IF YOU ARE LIKE this writer you can get your work done better by making a list of things that need to be done, then mark through each thing on the list as it isdone. Not only does this make for certainty in getting the work done, it gives you more of a sense of accomplishment as the work is done. However, after the list is initially made you must decide which things are the most important and are to be done first. If there is no priority, exercising self-discipline to do the harder things first usually is the best way to go about it. Otherwise, first things must come first (that being determined by importance and urgency).

Consider the following situations and circumstances. Situation A: (1) The refrigerator needs defrosting; (2) A picture is crooked on the wall; (3) The house is

on fire. What should be done first? Situation B: (1) You must go on a business trip; (2) The car must be packed; (3) You discover the gas tank is empty, and to complicate matters (4) you have a flat tire. What should be done first? Situation C: (1) You must go to work; (2) You have to get up; (3) You need to put on your clothes; (4) You need to eat breakfast. What do you do first?

Then again, what comes first (and what is wrong here)? (1) You want to bake a cake; (2) You add all the ingredients, except one (you forget the eggs); (3) After it is baked, you crack the eggs and pour them on the top. Will this work? Has the end result been accomplished? Have you made the actual cake you started out to bake? And what about this? (1) You want to become a Christian; (2) You must trust in Jesus Christ; (3) You must repent of all sins; (4) You must confess your faith; (5) You must be immersed into Christ for the remission of your sins. But along the way you don't do all of these things—one or more of the ingredients is left left. Have you become a Christian?

Yes, there are certain things that by way of priority should come first, and there are other things that by way of necessity must come first. It is like the Lord Jesus said about the seed planted in the ground: "For the earth bringeth forth fruit of herself; first the blade, then the ear, after that the full corn in the ear" (Mark 4:28). And we can't get the baseball player home until we first get him on the base. But even before that he must get up to bat. First things must come first.

And in matters of religion and our relationship to the eternal God it is interesting to notice that many Scriptures emphasize there are certain things that must come first. These verses actually come right out and say this. First things come first (and must come first) if we are to get anywhere with God and realize salvation. Although we may not have arranged the following Scriptures in sequence or systematically, each is full of vital truth. May we take heed to what is said.

I. "But seek ye FIRST the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you" (Matthew 6:33).

This is a great verse of Scripture, and there is a sense in which every other "first" is actually included in this one.

Man is a dual personality, spiritual and physical.
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Proverbially SPEAKING.

"Lord, I do not ask for faith to move mountains; I pray, Lord, for enough faith to move me."

When people become preoccupied with methods rather than the all-important message—look out! Trouble is in store for the church.

"A man may make mistakes, but he is not a failure until he starts blaming others."

Woe unto them who love entertainment and not truth, for truth will not be theirs for long.

"The best way to keep from stepping on other people's toes is to put yourself in their shoes."

What some people call "contending for the faith" could really be called "being contentious about the faith" (or, better still, about their own opinions).


"Any old dead fish can float down stream; it takes a live one to go up stream."

Supposedly "belonging" to the "right" church can never take the place of being right with God.

SPEAK, EXHORT, AND THEN REBUKE

"These things speak, and exhort, and rebuke with all authority. Let no man despise thee" (Titus 2:15).

TITUS, as an associate preacher working with the apostle Paul, had been left on the isle of Crete to "set in order the things that are wanting" among the churches. Different Spirit-inspired instructions are given, then Paul writes the above words (2:15). He was to "speak, and exhort, and rebuke," letting no man disregard what he had to say. What he was doing on Crete was part of the over-all work of an evangelist.

Why say "speak, and exhort, and rebuke" (and in that order)? Each word seems to become stronger and more intensified. What is meant? (1) He starts out with "speak." This word (the Greek) basically means to give utterance to. Thus, he was simply to tell them what God's will was involving the various things under consideration (in setting the churches in order). (2) Next we have the word "exhort." This word means to admonish, beseech, entreat, implore, etc. It is a little stronger than "speak." After first teaching them (informing them), as seen in "speak," he was now to urge these teachings upon them. They were to be admonished to put them into practice. (3) Last comes "rebuke," the strongest word. It is obvious as to what is meant here. After teaching and exhorting, now rebuke was to be resorted to, to accomplish obedience in their lives (to get them to put these things into practice). And all of this was to be done in the context of authority (not compromise), for he was speaking the authorative Word of God (not man's).

This speaking, exhorting, and rebuking may be done all at one time (as in one sermon), or it may be carried out over a period of time. The situation would seem to determine the procedure. However, we are of the opinion that it would usually be best to spread this over a period of time. After teaching the people, and perhaps exhorting them, give them time and a chance to put it into practice. Let it "sink in." Many people don't do any better because they don't know any better. If they are sincere (and have good and honest hearts), and they have been properly taught, it will be only a matter of time until they put it into practice. If they are a little slow in doing this, then rebuke (with love) may become necessary.

