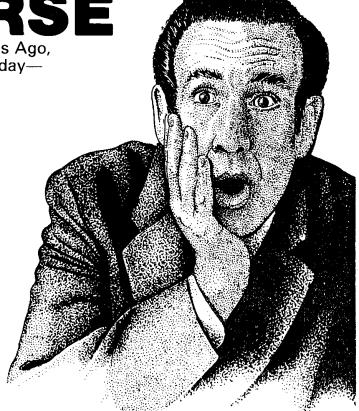
But Even More Timely Today—

RELIGIOUS CONDITIONS were deplorable in the days of the prophet Ezekiel! The judgment of God was coming down, and they were confronted with captivity in a strange land. Even those left behind in Jerusalem had not learned their lesson. In the Spirit, Ezekiel visits back in Jerusalem and sees the idol worship and lack of concern among the professed people of God. God said to the appointed ones, "Go through the midst of Jerusalem, and set a mark upon the foreheads of the men that sigh and cry for all the abominations that be done in the midst thereof" (Ezekiel 9). To some others, He said, "Go ye after him through the city, and smite: let not your eye spare, neither have ye pity: Slay utterly old and young, both maids, and little children, and women: but come not near any man upon whom is the mark; and begin at my sanctuary." Those who were not concerned and bewailing the terrible condition of Israel were to die the death! The curse of God was coming upon these unconcerned, irreligious souls!

Some will say, "How can God do such a thing? God is the God of love." True, promises were given, but commandments had to be obeyed! Sooner or later the hand of God's judgment comes down upon the wicked, and especially among His professed followers who are not in the least concerned nor faithful! The apostle Peter declares, "For the time is come that the judgment must begin at the house of God: and if it first begin at us, what shall the end be of them that obey not the gospel of God? And if the righteous scarely be saved, where shall the ungodly and the sinner appear?" (I Peter 4:17,18). God is love, but also "our God is a consuming fire" (Hebrews 12:29).

The curse of God was on the Jews in Jerusalem in the day of Ezekiel because of their unconcern! We are cursed with the same thing today! Where are those who "sigh and that cry" for the terrible conditions that exist in the divided religious world? Where are those who are concerned about a sin-sick, lost and dying world? We are cursed and plagued today by (1) Cold Hearts!



(2) Dry Eyes! and (3) Empty hands! All of these follow one another.

I. COLD HEARTS

We are cursed with cold hearts today all the way from the pulpit to the pew in many places! The spiritual heart includes our emotion, intellect, conscience, and will. Our heart also is the place of our inward feeling—our zeal and enthusiasm about a matter. To have a cold heart is to have a lack of concern about the work of the Lord. It is awful to talk to sinners outside of Christ who are not concerned about religion, but it is even more discouraging to approach supposed church members and find a lack of concern about things eternal! Today it seems that most "members" have a cold heart!

Why are "church members" so cold-hearted today? A lot of things go into answering this question, but it all amounts to the fact that their hearts are in the

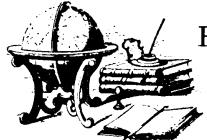

ON AUGUST 24, 1989 unprecedented excitement filled the air. After traveling through space for 12 years, and covering 4.43 billion miles in its arched pathway of journey, the spacecraft Voyager II made its predestined rendezvous with the distant planet Neptune as it hurled on through outer space to leave our solar system. Radio waves relaying pictures of this spectular encounter back to earth, traveling at the speed of light (186,000 miles per second), took 4 hours and six minutes to span the 2.8 billion miles.

Scientists are really excited about everything as new knowledge of the solar system comes in. We stand in awe and respect at the science and technology that makes this accomplishment possible. Man was quick to laud and applaud himself in what was taking place. But after all has been said, there is something very conspicuous and obvious by its absence (that which has not been said). There is something more wonderful and awesome than seeing Neptune up close and having that information sent back to earth over the expanse of billions of miles (taking over 4 hours to get here). Neptune is only one planet on the outward edge of the immediate solar system of our sun. The heavens are literally full of such suns (stars) greater and more wonderful in size and magnitude than our sun (we are told). It is overwhelming; it is mind-boggling to try to think of the Galaxies, the Milky Way, and the countless heavenly bodies in that boundless expanse that seems to be out there.

wrong place! Jesus touched upon this in Matthew 6:19-23. He said, "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." If we really value and treasure the kingdom of God, our hearts will be in it. If our treasure is elsewhere, our hearts will be elsewhere. And if they are elsewhere, they will be cold concerning Christ. Paul describes such as "lovers of pleasures more than lovers of God." Even a lukewarm heart, which is neither hot nor cold, brings the curse of God upon us and results in losing Christ (Revelation 3:15,16).

