

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WE ARE living in a changing world. Perhaps that is the least disputed assertion that could be made. The changes that have come about in this world and within this country, looking back in the lifetime of some, are astounding. Nationally, within a little more than a century, America has leaped from an unexplored frontier to become a modern country and during the same time has taken the position of world leadership. Perhaps during this time, scientifically, there has been more rapid and intense progress in the field of learning than in all other centuries combined. Man has left the horse and buggy to take wings and fly with supersonic speed. The old kerosene lamp has been replaced by electricity. Modern discoveries and inventions have even placed man at the brink of mass annihilation. One sudden uncalculated move could usher much of humanity suddenly and unceremoniously into eternity. During this same time many things have been happening within the religious world also. One hundred or more years ago men were bound behind denominational walls with iron-clad creeds. Calvinism was strongly felt in the circles of denominationalism. Men's convictions were strong, although wrong. Today religious tolerance rules the day. Denominational walls have disintegrated. Although the element of pride remains, convictions are not necessarily the basis for fellowship. Great convictions seem to be a thing of the past, and many denominations find themselves with leaders who are actually unbelievers hiding behind the words "scholarship" and "higher education."

In the midst of all of this we are made to exclaim that we are living in a changing world. Change has

brought good things, but change has also brought many bad things. Things of man are subject to change. Man is shifting, moving with the sands of time. Everything is being questioned, and man is found to be like a ship at sea with neither anchor or sails. Ancient landmarks have been removed. But in the midst of all of this there is something to which we can anchor our weary souls. The things of God do not change. They are eternal.

I. GOD IS UNCHANGING

The Psalmist speaks of God in this manner: "But (Continued on Page 5)

DOCTRINE AND CHRISTIAN LIVING

WE HEAR all kinds of things said in reference to doctrine today. Some say, "Our doctrine is right, although we may be weak on other things." Others say, "Doctrine is not important; Christian living is really what matters." One person says, "I don't like doctrinal preaching." Another says, "Let's hear more about love, not doctrine."

What about all of these sayings? Is doctrine really all that important? Do we have a choice between doctrine and Christian living? Is there a relationship between doctrine and Christian living? Or does the Bible make a distinction between the two?

The way people look at it today doctrine has more to do with what we believe than what we practice. Doctrine is looked upon as a body of beliefs, a creed, or if reference is made to practice, it is practice involving church ordinances, etc. However, the New Testament is not as restrictive in its use of the word. Doctrine refers to all teaching and to the substance of what is taught (they go together). One cannot say, "God is love," without it being doctrine.

The first question, "Is doctrine really all that important?" is answered by the following Scriptures without even making a comment on them.

- "Howbeit in vain do they worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men" (Mark 7:7).
- "But God be thanked, that ye were the servants of sin, but ye have obeyed from the heart that form of **doctrine** which was delivered unto you" (Romans 6:17).
- "Now I beseech you, brethren, mark them which cause divisions and offences contrary to the **doctrine** which ye have learned; and avoid them" (Romans 16:17).
- "Take heed unto thyself, and unto the **doctrine**; continue in them: for in doing this thou shalt both save thyself, and them that hear thee" (I Timothy 4:16).
- "Whosoever transgresseth, and abideth not in the **doctrine** of Christ, hath not God. He that abideth in the **doctrine** of Christ, he hath both the Father and the Son" (II John 9).

Then, as to the other questions, to try to make a distinction between doctrine and Christian living is arbitrary and artificial. It does not square with the Scriptures. Doctrine in the New Testament has to do with truths involving living the Christian life as well as actual statements of belief otherwise. In I Timothy 1:8-10 Paul writes of lawlessness and disobedience, listing several offenses in this category, then he continued, "and if there be any other thing that is contrary to sound doctrine." Following, in 6:3 of this same epistle, he further writes of "the doctrine which is according to godliness." Likewise in Titus 2:1, he admonished Titus, "But speak thou the things which become sound doctrine." Then he precedes to give instructions for practical Christian living to those who were senior citizens. both men and women; to young women, to young men, and to servants. Servants, even by faithfully carrying out their domestic duties, would "adorn the *doctrine* of God" (Titus 2:9,10).

