR. MEADOWS:

It will not be necessary for me to remove your name from our mailing list. It was never added. What you received was a sample copy as it was so marked.

In reference to your "letter," in all honesty, sincerity, and humility, I believe your reasoning has jumped the track somewhere. You have rather pointedly expressed your position (and I get the impression, with contempt). If you

will take the time to read this, in all kindness I wish to express my humble understanding. We need a little less heat and a little more light. Trying to defend unscriptural denominational positions usually produces a lot of heat (controversy) but not much light.

I gathered from your writing three things that stand out in your opposition to the idea that baptism is for the remission of sins. (1) If baptism is essential, that involves another person in a man's salvation (you said that would make him equal with Christ). (2) If baptism is essential, that means the various N.T. writers should have said so every time they mentioned the blood (justified by the blood and baptismetc.) (3) You negate Acts 2:38 and say that baptism could not be essential because it is a work. If you will be kind enough to read it, I will now comment on these things.

(1) You implied that baptism could not be for the remission of sins because it would involve someone else in another's salvation (someone to baptize him), thus making him equal to Christ. Now Mr. Meadows, do you really belie ve that? Paul said (and you did say you would stand on God's Word), "It pleased God by the foolishness of preaching to save them that believe" (I Cor. 1:21). Do you get the picture? It ties a lot of knots in your argument. God has ordained to save the world by the "foolishness of preaching." Who does the preaching? MAN, of course. That involves another person in a man's salvation. Paul furth er said, "We have this treasure in earthen vessels, that the excellency of the power may be of God, and not of us" (II Cor. 4:7).

(2) You said Romans 5:9 should have said, 'Justified by His blood and water baptism" (as well as the other references) if baptism is for the remission of sins. Now Mr. Meadows, are you ready for the conclusion of your "logic"? The N.T. mentions many things as savingus (having to do with our salvation), I hereby list a few. We are saved by GRACE (Eph. 2:5), JESUS (Matt. 1:21), BLOOD (Rom. 5:9), THE NAME OF CHRIST (Acts 4:12), GOSPEL (I Cor. 15: 1-4), LOVE OF THE TRUTH (II Thess. 2:10), SAVE YOURSELVES (Acts 2:40), FAITH (Acts 16:31), RE-PENTANCE (Acts 17:30), CONFESSION (Rom. 10:9,10), BAPTISM (I Pet. 3:21), CALLING ON THE NAME OF THE LORD (Rom. 10:13), LIFE OF CHRIST (Rom. 5:10), THE WORD (Jas. 1:21), WORKS (Jas. 2:14,17,20,24,26), DOC-

TRINE (I Tim. 4:16), HOPE (Rom. 8:24), and ENDURING TO THE END (Matt. 24:13). Just because we don't find every one of these things mentioned in a single verse does not mean the ones omitted are excluded from being essential to salvation. All Scripture must be taken if we are really going to stand on God's Word, and the Bible must be understood in the light of itself. Your kind of argument would contend that if faith were essential, Rom. 5:9 would have to read, "Justified by His blood and faith." We are not ready for such an illogical conclusion, are we?

We are saved by the grace of God (unmerited favor), but I believe we must accept Christ before we can we saved, don't you? Otherwise, it would be a matter of universalism (everyone would be saved as they are) or predestination. I believe that man is a responsible, free-moral agent before God, don't you? I don't believe that man is a machine or robot.

Having truly trusted and genuinely repented of our sins, we must be baptized for the remission of sins—to get our sins washed away (Acts 2:38; 22: 16). Romans 6 teaches that we are baptized into the death of Christ. Rev.1:5 states, "Unto him that loved us, and washed us from our sins in his own blood." If we are baptized to get our sins washed away (Acts 2:38; 22:16), and the blood of Christ is the only thing that washes sins away, then the blood of Christ, spiritually speaking, is applied in the obedience of baptism. We are baptized into his death to get the benefits of his death. Then Paul says in Romans 6:5, "For IF we have been planted together in the likeness of his death, we shall be also in the likeness of his resurrection."

MR. MEADOWS, have you been baptized for the remission of your sins?

(3) Finally, you relegate baptism to a position of human works (not I), thus discarding it as a part of the plan of salvation. Evidently you have Eph. 2:8, 9, in mind. I am enclosing a booklet Objections to the Necessity of Baptism Answered which deals with this under one point. Please read pages 4 and 5. I trust that you will.

QUOTATION FROM BOOKLET

Others quote Ephesians 2:8,9, trying to sidetrack baptism by calling it a work, and salvation is "not of works, lest anyman should boast." Here is the full quotation. "For by grace are ye

selves: it is the gift of God: Not of works lest any man should boast."

Here we see the two "sides" of salvation-"For by GRACE are ye saved through FAITH." The word GRACE means unmerited favor; here especially on the part of God towardman. We don't deserve salvation but God has offered it to us. So, everything associated with God may be summed up under grace. Then, there is man's side—"through FAITH." Man's whole relationship to God is based on faith. Faith is the mainspring of every action. The inspiredwriter didn't say 'faith only," but he did say faith. This correctly sums up man's side of his dealings with God.