If you walked up to a stranger on the street and punched him in the nose for seemingly no apparent reason, he would wonder what in the world was coming off. However, if you had talked to him and he knew there was some "just" grievance, his reaction would be different. Our preaching can be that way. Most people don't even really know God's Word, and we rebuke them for not putting it into practice. We have the cart before the horse. It would be better to try to patiently teach them first. If they are really sincere, then we can expect results.

That is the basis on which we proceed in the printing of this paper. We believe that a lot of people don't do any better because they don't know any better. The Sword and Staff is a teaching/preaching publication. We believe there are many neglected New Testament teachings. We appeal directly to the Word of God, and we humbly share with you our studies of what it teaches. We believe that we commend ourselves to you who love the Word of God in doing this. Like Cornelius of old, both of us stand before God together; we want to "hear all things that are commanded" of God (Acts 10:33). "Speak, Lord, for thy servant heareth."

The spiritual has to do with the eternal whereas the physical has to do with the temporal. Man was made by God and for God—made in the very image and likeness of God. This image of God involves the eternal. When man puts God first in his life, the over-riding emphasis will be on the spiritual (and consequently the eternal). When the physical dominates, and the spiritual is neglected and disregarded, his "value" system is geared to this world (and the flesh). He becomes more and more like the beast of the field, no more than an animal.

The first book of the Bible, the first chapter, and the first verse of that chapter reads, "In the beginning God..." (Genesis 1:1). God is before everything (first), and the first cause of every resultant cause. In reference to time He was the beginning. And in reference to our lives He is the beginning. Not only that, "in him we live, and move, and have our being" (Acts 17:28). How logical, as well as Scriptural, to conclude that He should have the first place in everything involving our lives. Having futilely tried most everything "under the sun" (good and bad), the writer of Ecclesiastes now from the vantage point of experience and hard-earned wisdom declared, "Let us hear the conclusion of the whole matter: Fear God, and keep his commandments: for this is the whole duty of man. For

God shall bring every work into judgment, with every secret thing, whether it be good or whether it be evil" (Ecclesiastes 12:13,14). God made us for Himself, and we are like a fish out of water until we are right with our Creator. He must have first place or no place.

And (in the context of Matthew 6:33) when we put God first, He will put us first (and from the other side of the picture, leave Him out and He will leave us out). Although the New Testament puts the emphasis upon the spiritual and the eternal, still Jesus here says the needful material things will be "added." To get an Old Testament background to this thought, consider Psalms 37 (a psalm of David). Listen: "Trust in the LORD, and do good; so shalt thou dwell in the land, and verily thou shalt be fed. Delight thyself also in the LORD; and he shall give thee the desires of thine heart. Commit thy way unto the LORD; trust also in him; and he shall bring it to pass" (verses 3-5). Then this man David (who is described as a man after God's own heart, Acts 13:22) further said, "The steps of a good man are ordered by the LORD; and he delighteth in his way. Though he fall, he shall not be utterly cast down: for the LORD upholdeth him with his hand. I have been young, and now am old: yet have I not seen the righteous forsaken, nor his seed begging bread" (verses 23-25).

Oh! That men would seek the things of God first (the giver of life), then their lives would not be so empty and barren! The Lord Jesus taught, "For whosoever will save his life shall lose it: and whosoever will lose his life for my sake shall find it" (Matthew 16:25). And Paul echoed this truth when he said that "godliness is profitable unto all things, having promise of the life that now is, and of that which is to come" (I Timothy 4:8b).

II. "Woe unto you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! for ye make clean the outside of the cup and of the platter, but within they are full of extortion and excess. Thou blind Pharisee, cleanse FIRST that which is within the cup and platter, that the outside of them may be clean also" (Matthew 23:25,26).

The ministry of Jesus was one running encounter of conflict with the scribes and Pharisees. Early in his ministry in the Sermon on the Mount, he had said (and that with strong emphasis), "For I say unto you, That except your righteousness shall exceed the righteousness of the scribes and Pharisees, ye shall in no case enter into the kingdom of heaven" (Matthew 5:20). Now as he has entered into the final week of his ministry, we read the great climaxing clash in Matthew 23. He could be very patient with publicans and sinners (even harlots) who were seeking, but with religious hypocrites, never! His most scorching words of rebuke (like coming from John the Baptist) were reserved for them. Listen: "Ye serpents, ye generation of vipers, how can ye escape the damnation of hell?" (Matthew 23:33).

Christianity as a religion is not something that we "add" to our lives, it is life itself. We don't just "polish up" the outside a little, mouth pious (but empty) words, and put our "best foot" forward to impress people. No

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real Christianity (the real thing) starts from the inside and works out. It involves the "heart." There must be a change from within, a total surrender to God. This must come first, or all acts of religion are meaningless. This is what is called being "born again." "Jesus answered and said unto him (Nicodemus), Verily, verily, (amen, amen), I say unto thee, Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God" (John 3:3,5—this takes place when one repents and is immersed into Christ—Acts 2:38). We enter into a living and vital relationship with Christ. "Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new" (II Corinthians 5:17).