Too many times people are cold-hearted because they have never been converted in the first place! When one becomes a Christian, his heart must be changed! If it isn't changed, he will live no differently. If we live like the world, we are of the world (I John 3:6-9). Christian is as Christian does. Friend, have you done anything this month, this week, or this day that you wouldn't have done if you weren't a Christain?

Every preacher of the gospel is confronted at times with cold-hearted elders and deacons it seems. Some times elders and deacons come up against cold-hearted preachers. There seems to be a general misunderstanding of the work of the elders and deacons, and preachers have been reduced to "pastors." Elders have not been told of their work, and when a preacher endeavors to tell them of their work, he usually has a rebellious group with which to contend. Most churches want to look to a preacher as "THE PASTOR," disregarding what the Bible says about it.

How elders, deacons and preachers need warm hearts about the work of the Lord! One elder missed the services of the church for two or three months straight. Peter says that elders are to be "ensamples (examples) to the flock" (I Peter 5:3). If the church had followed the example of this elder, the church would have dismissed three months before. There are cases where deacons seldom come to any services of the church. There have been times when young preachers were "on fire" with the gospel of Christ only to have that enthusiasm dampened by cold and traditional churches. They have gone out into the world with a warm heart and a holy fear in preaching that message which is from above and not of men only to be discouraged by unreceptive churches who should be behind them! How we need warm hearts! Our curse is cold hearts!

II. DRY EYES

We have dry eyes today! This is the expression of our heart, our sincerity or lack of sincerity! A religion without any emotion or tears in heartless and has little influence in our living. We need more tears. This does not mean we are weaklings. The only begotten Son of God wept time and time again. He shed tears of concern over Jerusalem. It behooves us to be like Jesus.

God knows our eyes are dry because our hearts are cold concerning things spiritual. We have not tears, but when we do, they are not really for important matters! The little dog is run over—we cry! We lose a football game, a basketball game, the players and friends cry—tears for immaterial things! We don't get

what we want—we cry! We suffer under the consequence of sin—we cry, but don't repent! TEARS, Tears, tears, but all for the wrong things!

Our religion is our life as channeled in its right relationship to God. Utter unconcern for true religion is all about us, but does it bring tears? Cold-hearted "church members" neglect the church that the Lord purchased with His own blood! Does it break our hearts? The land is flooded with denominationalism and division in the religious world as men follow the doctrines of men, but we are told that it doesn't make any difference what one believes or practices in the name of religion? Oh, where is the warm-hearted concern for Truth? A world is lost in sin and going to a Devil's Hell to be lost for ever, but who cares about that? Oh wretched, cursed people that we are! God, give us broken hearts for lost souls that will disturb us in our complacency!

III. EMPTY HANDS

Our curse is brought home to us because we have empty hands. Hands express the action of the intent of the heart. They are symbolic of our work and labor for Christ. Nothing in our hands we bring because we have nothing in our hearts; thus, our eyes are dry; therefore, our hands are empty! The fruit of our labor is none!

We are empty when it comes to the fruit of the Holy Spirit simply because our hearts are cold! Paul says, "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance; against such there is no law" (Galatians 5:22,23). Too many times our lives and hands are full of just the opposite—the works of the flesh. About this Paul says, "Now the works of the flesh are manifest, which are

these: Adultery, fornication, uncleanness, lasciviousness, idolatry, witchcraft, hatred, variance, emulations, wrath, strife, seditions, heresies, envyings, murders, drunkenness, revellings, and such like: of the which I tell you before, as I have also told you in time past, that they which do such things shall not inherit the kingdom of God" (Galatians 5:19-21).

We are empty when it comes to speaking for Christ. So many things would make our hearts cold and divert us from the great work of the church, but all are to speak for Jesus! In the early church every Christian was a soul winner (Acts 8:4). If we are going to be the New Testament church today, we must get to the place where every Christian is concerned about soul winning and doing something about it!

It doesn't matter about our circumstance in life—we can speak anywhere! Talk about Jesus on your job! Do you feel that you are not qualified to speak about Jesus? Religion? Moses felt that he couldn't talk, but God used him in a mighty way. Are you a shut-in? Don't excuse yourself! You can write letters, send tracts, or get on the phone. It is amazing at the things that can be done. Are you a child? God can use you! You think you don't have any opportunities? Friend, the world is lost in sin all around you! Pray that God will open the way. There have been cases where Christians have prayed and hungering souls have been directed to them by the hand of God. Pray that God will give you a passion for lost souls. Our curse today is not trying to win anyone, and thus our hands are empty!

Friend, will the curse of God come down upon us because of our unconcern? If we continue in apathy, we can know assuredly that it will! Hebrews 2:3 states, "How shall we escape if we neglect so great salvation?" As long as our hearts are cold, eyes dry, and hands empty, the wrath of God is upon us! We are cursed children! Our lot will be as recorded in Matthew 25:30!