Now the "rub" supposedly comes when it says, "Not of works, lest any man should boast." This is applied by those who deny baptism as they pinpoint it as a work.

Well, what is the answer to this objection to baptism?

The answer is rather simple, as truth is many times. There are two kinds of works mentioned in the New Testament Scriptures, (1) Works of human merit, and (2) Works of faith. Works of human merit greatly characterized the Law of Moses. By this no man had really been justified, according to Paul

saved through faith: and that not of your- (Galatians 2:16). The Law of Moses was very much like a firing squad: The wages of sin is death; all have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God; and the soul that sinneth, it shall die. There was no escape. Man's goodness could not counteract his bad side totip the scales in his favor. Death awaited. But the kind of works taught in the New Testament are works of faith. We are justified by faith as the blood of Christ cleanses us from all sins, but it must be an obedient faith. The New Testament knows nothing of the common denominational doctrine of "faith only." James in chapter 2 of his very practical epistle, having reference to works of faith, says that faith without works is dead. The only time the expression "faith only" is found in the New Testament is to deny the doctrine of faith only. Listen to James 2:24, "Ye see then how that by works a man is justified, and NOT BY FAITH ONLY."

> Good works of human merit can never take away sin or undo the past. It is conceivable that a person could reform and live a good moral life above reproach, approaching above sin, then die and go to hell. His heretofore unforgiven sins would still be upon him. Good works of human merit cannot take away your past sins. Only the blood of

Christ can do this, "Not of works, lest any man should boast."

Now, how in the world can people who object to baptism apply the "works" argument against it? Baptism is not a work of human merit or righteousness, it is a work of faith. We believe in the death, burial and resurrection of Christ. Then we identify our belief in this truth by a personal death to sin, a burial and a resurrection in baptism. Listen to Colossians 2:12. "Buried with him in baptism, wherein also ye are risen with him through the faith of the operation of God, who hath raised him from the dead." And, what about Titus 3:5? "Not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to his mercy he saved us, by the washing of regeneration, and renewing of the Holy Ghost.' Acts 2:38 is a parallel Scripture to this. He tells us that baptism is not a work of righteousness.

In fact, baptism is anything but a work of human righteousness, lest any man should boast. According to Acts 2:38 (22:16; Col. 2:11,12), we are baptized for the remission of sins—to get our sins washed away. Does human works do that? No, only the blood of Jesus. So, baptism is not a work of man, but it is God at work as the merits of the blood of Christ are spiritually applied for the sinner then. (End of quotation).

You concluded your letter, signing your name "REV. Lee O. Meadows" (after saying, "I'll stand on God's Word"). Without being unduly critical, where is God's Word for this pretentious title, "REVEREND"? The apostles never once used it. In fact, in Paul's letters he calls himself a "bond servant." Jesus warned the scribes and Pharisees about such vainglorious titles (Matthew 23:6-12). Holy and reverend is God's name—not man's (Ps. 111:9).

And where is God's Word for the name "BAPTIST" Church? (I speak in humility). The New Testament says that in "all things" Christ is to have

the pre-eminence (Col. 1:18). Party names are condemned as sinful along with the party spirit (denominationalism) (I Cor. 1:10-13; 3:3-5). Who purchased the church with his own blood (Acts 20:28)? Is he not worthy of all the glory?

MR. MEADOWS, much of the content of your "letter" was once my convictions, but adeeper study of God's Word changed them. It is altogether possible that you have not thought about some of these things. Regardless what one may say, these Scriptures are still in the Bible—we will face them in the Judgment. We had better believe and preach them now.

A LESSON FROM THE LOWLY MOSQUITO

OFF THE WEST COAST of Florida 3.2 kilometers is the island of "Seahorse Key." It is a virtual paradise for mosquitoes...heavily timbered, swampy, warm and damp. In 1968 scientists began releasing thousands of amorous male mosquitoes upon the island. The influx of new mosquitoes averaged 13,200 per day. At the end of the experiment 96% of the mosquito population had been annihilated.

The secret of this amazing statagem is a sterile mosquito. Scientists produced and released insects that were normal in every way. ..except that they could not reproduce. In the second generation of the experiment the ratio of sterile males was 3 to 1. In the fifth and sixth generations it was 100 to 1. Except for the arrival of new wild mosquitoes migrating to the island, these insects would have been completely destroyed. In the last two generations studied reduction in fertile egg rafts was 99.4% – 99.8% effective.

NOW LET'S TRY TO RELATE THESE TRUTHS TO CHRISTIANITY. Statistics indicate that 95% of those with their names on church rolls never win a soul to Christ! A community of mosquitoes with this alarming sterility rate would be close to extinction. The church could be, unless the "rank and file" of the disciples begin to lead others to Christ. Except for the gospel seed being sown by "wild mosquitoes" (maverick believers who do not know any better than to share their faith), the Lord's church would long since have vanished.

The late Jim Rutherford once remarked, "The devil wouldn't mind if you baptized a thousand people...provided they behaved like everyone else." As a matter of conjecture, the devil may even prefer that people become "Christians"...provided that they can not or will not produce! WHAT A DIABOLICALLY CLEVER WAY OF ANNIHILAT-

ING CHRISTIANITY. Scientists at Seahorse Key were trying on an exceedingly tiny scale the same plan that Satan is working on a worldwide scale.