First things must come first. If you have never repented of your sins (and gotten things straightened out on the inside of you), regardless how religious you may appear, you are still in your sins. You may have even been baptized. You must personally give your heart to God. Otherwise you are phony. God knows all. He is "a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart. Neither is there any creature that is not manifest in his sight: but all things are naked and open unto the eyes of him with whom we have to do" (Hebrews 4:12b,13).

III. "And this they did, not as we had hoped, but FIRST gave themselves to the Lord, and unto us by the will of God" (II Corinthians 8:5).

Paul is talking about giving here. For a considerable time during his ministry he was especially preoccupied with this offering that was being taken up among the Gentile churches for the poor saints back in Palestine (they had lost their worldly possessions in becoming a Christian, Hebrews 10:32-34). Here in II Corinthians he mentions the eagerness of the churches of Macedonia, although in poverty themselves, giving liberally to this cause. But he is pleased that he can observe that they had first given themselves to the Lord.

This is a must in our giving. "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life" (John 3:16). "He that spared not his own Son, but delivered him up for us all, how shall he not with him also freely give us all things?" (Romans 8:32). We have freely received, and should freely give. There is nothing stingy about Christianity. This giving is made easy when we have first given ourselves unreservedly to the Lord (he gave his all). This is a prerequisite. This is a must.

Giving is to be looked upon as an act of worship just like the Lord's supper (Acts 2:42; 20:7; I Corinthians 16:2; Philippians 1:3-5; 4:18). It is a shame and a disgrace when church people merely look upon it as a matter of "raising money" to pay the church's "bills" (how degrading). And it is even more shameful and disgraceful when religious people attempt to "raise" this money from the world. This may be done by direct solicition (begging), bake sales, yard sales—you name it! True Christians will gladly reach down into their hearts and their pockets and give liberally (regularly


and systematically). This will be no problem because they have first given themselves to the one who gave his all. What they are and what they have are at His disposal. How unchristian to expect the world to pay our "bills." How degrading to the concept of giving being an act of divine worship.

And while we are at it, what we are saying about first giving ourselves to God applies to all worship. When a Christian gets up on Sunday morning (or any other time the church is meeting), he doesn't even have to think about whether he is going to church or not. That was settled when he was baptized. He unquestionably and unconditionally gave himself to God. If God is first in your life and the church meets upon the first day of the week (or any other appointed time), your first predetermined thought will be to assemble with those of kindred minds (Hebrews 10:25; Acts 20:7; Acts 2:46). What a blessed privilege!

Have you first given yourself to God? It makes all the difference in the world (and in reference to the world to come).

IV. "Therefore if thou bring thy gift to the altar, and there rememberest that thy brother hath ought against thee; Leave there thy gift before the altar, and go thy way; FIRST be reconciled to thy brother, and then come and offer thy gift" (Matthew 5:23,24).

The setting of this Scripture is the Sermon on the Mount, and the Law of Moses was still in force. What the Lord said here involves worship in connection with the sacrificial system that was carried out in the temple area. Although what he says here is in the context of the Old Testament, we know the Sermon on the Mount anticipates the coming kingdom (and the prin-



ciple laid down here hold true today). In other words, if there is ill-will (hatred, malice) between brethren they cannot worship God acceptably until they get their problem resolved. This is as true today as it was then.

The apostle Paul wrote: "I will therefore that men pray everywhere, lifting up holy hands without wrath and doubting" (I Timothy 2:8). We can't do this with an unforgiving heart. The Lord Jesus taught: "For if ye forgive men their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you: But if ye forgive notmen their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses" (Matthew 6:14,15). No doubt Paul had this in mind in Ephesians 4:31 and 32 when he admonished, "Let all bitterness, and wrath, and anger, and clamour, and evil speaking, be put away from you, with all malice: And be ye kind one to another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake hath forgiven you."

People cannot hold grudges, come to church and supposedly worship, and still expect God to accept it as true worship. First, before worship, before partaking of the Lord's supper, go and be reconciled to your brother. Otherwise your worship is in vain and you stand in constant jeopardy before the eternal Judge of heaven and earth.

First things must come first.

V. "I exhort therefore, that, FIRST OF ALL, supplications, prayers, intercessions, and giving of thanks, be made for all men" (I Timothy 2:1).

This is fitting and true anyway you choose to look at it. Whether Paul used "FIRST OF ALL" to mean first in the sense of things dealt with in order in this epistle, first in reference to importance, worship, or what-have-you, all are true. To pray, to honor God, to seek His will first in this personal way is in keeping with all we have found out so far about "FIRST THINGS FIRST." Someone has aptly said: Until a Christian has prayed, the most important thing that a Christian can do is to pray. How we need to honor God, thank God, and pray to Him for wisdom and guidance. Then we can move on into what we have to do with more confidence and assurance.