If we are among those "that sigh and that cry for all the abominations" that are about us, and are striving to please God in God's way, we look forward to the day when we can hear the Father say, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant. . .enter thou into the joy of the Lord."

Paul gives some good advice to all: "And that, knowing the time, that now it is high time to awake out of sleep: for now is our salvation nearer than when we believed. The night is far spent, the day is at hand: let us therefore cast off the works of darkness, and let us put on the armour of light" (Romans 13:11,12).

Toward A More Spiritual Concept: (5) ON OFFENDING PEOPLE

WE ARE LIVING in an age of weak, watered down, and anemic preaching. People, for the most part, had rather "heap to themselves teachers, having itching ears" (II Timothy 4:3) than to "endure" sound, wholesome and vigorous doctrine. They want smooth (and sickly) sermons and sayings. Therefore, in the midst of these circumstances of compromise it is no wonder that when a person really preaches the Word of God

with the love and fear of God in his heart, bearing down on sin and indifference in no uncertain terms, that it will sometimes be said that he is offending people. His detractors will vigorously appendage this statement by saying that the Lord said not to offend anyone.

Sound preaching must have more than sound to it. And, yes, wisdom demands that we not be unduly abrasive, but really now, what do the New Testament Scriptures have to say about this? What did our Lord actually say about it? Should we "offend" people? What is the more spiritual concept?

The English dictionary gives two definitions of this word offend: (1) To transgress the moral or divine law; sin; (2) To cause dislike, anger, or vexation; displeasure. In other words, the basic defintion of offend is to sin, and secondly to displease.

Because the New Testament Scriptures were written in Greek we go to that language to examine the words translated "offend." The two main words rendered "offend" really are the same root, one being a noun and the other a verb. They are respectively skandalon and skandalizo. Skandalon (the noun) has this definition, beginning with the root meaning: (1) Trap; (2) Temptation to sin, enticement to apostasy; (3) That which gives offense or causes revulsion, that which arouses oppostion, an object of anger or disapproval.

As stated, the root meaning had reference to falling into a trap. Hence it is easy for us to see how this word is primarily used in connection with falling into sin, sinning; then the last meaning, arousing another's displeasure. The meanings are not unlike that given in the English dictionary for offend, the first being that to sin. Even in a nonreligious context, we speak of offenders of the law (those who break the law). With these things in mind let us notice the Scriptures.

Some people hold this Scripture over the head of a godly preacher, trying to "tame" him down a little in his preaching. "But whoso shall offend one of these little ones which believe in me, it were better for him that a millstone were hanged about his neck, and that he were drowned in the depths of the sea" (Matthew 18:6). Jesus had been talking about actual children, and perhaps it is also applied to spiritual children (those starting out in Christ).

Now what is the nature of the offense as the Lord speaks here in Matthew 18? He goes on to talk about cutting off the hand or casting out the eye if these things offended them (Matthew 18:7-9). The word offend is here used in reference to breaking God's law. sinning. The little ones would be offended, or caused to offend, by falling into sin; not someone trying to teach them the Word of God. But people today have it turned around. If the preacher tries to get the "little ones" to give up their ungodly ways and quit sinning (they are the offenders, i.e. the "little ones"), the preacher is offending them (bless their "little" hearts). How absurd! But such is the "reasoning" of some. Read Luke's account in Matthew 18 (Luke 17:1,2). Notice how Jesus used the same word in Matthew 16:23. In reality Peter was unwittingly trying to get the Lord (Continued on Next Page)

Surely a person has not thought Matthew 18:6 all the way through when using it to curb strong gospel preaching because some people do not like the message. Jesus is talking about children. Even in fleshly relationships the parent does not hesitate to correct his child, or "hurt his feelings" in discipline, if it is needed. It is obvious that offend here refers to something other than that. This is expected in a good parent. Offend in Matthew 18:6 signifies to cause one to stumble into sin. Paul said that if doing a questionable thing caused his brother to offend (sin), he would not do it as long as the world stood (I Corinthians 8:13). Some of the so-called preaching that "offends" is that which tries to get people to stay away from sin or to remove that which really does offend (in God's estimation).

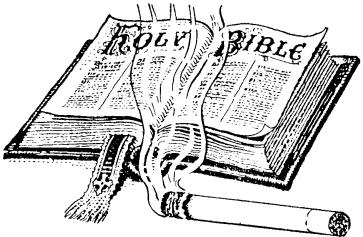
But please notice what is said of Jesus and what Jesus said (in view of the last meaning of offend, to excite the disapproval of another).