Even that part of doctrine which is distinctly regarded as doctrine is inseparable from the practical outworking of it, which is likewise doctrine. After explaining great cardinal truths, Paul always gets around to making the applications. Read the first 11 chapters of Romans. Then in Romans 12:1 he begins the doctrinal section of application when he said, "I beseech you therefore, brethren..." The rest of the epistle falls under the "therefore" of practical Christian living, which is likewise doctrine (by Paul's definition). Notice the first three chapters of Ephesians. The "therefore" begins in chapter four, verse one. And to illustrate this truth further: God is Holy. "Be thou holy; for I am holy." God is Love. "He that loveth not knoweth not God; for God is love."

Therefore, let us say, the right life, in the complete sense of the word, is impossible without the right doctrine for they are inseparable. Doctrine incorporates the whole of the living truths of God and living the truths of God. "Little children, let no man deceive you: he that doeth righteousness is righteous, even as he is righteous" (I John 3:7).

A \$22.2 BILLION CRIME BILL

THE SUN had set, leaving warm and friendly pastel colors painted across the southern sky. We were on a long trip, darkness was settling in, and so it was decided that now was the time to stop for the night. Traveling on the Interstate Highway, we were on the outskirts of a large city; a sign with the

name of a familiar motel chain appeared, and then the sign of a familiar restaurant; both seemed inviting. We stopped.

The whole atmosphere of the warm pastel colors was suddenly to change (even with the familiar beckoning names). I really didn't think much about it when, pulling up to the motel, I read,

"Please Lock Your Door We are Not Responsible For Damage to Vehicles Or Loss of Contents."

However, getting out of the car, subconsciously and without thinking, I locked the door behind me with my wife and our young traveling companion inside.

More of a radical feeling of uneasiness would come over me as I went inside to get us a room for the night. Business was transacted with the young woman who was behind a heavy glass shield with a slot underneath. I assumed the shield was bullet proof.

As she was preparing my receipt and getting the necessary room key, my eyes fell upon another sign that was glaringly posted before me in large letters, which read,

> "For Your Comfort and Safety All Guests Registering Must Be At Least 18 Years of Age And Present Identification."

All kinds of thoughts ran through my mind as to why that sign was there.

Looking out of the corner of my eye, I saw standing there in the hallway not far away a fellow who looked a little "different" with his hair all slicked back. For some unexplained reason I hurriedly put my wallet back into my pocket.

From behind her locked doors and glass shield, and through the narrow slot underneath, I was given the key to our room by the clerk and told how to get there.

Upon getting back into the car, locking the car door, and driving the length of the building and around to the side, I was able to find our room for the night. But every few feet the same sign that had greeted us where I had initially parked, when I went in to register, was posted time and again.

"Please Lock Your Car We Are Not Responsible For Damage to Vehicles Or Loss of Contents."

I hurriedly checked the room to see if indeed we were at the right place. We were. Another posted sign on the back of the room door caught my passing attention, but I postponed reading it until

we got back from eating since we were hungry.

The restaurant was about half a block from the motel. Enhanced by our hunger, the prospects of soon eating delighted us, but foreboding feelings lingered from the motel. We gave our order when coming in and then were seated. We decided to go ahead and pray so that we would be ready to eat when the food was served. Seated at the table, with our heads bowed and holding hands, we prayed aloud, thanking God. Evidently this was a little different sight to some, as different eyes were upon us. From a corner table one young man seemed especially intent, looking at us.

We were soon engrossed in eating the tasty food with relish. I had forgotten about the fellow in the corner who had stared at us. Then we looked up, and there he stood beside us. He pointedly questioned, "Are you a Christian?" My wife, with a happy response, replied, "We sure are!" He said in a strong affirmative tone as he shook my hand, "God bless you!" And with hardly anything else being said, he left as suddenly as he had appeared.

This simple experience in its setting made a profound impression upon me. I felt a oneness with the Christians of the first century as never before. In the midst of a corrupt society and in a world of darkness, they were a glitter of light and really meant something to one another. Our society is increasingly becoming as corrupt and pagan as the old Roman Empire. Being a Christian, and having fellow Christians, should have the most special meaning to us.