The Lord Jesus fasted and prayed before entering into his public ministry. He prayed before he chose his disciples. He prayed before his crucifixion (and what an experience of prayer that was in the Garden of Gethsemane). There was prayer that anteceded the coming of the Holy Spirit and the establishment of the church. There was prayer and fasting before Christian workers were sent out from Antioch in Acts 13. This was likewise true with the setting aside of elders in local situations. Paul, in almost all of his epistles, mentions first that he is praying for them in one way or another. To the Christians at Rome he wrote, "First, I thank my God through Jesus Christ for you all. . ." (Romans 1:8). Notice I Corinthians 1:4; Ephesians 1:15-17; Philippians 1:3-5; Colossians 1:3; I Thessalonians 1:2; II Thessalonians 1:3; II Timothy 1:3.

The early Christians were described and characterized as "them that call on the Lord out of a pure heart" (II Timothy 2:22). Could that honestly be said to be the distinguishing mark today of modern

Christians? No doubt there are those who not only do not pray first, but neither later, or hardly ever at all. In this day of advanced technology and apparent human self-sufficiency, perhaps even the most devout do not pray as they should

Prayer is nonetheless a very essential ingredient in the life of a Christian. Remember: Until a Christian has prayed, the most important thing that a Christian can do is to pray.

VI. "Thou hypocrite, FIRST cast out the beam out of thine own eye; and then shalt thou see clearly to cast out the mote out of thy brother's eye" (Matthew 7:5).

Read Matthew 7:1-5 to get the whole picture of what Jesus said here. What he said was aimed at the scribes and Pharisees (and anyone else if "the shoe fits"). They were guilty of censorious, self-righteous, hypocritical judgment of others. Although they set themselves up as religious teachers, they badly needed to first get their own lives straightened out. Like the Lord said, "And why beholdest thou the mote that is in thy brother's eye, but considerest not the beam that is thine own eye?" In other words, they were like a person trying to get a tiny speck (as saw dust) out of their friend's eye when at the same time a whole beam of wood (as a "2 by 4") was projecting from their own. How grotesque! While pointing a single finger at another they had three pointing back at themselves.

The Lord is teaching that before trying to teach others our own house must be set in order. David realized that in the 51st Psalm. In his prayer of repentance he wants things to be as they once were before with the Lord, "Then will I teach transgressors thy ways; and sinners will be converted unto thee" (verse 13). Even then we must be humble. "Brethren, if a man be overtaken in a fault, ye which are spiritual, restore such an one in the spirit of meekness; considering thyself, lest thou also be tempted" (Galatians 6:1).

Oh, could that all leaders in the church say with Paul, "Be ye followers of me, even as I also am of Christ" (I Corinthians 11:1). Elders are to be examples to the flock (I Peter 5:3). The writer of Hebrews admonishes, "Remember them which have the rule over you, who have spoken unto you the word of God: whose faith follow, considering the end of their conversation (the end-results of their life-style)" (Hebrews 13:7).

What about you, elder, preacher, teacher, Christian? Does what you do speak so loudly that people can't hear what you say?

Remember. First get your own life straight, then God can use you.

VII. "And let these also FIRST be proved; then let them use the office of a deacon, being found blameless" (I Timothy 3:10).

This third chapter of I Timothy gives the qualifications of elders and deacons. This list of qualifications was not put here as optional guide lines in the selection of these men. Verse 2 starts out by saying an elder (bishop) "must" be thus and so. In the original language of the New Testament, the Greek word here for "must" is the same one that is found in John 3:7 where Jesus

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said, "Marvel not that I said unto thee, Ye must be born again." That is pretty strong language. According to Acts 20:28, men from Ephesus had been made "overseers" (bishops, elders) by the Holy Spirit. One aspect involved in this is in meeting the qualifications laid down by the Holy Spirit (and especially today in the Spirit-inspired Word). Prospective elders and deacons first must meet these qualifying prerequisites. Then they are to be tested and tried to prove that they do—"And let these (deacons) also (as well as the elders) FIRST BE PROVED." Paul admonished the evangelist Timothy, "Lay hands suddenly on no man, neither be partaker of other men's sins: keep thyself pure" (I Timothy 5:22).

A plightful and pathetic situation exists today in certain traditional and unindoctrinated circles, and the guilt can largely be laid at the door of compromising leaders. This writer sat in a class where a college professor taught that these qualifications were the ideal, just like the Lord Jesus was the ideal, but it was not necessary that they be met as such. Men were to strive for them just like we strive to be like Jesus (but never can really be like him in the absolute because he is perfect). Another professor taught that these qualifications didn't have to all be in one man; they could be distributed among the eldership as a group. We have run into cases where preachers have "put men in" as elders (although they didn't qualify), saying it would make better men out of them (the cart before the horse). Others put prestigious men from the business world into these positions as a showcase for the church in the community (how unspiritual! What they are trying to prove, I know not). Then some have said that they didn't have to have faithful children (Titus 1:6) or any children at all; others have said that they didn't have to be married, and still others have even gone so far as to say that they didn't have to be a man to be an elder.

How tragic! Misunderstanding and confusion reign in reference to the eldership today. In the place of it has arisen the professional, denominational minister (CLERGYMAN) who usually is insensitive and insipid (and even ignorant) to what the New Testament teaches on the subject of the elders. Minister (aside from the deacon) is not an office in the New Testament church.