- 1. Christ is "a stone of stumbling, and a rock of *of-fense* (he offends people), even to them which stumble at the Word, being disobedient. . ." (I Peter 2:8).
- 2. The Pharisees were *offended* because Jesus taught against their human traditions (Matthew 15:12; notice 15:1-14).
- 3. The spiritual teachings of Jesus *offended* many of his disciples (they were "hard sayings"), and they followed him no more (John 6:60-66).
- 4. Of one type of believer, Jesus said that "when tribulation or persecution ariseth because of the Word, by and by he is *offended*" (Matthew 13:21).
- 5. Jesus told his disciples that all of them would be *offended* because of him (Matthew 26:31), and Paul speaks of the *offense* of the cross (Galatians 5:11).
- 6. Jesus said, "Blessed is he, whosoever shall not be offended in me" (Matthew 11:6).

Beloved, this whole matter of a faithful man of God preaching the Word, and so-called Christians becoming offended because the preacher loves their souls enough to try to get them to remove that which really does offend (and they say we should not offend), is a very ridiculous and mixed up proposition. If a person preaches the Bible some people are bound to disapprove, and this is taking offense. According to the Lord Jesus (and the apostle Peter), these people are offended because they don't believe and are disobedient. Jesus experienced this, and taught that men would forsake him because they were offended by the Word. Instead of being proud and rebellious when we hear the Word of God, James in his words of wisdom says, "Let every man be swift to hear, slow to speak, slow to wrath: for the wrath of man worketh not the righteousness of God. Wherefore lay apart all filthiness and superfluity of naughtiness, and receive with meekness the engrafted Word, which is able to save your souls" (James 1:19-21). Jesus said, "As many as I love, I rebuke and chasten: be zealous therefore, and repent" (Revelation 3:19). Men, by being offended at the preaching of God's Word, are showing their true caliber—they are an offense unto God! Jesus said, "Blessed is he, whosoever shall not be offended in me."

Yes, to be faithful to God we must take our stand for the truth and how that truth relates to our lives. It should be preached with conviction and boldness, yet seasoned with love. Jesus has already told us that not everyone would accept it. It is an affront to them. Because people don't like what is said is no reason for us to compromise lest we "offend." Paul very aptly and plainly said, "For do I now persuade men, or God? or do I seek to please men? for if I yet pleased men, I should not be the servant of Christ" (Galatians 1:10). This is the more spiritual concept.

Toward A More Spiritual Concept: (6) THE CHRISTIAN AND THE USE OF TOBACCO



IS IT WRONG for a Christian to smoke and use tobacco in any form? Does the Bible by principle, or direct command, have anything to say upon this subject? Really, is there a more spiritual concept that should be considered? These questions seem to have never entered the minds of many professing religious people, but a real Christian will be concerned about them. He wants to please His Lord in every way and in all things (Colossians 3:17,23).

In recent years the medical world has said much about smoking and the use of tobacco. Their indictment and verdict against tobacco comes through loud and clear. As well as the great harm that is done to the human body, the substance is very addictive (more addictive than marijuana, we are told). It is a primary cause of lung cancer, and it is a great factor in heart diseases. The use of tobacco produces many maladies, not to mention the fact that it aggravates almost any health problem that a person may have. It even has been figured out statistically how many years of a person's life are shortened by the use of tobacco. The evidence is so overwhelming that the U.S. government requires this warning (and variations of it) to appear with cigarette advertizing (and similar information on cigarette packs): "WARNING: The Surgeon General Has Determined That Cigarette Smoking Is Dangerous to Your Health." The medical knowledge concerning the harmfulness of the use of tobacco is so common that we will not attempt to try to prove anything that we have said. Only companies, growers, and other special interest groups (motivated by selfish concerns)

would try to deny this.

The "Christian world" for the most part has been silent on the subject of tobacco. Even in the face of the terrible truth of its danger to health and life, most enslaved souls (it seems, but not as many as once did) will try to justify its use—and still claim to be faithful Christians! One man said that when his conscience bothered him, he would quit smoking. A more discerning brother, who was also more spiritually inclined, said, "If I committed adultery as often as you smoke, I wouldn't think that adultery was wrong either!" Yes, there is such a thing as having our "conscience seared with a hot iron" (I Timothy 4:2), or would it be better in this case to say, with a hot cigarette?

But, what we are concerned with is the Bible. Do the Scriptures say anything that would throw any light upon this issue one way or the other? Is there a more spiritual concept governed by New Testament principles that we need to consider?

First, we would like to say that the use of tobacco is tempting God (for the Christian).

Jesus was tempted of the devil to cast himself from the pinnacle of the temple. After all, God would take care of him lest he "dash his foot against a stone" (Matthew 4:5-7). The immediate reply of Jesus was, "Thou shalt not tempt the Lord thy God" (Matthew 4:7).