While this devasting concept is still fresh on our minds, let us refocus on the words of Jesus: "Every branch in me that beareth not fruit (God) taketh away" (John 15:2). Dead timber only cumbers the ground. Withered branches that demand attention but produce no fruit are a liability. Any living organism which does not reproduce itself is on the precipice of extinction. A Christian who can not, or will not, win to Christ other people is so abnormal that his very existance is a threat to the future of God's program. God's grace may withhold judgment for several years to allow development and cultivation, as in the case of the barren fig tree (read Luke 13:6-9)...but the poison of sterility cannot continue in the Garden of God!

Divine wisdom, justice, and love demand that those won GO WIN...that those told GO TELL...that those led to Christ GO LEAD TO CHRIST.

"Abide in me, and I in you. As the branch cannot be ar fruit of itself, except it abide in the vine, no more can ye, except ye abide in me. I am the vine, ye are the branches: he that abideth in me, and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit: for without me ye can do nothing. If a man abide not in me, he is cast forth as a branch, and is withered; and men gather them and cast them into the fire, and they are burned... Herein is my Father glorified, that ye bear much fruit: so shall ye be my disciples" (John 15:4-7,8).





YES, that is exactly what it says in Romans 3:17, "The way of peace they have not known." This is very obvious in our own times. With all the fanfare of peace symbols, treaties, conferences, summits, and such like things, one would think that there would be less war. But we still have wars and rumors of war, just as Christ prophecied. WHY?

Do you have peace? Christ promised peace. "Peace I leave with you: not as the world giveth, give I unto you" (John 14:27). "These things have I spoken unto you, that in me ye might have peace. In the worldye shall have tribulation; but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world" (John 16:33).

WHAT PEACE?

The peace which God gives through Christ is a personal matter. To whom would such verses as II Thessalonians 3:16 apply? "Now the Lord of peace himself give you peace always by all means." Does the Lord give peace to just anyone? "And it came to pass, when Joram saw Jehu, that he said, Is it peace, Jehu? And he answered, What peace, so long as the whoredoms of thy mother Jezebel and her witchcrafts are so many?" (II Kings 9:22). We are willing to pose the same question—HOW CAN IT BE PEACE, when the way of peace is ignored?

"But the wicked are like the troubled sea when it cannot rest, whose waters cast up mire and dirt. There is no peace, saith my God, to the wicked" (Isaiah 57:20, 21). What peace is there for the lost soul who knows not Christ as his Lord? Every lost sinner is miserable, always promising himself that he will "do better." There is always that gnawing sense that the Bible is true, and that hell awaits at the end of such an existence. But, Christ can and does give peace to those who obey Him.

What peace is there in being a backslider? "Thine own wickedness shall correct thee, and thy backslidings shall reprove thee: know therefore and see that it is an evil thing and bitter, that thou hast forsaken the Lord thy God, and that my fear is not in thee, saiththe Lord God of hosts" (Jeremiah 2:19). That verse pictures the very opposite of peace!

What peace is there in being a troublemaker? "Draw me not away with the wicked, and the workers of iniquity, which speak peace to their neighbors, but mischief is in

their hearts" (Psalms 28:3).

One point we do want to get across in this short message—Christ can and DOES give peace to those who obey Him.

THE PEACE OF CHRIST CAN BE YOURS

It was prophesied that Christ would bring peace. "Of the increase of his government and peace there shall be no end..." (Isaiah 9:7). At Christ's birth, the angels announced "peace, good will toward men" (Luke 2:14).

The book of Colossians is directed to "the saints and faithful brethren in Christ" (Colossians 1:2). In Colossians 3:15 we read, "Let the peace of God rule in your hearts, to the which also you are called in one body; and be ye thankful."

Philippians 4:17 is directed to Christians: "And the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus."

"For the kingdom of God is not meat and drink, but righteousness, and peace, and joy in the Holy Spirit' (Romans 14:17). PEACE is to be found in a right relationship with Christ.

Perhaps you object, and think that if these things be true, how come there isn't more peace on earth. The trouble is, that some who appear to be spiritual really aren't. "For to be carnally minded is death, but to be spiritually minded is life and peace" (Romans 8:6). Also, some people won't let you be at peace with them! "If it be possible, as much as lieth in you, live peaceably with all men" (Romans 12: 18). The devil is out to stir all the strife he can.

FOLLOW TRUE PEACE—NOT A FALSE PEACE

"Peace at any price" is NOT peace at all! "Great peace have they which love thy law: and nothing shall offend them" (Psalms 119:165). "Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace, whose mind is stayed on thee: because he trusteth in thee" (Isaiah 26:3). "For they have healed the hurt of the daughter of my people slightly, saying, Peace, Peace, when there is no peace" (Jeremiah 8:11).

Do you have the peace that passeth understanding? If not, begin now to put all of your trust in the Lord Jesus Christ, and obey Him. "Follow peace with all men, and holiness, without which no man shall see the Lord" (Hebrews 12:14).