This subject deserves further study. But, "Let these also FIRST BE PROVED." First things must come first. Then we go from there.

VIII. "And above all these things put on charity (love), which is the bond of perfectness" (Colossians 3:14).

The apostle Peter also said, "And above all things have fervent charity (love) among yourselves; for charity (love) shall cover a multitude of sins" (I Peter 4:8).

If something is "above all things," it is first. Actually the words for above in Colossians 3:14 and I Peter 4:8 are two different words in the Greek New Testament. *Epi* is the word in Colossians, and *pro* in I Peter. *Epi* signifies upon or above whereas *pro* means before. Peter's word *pro* would really tie in better with

the literal thought of first. But, any way you look at it, love takes priority. Paul has us above all things to put on love (as we put on Christ), which binds all of the rest of it together in perfectness. Peter has the fervent manifestation of it to be first in our relations with one another (even to the point of covering "a multitude of sins").

Truly love, the unselfish consideration of others, is first. It must precede and accompany everything in our dealings and relationships. Paul instructed the Corinthians, "Let all your things be done with charity (love)" (I Corinthians 16:14). That great chapter on love, I Corinthians 13, is unsurpassed in its treatment of this subject. If we have great faith and good works, but no love, we are still nothing. Giving all to the poor, and even self in the ultimate gift of martyrdom, will profit us nothing without love.

Love is the necessary prerequisite in the right kind of obedience. Jesus said, "If ye love me, keep my commandments" (John 14:15).

May we have more of this.

OF THAT GREAT ETERNAL DAY to come, our Lord said, "But many that are first shall be last; and the last shall be first" (Matthew 19:30). Many are first in this world who will be last (nobodies) in the world to come, but one thing is for certain, God will put those first who have put Him first (and those who have left God out will be left out). And those who have put God first must have first done many things as we have pointed out in this article. The Lord Jesus declared, 'And whosoever doth not bear his cross, and come after me, cannot be my disciple. For which of you, intending to build a tower, sitteth not down FIRST, and counteth the cost, whether he have sufficient to finish it? Lest haply, after he hath laid the foundation, and is not able to finish it, all that behold it begin to mock him, Saying, This man began to build, and was not able to finish. Or what king, going to make war against another king, sitteth not down FIRST, and consulteth whether he be able with ten thousand to meet him that cometh against him with twenty thousand? Or else, while the other is yet a great way off, he sendeth an ambassage, and desireth conditions of peace. So likewise, whosoever he be of you that forsaketh not all that he hath, he cannot be my disciple" (Luke 14:27-33).

BELOVED, none of us is perfect, but have you put first things first in your life (in your relationship to God)? Let us get things in proper perspective. First things MUST come first. There is no other way.

Life in the Blood

A LITTLE BOY was told by his doctor that he could save his sister's life only by giving her some blood. She was near death—a victim of a disease from which the boy had made a marvelous recovery two years before. Her only chance for restoration was a blood transfusion from someone who had previously conquered the disease. Since the two children had the same rare blood type, the boy was the ideal donor.

"Johnny, would you give your blood for Mary?" the

doctor asked. The boy hesitated, his upper lip started to tremble. Then he smiled and said, "Sure, Doc, I'll give my blood for my sister."

Soon the two children were wheeled into the operating room—Mary, pale and thin; Johnny, robust and a picture of health. Neither spoke, but when their eyes met, Johnny grinned.

As his blood siphoned into Mary's veins one could almost see new life come into her tired body. The ordeal was almost over when Johnny's brave little voice broke the silence. "Say, Doc, when will I die?"

It was only then that the doctor realized what the moment of hesitation, the trembling of the lip had meant. Little Johnny actually thought that in giving his blood to his sister he was giving up his life! In that brief moment he had made his great decision.

You see, that's really the kind of decision we make in receiving Christ. It is commitment unto death. His blood for our blood. Of course, the analogy breaks down when describing what our Lord did when He gave His blood for us. He did go all the way. But it does point up the nature of our response to His sacrifice. There is an unlimited supply in the incorruptible blood of the Son of God. Its life-giving power is as strong today as it was when it was given at the cross. It matches every type, avails for every need, and is free to all who will receive it into their heart by faith.

If for any reason your life has not known this divine transfusion, receive it now. There is life in the blood. Offer yourself to Jesus in baptism, in newness of life, in a godly walk, and in the use of all your gifts. And in this holy outpouring of your life your heart will feel the throb of the heart of God. Unchanging Things in a Changing World

WE ARE LIVING in a changing world. Perhaps that is the least disputed assertion that we could make. The changes that have been wrought in this world and within our country, looking back in the life time of some, are astounding. Nationally, within a little more than a century, America has leaped from an unexplored frontier to become one of the most modern countries in the world, an during the same time has taken the position of world leadership. Perhaps during this time, scientifically, there has been more rapid and intensified progress in the field of learning than in all others centuries put together. Man has left the horse and buggy to take wings and fly with supersonic speed. The old oil lamp has been replaced by electricity. Modern inventions and discoveries have placed man at the brink of mass annihilation. One sudden uncalculated move could usher much of humanity suddenly and unceremoniously into eternity. During the same period many things have been happening within the religious world too. One hundred or more years ago men were bound behind denominational walls with iron-clad creeds. The doctrine of Calvinism was strongly felt in the circles of denominationalism. Men's convictions were strong although wrong.