In other words, it would be the same thing if a person threw himself in the front of an oncoming car, then asked the Lord to save him. It likewise would be tempting God. We are commanded NOT to tempt God.

How can this be applied to smoking? the use of to-bacco?

The Christian's life is one of trust and commitment, committing our all unto the Lord (I Peter 5:7; Philippians 4:6). We look to the Lord for His watch-care and our well-being in everything. This we are commanded to do, as well as it being our special privilege.

Now, in view of the serious hazards to one's life involved in smoking, and the definite prospects of a premature death, we would be tempting God by continued use of tobacco. To ask the Lord to look out for us and to take care of us, then use tobacco would be really presumptuous in the sight of God. It is the same thing as jumping in the front of the car, then asking the Lord to take care of us. It is the same principle that is involved in the temptation of Jesus to leap from the pinnacle of the temple (although, perhaps not as sudden and dramatic). Jesus said in no uncertain terms, and may we listen, "Thou shalt not tempt the Lord thy God."

Second, there are several other Scriptural reasons we could list against smoking. We will not take the time to examine them in detail, but simply give them.

Paul says in I Corinthians 3:17, "If any man defile (or destroy—footnote) the temple of God, him shall God destroy, for the temple of God is holy, which temple ye are." He has reference to the collective body (the church) being the temple of God, but you will also notice that individually we are the temple of God, i.e. of the Holy Spirit (I Corinthians 6:19,20). Our bodies belong to God. The warning here is that if we destroy the temple of God, He will destroy us. What does tobacco do to the body?

Listen again to the apostle Paul: "Having therefore these promises, dearly beloved, let us cleanse ourselves from ALL FILTHINESS of the flesh and spirit, perfecting holiness in the fear of God" (II Corinthians 7:1). The promise of God being our Father and us being His children (and Him living within us) should make us clean up our lives in every way. Besides the other factors involved, at its best we must admit that the use of tobacco is a filthy habit. We are commanded to cleanse ourselves of ALL FILTHINESS of the flesh and spirit.

Let us ask this question: Can you visualize Jesus using tobacco? a cigarette hanging from his lips? Be honest now! He is our example in every way (I Peter 2:21). John says that every Christian must "purify himself, even as he (Jesus) is pure" (I John 3:3). O beloved, look to Jesus. He is our example. We can't go wrong here.

Then in addition to its destructive nature, tobacco is habit-forming. It contains an addictive drug, nicotine (more addictive than marijuana, we are told). There is no question about the drug element. We have heard people in tears say that they would like to quit, but they just couldn't (they said). They were under control by tobacco. Even if it were just a matter of opinion, from this perspective it would no longer be a matter of opinion it would be wrong for a Christian. Again listen to Paul: "All things are lawful unto me, but all things are not expedient; all things are lawful for me, but I WILL NOT BE BROUGHT UNDER THE POWER OF ANY" (I Corinthians 6:12). Then again: "I can do all things though Christ which strengtheneth me" (Philippians 4:13). Beloved, if we profess to belong to King Jesus, and have been enslaved by king nicotine, we had better take steps to become unshackled. Let God help you break the chains that bind you. He will, and through His grace you can get the victory.

Finally, all will have to admit, whether they accept all that has been said or not, that there is a BIG QUESTION MARK surrounding the use of tobacco. Just from a surface examination there is room for *much* doubt. Paul, stressing a principle, declared, "He that doubteth is damned if he eat, because he eateth not of faith: FOR WHATSOEVER IS NOT OF FAITH IS SIN" (Romans 14:23).

THEREFORE, any way you choose to look at it we must conclude that the use of tobacco is not for the Christian. The only way to sum it up is: IT IS WRONG! That's all we can make out of it. If we profess to be a child of God (or have been thinking about becoming one), we need to quit the stinking habit right away and that without delay (once and for all). God will help in getting the victory, and you will be pleased with yourself for what you have done. The medical and Scriptural evidence are too overwhelming to do otherwise. Let us do nothing to impair the promise of everlasting life. Let us truly be a spiritual church (without spot or wrinkle, or any such thing—Ephesians 5:27), one that the Lord can accept (Revelation 21:27).

(AFTERTHOUGHT: Some have asked why God made the tobacco plant if we can't use it. After He had made everything, He said that His creation was good. But we ask: why did God make rattlesnakes? Why did

God make poison ivy? Why did God make a lot of other things? We don't see people wanting to "use" these things. The truth of the matter is that everything seems to have it place. We don't know all that God had in mind when he made the tobacco plant, but the tobacco worm thrives very well on it. . and it doesn't shorten his life either. Also, we have seen the tobacco plant in a dried, crumbly and powdered form used as an insecticide).

This is the more spiritual concept.

GLUTTONY IS WRONG TOO

WHEN the possibility of wrong is pointed out in the use of tobacco, it is not at all uncommon for the person on the defensive to point out that gluttony is wrong too. You can eat too much. And in the light of the Bible this is true. The wrongfulness of the use of tobacco is in no way lessened. Two wrongs don't make a right (as they say). Gluttony just happens to be one of the sins that is never preached upon today.

Gluttony and being a drunkard are usually coupled together in the Scriptures (Deuteronomy 21:20). "Be not among winebibbers; among riotious eaters of flesh: For the drunkard and the glutton shall come to poverty: and drowsiness shall clothe a man with rages" (Proverbs 23:20,21). As a person by drinking could become drunkened, likewise by eating too much food he could become a glutton.

The Hebrew word translated "glutton" means "to shake (as in the wind), i.e. to quake; fig. to be loose morally, worthless or prodigal:—blow down, glutton, riotous (eater), vile." Evidently the word literally means to shake, to quake. The person is so carried away with his much eating that he "shakes" and "quakes" as he vigorously gorges himself. Obviously a person can "shake" and "quake" while eating without being a glutton, and he can eat without shaking and still be a glutton. This is just the basic meaning of the Hebrew word that came to be applied overall to gluttony. "Riotous" as in "riotous eaters of flesh" is the same as gluttonous (same Hebrew word) (Proverbs 23:20; 28:7).

In the New Testament Paul gives a quotation about the inhabitants of Crete, which is not very complimentary: "The Cretians are alway liars, evil beasts, slow bellies" (Titus 1:12). A more modern translation renders this, "The Cretans are always liars, evil brutes, lazy gluttons" (NIV). "LAZY GLUTTONS"—how unsavory!

When we think about the harmfulness of tobacco, and consequently its evil, let us not forget gluttony. Over-eating (and of the wrong kinds of food) can ultimately bring all kinds of health problems and premature death. We are not about to draw the line on exactly where gluttony begins, but in a land of plenty and

of overweight people someone along the line just might have committed the sin of gluttony. We have yet to hear a sermon preached on the sin of gluttony (or it even being mentioned).

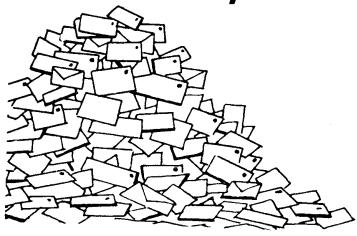

Editor's Note: In John 3:5 there is a conjunction linking two things ("water" and "Spirit"), and the conditional word "Except" is found before this. Note: "Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God."

The best commentary on the Bible is the Bible. Scripture is best understood in the light of other Scripture on the same subject. Parallel Scriptures are very illuminating. Notice Acts 2:38-41; I Corinthians 6:11; I Corinthians 12:13; Titus 3:5; I Peter 1:22,23 (all of these references in connection with John 3:5). Also, take the following Scriptures at their face value: Mark 16:15,16; Acts 22:16; Romans 6:3-5; Galatians 3:26-29; Ephesians 5:25-27; Colossians 2:11,12; I Peter 3:21.

Obviously in Luke 12:50 (and other places) Jesus is talking about the baptism of suffering that he had to experience.

I have high respect for such scholars as you mentioned, Dean Alford. Included in this number would be R.C.H. Lenski and A.T. Robertson. However, we must always realize where they are "coming from" (this is true of all denominational scholars). Otherwise, we are headed for trouble. Although they have great insights on many Scriptures, other Scriptures are filtered through denominational strainers.

Toward A More Spiritual Concept: (7) THE BIBLE ON NUDITY AND MODESTY

WE ARE LIVING in an age of immodesty and nudity. Exposure of the human body in lesser or greater degrees seems to be thought as "smart" and high style. Even among the ranks of supposed and professing Christians people are seen falling in line without any protest with the "standards" of an ungodly world. But does the Bible have anything to say upon such a subject? Is there a more spiritual concept that we ought to consider?

Yes, from Genesis to its final book of Revelation the Bible does have something to say about modesty and immodesty. Let us examine this.

God placed our original parents in the beautiful garden home of Eden. They were created and placed here in a state of innocence. Although they were created as adults, there were many things morally that they did

not know. They were even as little children. Divinely they were prohibited from eating of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil (Genesis 2:16,17). We know the sad story of their temptation and falling into sin by eating of this forbidden fruit. We don't know all that was involved about their knowledge of good and evil, but in some sense the sensitivity of their understanding was quickened when they ate. Here was the birth of conscience.