Today religious tolerance is the fad of the day. Denominational walls have somewhat disintegrated, but the element of pride still remains, and convictions seem to be a thing of the past, and many denominations find themselves with leaders who are nothing more than infidels hiding behind the word "scholarship" and "higher education."

In the midst of all this we are certainly made to exclaim that we are living in a changing world. Change has brought good things, but change has brought many evil things. Things of man are subject to change. He is shifting, moving with the sands of time. Everything is being questioned, and man is found to be like a ship at sea with no anchor or sail. Ancient landmarks have been removed. But there is something we can anchor our weary souls to. The things of God do not change. They are eternal.

I. GOD IS UNCHANGEABLE.

The Psalmist speaks of God in this fashion: "But thou, O LORD, shalt endure for ever; and thy remembrance unto all generations" (Psalms 102:12). Then he continues in reference to the things of earth, "They shall perish, but thou shalt endure: yea, all of them shall wax old like a garment; as vesture shalt thou change them, and they shall be changed: But thou are the same, and thy years shall have no end" (Psalms 102:26,27). James has this to say about God: "Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, and cometh down from the Father of lights, with whom is no variableness, neither shadow of turning" (James 1:17). Upon examing these Scriptures, here is the teaching. The things of earth shall fade away and become old and be no more, but God shall go on and on throughout all eternity. God is from everlasting to everlasting. Not only that, James tells us more. He is the same from everlasting to everlasting. He used the figure of no shadow cast by God's turning. In other words, God is the same in His nature at all times. He can be depended on. And it is not a matter of pantheism. God is the Father of man and exists as a definite personality.

God is the great Power behind the universe. As long as time is, He can be depended on to enforce His natural laws. The law of gravity holds true, and the earth turns and we see the sun "rise" every morning. Man in his scientific ventures is only finding out the natural laws of God—discovering the laws of God set into operation eons ago with His great acts of creation. The exact function of these natural laws is continuously a marvel.

God is always the same as the loving heavenly Father. James well said, "Every good and perfect gift is from above, and cometh down from the Father. . ." The old preacher's version of God making man was that God was lonely and He wanted someone to love, thus He made man in His likeness. God loves man and is concerned about His well-being. One unbelieving religious leader has accused God of being "an old bully" in the Old Testament, and speaks of the "idea" of God in the Old Testament and the New Testament. The love of God is expressed in the Old Testament. Certainly He had patience with such a stiff-necked people as the Jews. He

spared and showed mercy unto the Gentiles when they would sincerely repent and turn from idolatry. It is hard for us to conceive how degenerate their idolatry was. God wants everyone to go to heaven, and if they don't it will be in spite of what He has done.

God is unchangeable in His attitude toward sin...God is the embodiment of all that is pure and good. He has a holy distaste and hatred for all that is wicked and evil. He cannot tolerate sin in any form. Sin always brings a separation from God, which is death. Sin does not go unpunished, although it may seem that way upon earth at times. The day of judgment is coming for all of mankind. God is Holy and He says, "Be thou Holy for I am Holy." Only the pure in heart will see God, and the wages of sin is death (Romans 6:23).

II. CHRIST IS UNCHANGEABLE.

The Hebrew writer declares: "Jesus Christ the same yesterday, and today, and for ever" (Hebrews 13:8). This verse shows the unchangeable nature of Christ, the only begotten Son of God. Of course Christ took the form of man, being clothed in flesh, as he lived upon this earth and identified with mankind. He lived life just as human beings, yet without sin. He tasted death like every man and for every man on the cross of Calvary. But unlike man he was victorious over the grave and was not confined long to the abode of the dead. Christ was the Son of man and the Son of God. Now He is back in heaven, living for ever to make intercession for the Christians. He came to prove His Deity and to save the human family from the awful consequence of sin. That is still His purpose on the earth. Christ is unchanging, and the part about Him that is unchangeable is His Divine purpose and nature.

Therefore, inasmuch as Christ is unchanging, that means the gospel is changeless. Christ is the gospel (good news), and the gospel hinges around His death, burial and resurrection (I Corinthians 15:1-4). (Thus, to preach Jesus is also to preach baptism since that pertains to his death, burial and resurrection—Acts 8:35,36; Romans 6:3-6). But many today say, "Let's streamline the gospel." They claim that we have too much of a "slaughter house" religion (how blasphemous!). A man dying on a cross for the sins of the world is just too crude for the modern mind, it is claimed. Let us hear "nice" things. Hence, men come up with the social gospel, which has been defined as the gospel of "soap, soup and science;" a moral, do-good religion without the blood of Christ. But, may I say, dear friend? The gospel of Christ does not need streamlining. It is far ahead of this age, or any age to come, for Jesus said it would be "unto the end of the world." Degenerate and fallen man needs to conform his life to the streamline pattern of Jesus. The world is out of step with that which is right, not the Christian. Perhaps we are using the wrong terms when we say "Old-fashioned Gospel" or "Old-time Religion." There is nothing "old-fashioned" about the gospel of Christ. It does not the Bible itself fit into an evolutionary pattern. The

have the mark of time upon it. (Religions of men do. though). It is always new, vital, and the timeless good news. It should be just as fresh as if the apostles penned the message this morning. Men need to bring their lives up to date with the gospel of Jesus.