We don't know all that was involved in their knowledge of good and evil. But from what we read, what was Adam and Eve's immediate realization concerning their situation? (1) They were deeply aware of the fact that they had done an awful thing in breaking the one law that God had given unto them (and they tried to hide from God). (2) They recognized the fact that they were naked and tried to cover their bodies with leaves (Genesis 3:17-11); this was especially obvious as they were to go out and form human society.

As the story unfolds God made it plain that their clothing made from leaves was not enough, although it had been a step in the right direction. Listen: "Unto Adam also and to his wife did the Lord God make coats (tunics) of skins, and clothed them" (Genesis 3:21).

Thus, from the very beginning the principle of decency and modesty is stressed in the Bible. It is implied that if we know (understand) right and wrong, we will know that our bodies are to be covered. But in this age of indecency, immodesty, and immorality it seems that most people are insensitive to this teaching.

Many centuries removed from the garden of Eden the Law was given to Moses. And in the same chapter with the ten commandments, God declared: "Neither shalt thou go up by steps unto mine altar, that thy nakedness be not discovered thereon" (Exodus 20:26). The principle of this teaching is found throughout the Old Testament.

As we approach the New Testament, the Lord Jesus himself said, "...Whosoever looketh on a woman to lust after her hath committed adultery with her already in his heart" (Matthew 5:28). According to Jesus, this sin in the heart will cause a man to go to hell (Matthew 5:29), as well as the overt act of adultery (Galatians 5:19-21; Hebrews 13:4; Revelation 21: 8). King David, although the Bible says that he was a man after God's own heart, was guilty of this sin after looking upon Bathsheba in her immodesty. After lust had conceived in his heart, he actually became involved in the act of adultery itself.

Realizing this, the gist of the New Testament teaching on this is "that women adorn themselves in modest apparel with shamefacedness" (I Timothy 2:9). The apostle Peter also mentioned the "chaste" adornment which should be that of every woman who is a Christian. Although talking about spiritual nakedness, our Lord also in Revelation 3:18 revealed the truth of the natural state when he warned "that the shame of thy nakedness do not appear."

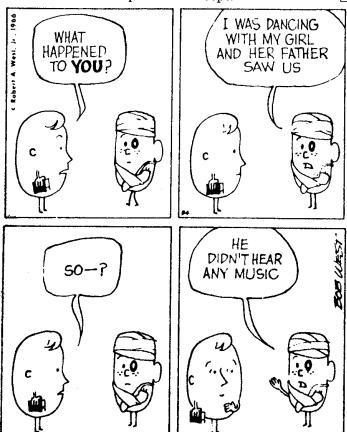
Therefore, we ask again: Does the Bible have anything to say on such a subject? Obviously the answer is in the affirmative. The Scriptures have spoken. Do we believe them?

Let us be emphatic to say that in the light of the

Drinking of Wine in the Bible

A CORRECT understanding of wine in the Bible depends upon the meaning of the original words which are translated as "wine" in our English Bibles. There is not one but thirteen different words which are translated as "wine." Nine of them are found in the Old Testament and four are found in the New Testament. The word "wine" to the twentieth century American mind conveys the idea of an intoxicating drink. Such does not necessarily inhere in the original words however. Passages such as Isaiah 65:8 where the grape still in the cluster on the vine is referred to as "wine" clearly show to the English reader that "wine" does not always mean that which inebriates.

A careful study of the passages where the word "wine" occurs will reveal that the word is used in three different ways: 1. Its use is condemned. (Genesis 9:20-21, 19:30-35; Leviticus 10:8-10; Proverbs 20:1; 23:29-35; 31:4; Daniel I:8; Isaiah 5:22; 28:7; Habakkuk 2:15; etc.). 2. Its use is approved. (Genesis 14:18; Amos 9:14; Zechariah 10:7; etc.). 3. It is spoken of with indifference.

How can we reconcile this? If the Bible is true, it cannot contradict itself. How can wine be both condemned and approved? William Patton, in his informative work, *Bible Wines*, on page 75 quotes Professor Moses Stuart as follows: "Whenever the Scriptures speak of wine as a comfort, a blessing, or a libation to God, and rank it with such articles as corn and oil, they mean, they can only mean, such wine as contained no alcohol that could have mischievous tendency; that whenever they denounce it, and connect it with drunkenness and revelling, they can only mean alcoholic or intoxicating wine."

"Wine" in the Bible is a generic term which can mean fermented wine (that which inebriates) or unfermented (that which cannot intoxicate). Non-intoxicating wine is recommended while intoxicating wine is condemned. Therefore, the drinking of alcohol for pleasure cannot be supported by the Word of God, but rather is condemned by it. Long ago the wise man warned, "Wine is a mocker; strong drink is raging, and whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise" (Proverbs 20:1).—Sound Words

"He's My Brother"

I AM SURE most of us have seen the picture of the young boy carrying another smaller boy and he is saying, "He's not heavy, he's my brother." This scene has always had an emotional appeal since everyone recognizes that there is something special about brothers. However, I saw another cartoon recently which seems to reflect the attitude that brethren in Christ sometimes have toward one another. The cartoon opens with a picture of one little boy on top of another beating him unmercifully. Another child approaches and says, "Love your enemy." The boy doing the beating replies, "He isn't my enemy, he's my brother."