III. THE WORD IS UNCHANGEABLE.

Jesus said, "Heaven and earth shall pass away, but my words shall not pass away" (Matthew 24:35). Jesus further said, "...the Scripture cannot be broken." In I Peter 1:25 we read, "But the word of the Lord endureth for ever. And this is the word which by the gospel is

preached unto you." Yes, friend, when God speaks, it is for all eternity. God cannot lie (Titus 1:2). If God is perfect, His word is perfect. If God is eternal, His word is eternal. I have no doubts about the Bible being the Word of God. We have the Divine promise that the Word of the Lord would be with us for ever. God has communicated His Divine will unto us, and He will keep in contact with every generation with His recorded Word.

But, oh how men have reproached God and His word! Men imply that God's Word is not plain enough. They formulate their creeds and crystalized religious prejudices into a man-made book, usurping the authority of the Bible. This man-made creed afflicts oncoming generations. Their thinking and study of the Bible is stifled by preconceived dogmas. False doctrine has been endeared and canonized in the hearts of people because loved ones have died in that religion. Thereafter their descendants have a closed mind to any new idea or further investigation of the Bible. How sad the situation becomes as men seek to justify denominational divisions, saying that it doesn't actually matter what one believes.

Then modern theologians have terribly disgraced God's Word. Along came the theory of evolution. Theologians revised their thinking to fit the situation of the human theory and thus have destroyed the Bible. Many are so obsessed with the idea that they are trying to make theory of evolution is falling into the background today as unproved and irrational, and these "change-with-theweather" theologians will be left holding the bag. The Word of God is Unchangeable.

Jude says to "...earnestly contend for the faith which was once (and for all) delivered unto the saints" (Jude 3). The wrath of heaven is pronounced against any who will add or take away from the words of the Book (Revelation 22:18,19). It is a very, very serious matter. They may say one thing one day and do another thing the next day. But in the midst of an uprooted society, a restless, moving modern world, let us ever keep in mind that God is unchangeable. He is still in His heaven, and His purpose is still the same with the human race. The earth still moves on its axis. While man may think that the gospel needs streamlining and that he is his own saviour, there is no getting around the fact of Christ. He is the unchanging Son of God and the only way under heaven whereby we may be saved (Acts 4:12). Men need to streamline their lives to fit the plan of Christ, which is way ahead of this age, looking forward to the age to come. Men may say they no longer believe the Bible, that it is a book of fables, but CHRISTIANS BELIEVE IT! It would be mighty stupid to think that Supreme Deity could not reveal His will to mankind. Yes, the Bible is still that grand old Book read by our mothers, setting forth God's road map to heaven. If we anchor our souls to these truths, we will find them anchored to eternity, and a home that fadeth not away reserved in heaven for us. If we sincerely believe these things, we will find ourselves being obedient unto every good work. The cares of this life will be of little importance in relation to the over-all view of God's plan. These are unchanging things in a changing world!

Does that reveal an indulgent Jesus?

If Jesus did not teach religious tolerance, then where do Christians get their directive for mingling with false teachers in our assorted union fellowships? Can you imagine the apostle Paul participating in a Good Friday communion service with the Judaizers. Sadducees and Pharisees? No. He said the exact opposite. "I urge you, brothers, to watch out for those who cause divisions and put obstacles in your way that are contrary to the teaching you have learned. Keen away from them" (Romans 16:17). Does that sound like a resolution to endure erroneous religious instructors?

The absence of a Biblical directive authorizing interreligious activities in which Christians may participate seems of little consequence to the contemporary church. For example men join in interdenominational and interreligious worship. It may take the form of Good Friday communion, a musical concert, a teaching seminar, or other ways in which we show our tolerance, if not out-right acceptance of those who pervert the doctrines of God! Why would we want to give credence to those who deny the bodily resurrection of Jesus, pray to the Virgin Mary, negate the essentiality of water baptism, claim sprinkling is valid Biblical baptism, advocate once saved always saved, or deny Jesus as the Christ and the only Son of the living God?

How important is doctrinal purity? Can we deny the central principles of the Gospel and still be saved? What do the Scriptures say in that regard? Many of the religious groups with whom some fraternize deny the following Scriptures.

The Resurrection (Romans 10:9): "That if you confess with your mouth, Jesus is Lord, and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved."

Water Baptism (John 3:5): "Jesus answered, I tell you the truth, unless a man is born of water and the Spirit, he cannot enter the kingdom of God" (also see: Acts 2:38; I Peter 3:21; Acts 22:16; Mark 16:16).

Immersion (Romans 6:4,5): "We were therefore buried with him through baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life. If we have been united with him in his death, we will certainly be united with him in his resurrection" (also see: Acts 8:38,39; Mark 1:9,10).

One Mediator (I Timothy 2:5): "For there is one God and one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus."

One Way (John 14:6): "Jesus answered, 'I am the way, the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me'."

Once Saved Always Saved (Luke 8:13): "Those on the rock are the ones who receive the word with joy when they hear it, but they have no root. They believe for awhile, but in the time of testing they fall away.'

The Scriptures teach that there will be false apostles who will masquerade as apostles of Christ (II Corin-

forever cursed" (Galatians 1:8).

WORSHIPPING THE DEVIL

SOME TWENTY YEARS AGO, a man by the name of Anton LaVey formed a group who called themselves the CHURCH OF SATAN. This was in California. For centuries, mankind had been "living like the devil," but so far as I can find, 1976 marks a somewhat formal establishment of his "church" (unless the occult in other forms qualifies). About seven years earlier, LaVey had produced a book called *The Satanic Bible*. The 272 page volume was designed to completely reverse the meaning of Christian prin-

ciples found in God's Word. The main form of worship (called the Black Mass) is filled with Satanic and lustful rituals. The emphasis is that Satan must rule, and the flesh must be gratified.

Sin and its slime are not new, but it is horrifying when humanity openly worships the very enemy of Almighty God. We read of the degradation of Sodom, the repulsiveness of Gomorrah, and think nothing could be more detestable. But now—and openly—we have our fellows indulging in the most insolent and Goddishonoring practices conceivable. (And conceivable is the wrong word—most of us can't conceive of all that goes on as humanity so debases itself). Peter warns us "the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour" (I Peter 5:8). But what does man do? Worship his own enemy—his arch-enemy! Folks, that's not too smart!

What caused devil worship; where did it start? Be assured it didn't erupt over night. Sin has a corrupting influence (I Corinthians 5:1-6). Open flagrant sin often has its secret beginning. Witchcraft, black magic, the occult, and other things related to the Satanic world, have been around for centuries. But they haven't been so openly promoted in America until the past few years. Our permissive society has brought them out of the woodwork.

But what corrupted LaVey? What influenced him to worship Satan? I suppose no one really knows, but whatever corrupting influences affected the man, a major factor, strangely enough, came through "Christians." It is said Mr. LaVey was a former organ player at carnivals and at Sunday tent revivals. He saw many at church on Sunday, whom he had seen the night before at the burlesque and dancing girl carnival attractions. All he could see was hypocrisy. His disdain was evidently the beginning of his cult. At the very foundation of the CHURCH OF SATAN then, is hypocrisy among "Christians." This is the devastating influence of the careless and insincere. Here were church members unwittingly fueling the fires of infidelity. My friends, you may think your carelessness hurts no one. You may live the hypocrite. But look how a few just like you influenced the life of Anton LaVey.

CORINTH not only was an important Greek city mentioned in the New Testament, having two epistles bearing its name, but a beautiful style of columns in architecture also bears its name. Above is a picture of an early version of the Corinthian columns taken by the editor in the ruins of Corinth. Paul in his travels saw many impressive buildings which did not impress him at all (Acts 17:24,25,30—they were given to idolatry).

Among the Greeks three distinctive styles of columns were used in their structure. The oldest and most simple was the Doric, being used first in the 7th century B.C. Next came the lonica with a base and two scroll-like carvings in its capital. The last to appear (in the 4th century B.C.), the Corinthian order, was a modification of the lonic, but (in our opinion) much more beautiful. Its capital took the shape of an inverted bell with two staggered rows of acanthus leaves and four small diagonal scrolls under the corner of its abacus.

Needless to say, these impressive styles and structures influenced the Romans and subsequent generations of people, and in many ways serve as standards to the world yet today.—*J.E.G.*

****** SELFISHNESS

THE BIBLE severely condemns selfishness. Paul lists selfishness as a work of the flesh (Galatians 5:20). He urged the Philippians to "do nothing through selfish ambition" (Philippians 2:3). He expressed his fear that "selfish ambition" might be found in the Corinthian church (II Corinthians 12:20).

Nothing good is ever said about selfishness in the Bible. The reason is quite apparent. The selfish person is interested only in himself, wants everything for himself, feels no pleasure in giving, but only in taking. The world outside is looked at only from the standpoint of what he can get out of it; he lacks interest in the needs of others and respect for their dignity and integrity. He can see nothing but himself; he judges everyone and everything from its usefulness to him.

Selfishnesss is a sort of slow poison. One dose leads

to another, until the system becomes so saturated with it that one's whole life becomes bitter and disappointing. Nobody has ever found real and lasting happiness in being selfish.

The cure for selfishness is for us to crucify the "I" in our lives, so that "it is no longer I who lives, but Christ lives in me" (Galatians 2:20). Let us put selfishness to death!—T. Kelton