The moment I read that cartoon I thought about the attitude some brethren show toward one another. They, like the little boy in the cartoon, often treat their enemies with more love and compassion than they do their own brethren. Nearly any wrong or problem is quickly resolved if it involves a brother in Christ and instead of trying to resolve the matter we try to destroy the brother. This ought not to be.

Paul said, "But if ye bite and devour one another, take heed that ye be not consumed one of another" (Galatians 5:15). What thoughts come to your mind when you say, "He's my brother"?—Words of Life

UNMARRIED COUPLES

THE ASSOCIATED PRESS recently released a report concerning the rising number of unmarried couples in the United States. The report, released by the Census Bureau contained the following information:

- 1. "The number of unmarried couples in America has topped 23 million, including more than 700,000 couples who are raising children.
- 2. "There are more than 1.5 million couples of the same sex living together, including 92,000 with children."
- 3. "Among children under 18 nearly one in four (23.9 percent) lived with just one parent up from 23.5 percent in 1985."
- 4. "There were 130 divorced Americans for every 1,000 still married and living with their spouse."
- 5. "Of the 1987 unmarried couples, 1,412,000 listed a man as the householder—formerly known as the head of the household. Of those, 395,000 households included children."

The crisis in the American family is epidemic. Bible teaching on the family is being ignored. How many families do you know that are composed of a breadwinning father, "But if any provide not for his own, and specially for those of his own house, he hath denied the faith, and is worse than an infidel" (I Timothy 5:8); a woman who is a "keeper at home" (Titus 2:4,5); and children, "Lo, children are an heritage of Lord: and the fruit of the womb is his reward...happy is the man that hath his quiver full of them" (Psalms 127:3-5)? WHO GETS ABORTIONS?

A STATISTICAL SURVEY conducted by the Alan Guttmacher Institute of 9,480 women who had abortions in 1987 contained the following information:

The marital status of those getting abortions was 63.3% never married, 18.5% married, and 17.2% (divorced, widowed, or separated). The leading age group of those getting abortions were those aged 20-24 (33.1%). The age group 25-29 accounted for 22.3%. Ages 15-19 accounted for 24.6% of abortions. Income breakdown was even, approximately 33% in low, middle, and upper income classes. Religiously, the breakdown was Protestant (41.9%), Catholic (31.5%), Jewish (1.4%), No religion (22.2%). Other (2.9%). Racially, 68.6% of those getting an abortion were white, and 31.4 non-white.

A Composite Picture

If I have read the statistics correctly, the *average* composite picture of an individual getting an obortion would be as follows: white, never married, religious (Protestant or Catholic), and about 22 years of age.

The Issue

My conclusion is that abortion is not about "rights," "choices," "sick women who must have an abortion or lose their life," or even "invasion of privacy." Abortion is basically a solution (?) for fornicators. It is no wonder the babe (this is what the Bible calls it, not a "fetus," see Luke 1:41) is so easily ripped from the womb and destroyed. The babe was never wanted, was conceived without love or commitment, and brought life in an act of lust and not love by a "religious" person. When a person has gone this far away from God, buying a "surgical procedure" to destroy life, to cover sin, and erase unwanted obligations is not such a great leap. Positive words like "rights" and "choices" give a ring of decency to a hideous crime.

"But for the cowardly and unbelieving and abominable and murderers and immoral persons and sorcerers and idolaters and all liars, their part will be in the lake that burns with fire and brimstone, which is the second death" (Revelation 21:8, NAS).

Helen Keller had many reasons to make excuses, but she was too busy for such exercises in self-pity.

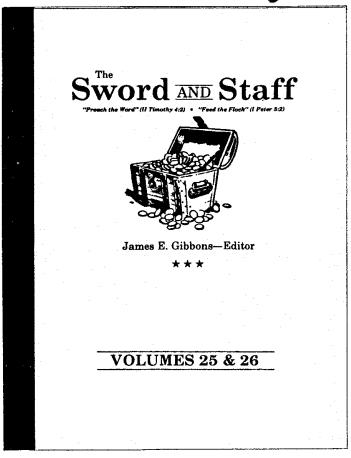

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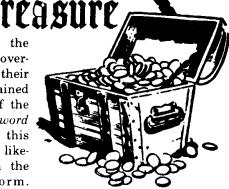