As we returned to the motel for the night, I almost found myself looking for the sign of the fish. Perhaps others Christians had been here and left a message for us. However, upon unloading and bringing our things in for the night, I found myself reading the posted sign on the inside of the motel door instead. It read.

"For Your Protection When in Room Engage Deadbolt And Security Latch, Also, Push Button in Door Knob."

Three locks on the door!

To satisfy my wife, we checked the "Security Latch" to see if and how it worked. It looked a little different. Yes, it would serve as a last line of defense when all other locks had failed, but an intruder's hand could reach through.

I had not brought my Bible in from the car, rely-

ing on the prospects of a Gideon Bible being in the motel. But no Gideon Bible was found. Had it been stolen? Had its presence proved offensive to humanists, Moslems, or other alien visitors and thus been removed? I don't know, but there was no Bible there.

Again, however, where we should have found a Bible, we found another printed notice of warnings and caution (each increasingly painting a picture of an ominous, unfriendly, and even hostile environment). It read as follows:

WE CARE ABOUT YOUR SAFETY

Your comfort and well being are our first priority. We urge you to take advantage of these safety and security tips.

- Please be certain that all interior door and window locks work properly.
- Do not accept your room if any lock does not work. Return to the office for another room assignment.
- Use the door viewer or window to identify anyone before opening your door.
- The telephone is for your convenience. Call the office or 9+911 in the event of an emergency.
- If your room has a connecting door, be sure the locks on your side work properly.
- When leaving your car, make sure it is locked.
 Do not leave any valuables in your car or in your room.
- Safeguard your room key at all times. Do not leave it unprotected or give it to anyone other than the people registered with you in this room. Please remember to turn in your key when you leave...

After a night of needed rest, we packed and loaded everything again into the car (in the sight of the omnipresent warning signs). As I pulled in at the office to leave the key, the headlines of the morning newspaper struck my eye, "Senate Approves \$22.2 Billion Crime Bill." I dropped the key into the designated hole where it would be retrieved by the girl behind the glass shield in the next room. And, getting back into the car, we were on our way.

Many sober thoughts went through my mind as I drove along. A few decades ago Christian morality was mainstream America. Today it has been pushed to one side and relegated to a "fringe" position, while humanists and the "liberal" press disparagingly speak of "the fundamental religious

right." In the wake of what has happened, unrestrained and ungodly influences have been unleashed upon our land. A "\$22.2 Billion Crime Bill" will do little good. Only a deep religious awakening will save this country.—J.E.G.

thou, O LORD, shalt endure for ever; and thy remembrance unto all generations" (Psalms 102:12). Then he continues in reference to the things of earth, "They shall perish, but thou shalt endure: yea, all of them shall wax old like a garment; as a vesture shalt thou change them, and they shall be changed: But thou art the same, and thy years shall have no end" (Psalms 102:26,27). James has this to say about God: "Every good gift...cometh down from the Father of lights, with whom is no variableness, neither shadow of turning" (James 1:17).

Upon examining these Scriptures, here is the teaching. The things of earth shall fade away and become old and be no more, but God is from everlasting to everlasting. Not only that, James tells us more. He is the *same* from everlasting to everlasting. James uses the figure of no shadow cast by God turning. In other words, the position of God is the same at all times. He can be depended upon. It is not pantheism, for God is the Father of man and exists as definite and infinite personality.

God is the great power behind everything. As long as time is, He can be depended upon to enforce His natural laws. The law of gravity holds true, and the earth turns and we see the sun "rise" every morning. Man in his scientific ventures is only discovering God's laws in nature, finding out laws set in operation eons ago in creation. The exact function of these natural laws is continuously a marvel.

God is always the same as the loving heavenly

Father. James well said, "Every good and perfect gift is from above, and cometh down from the Father..." The old preacher's version of God making man was that God was lonely and wanted someone to love; thus He made man in His own likeness. Yes, God loves man and is concerned about his wellbeing. One unbelieving religious leader has accused God of being an "old bully" in the Old Testament, and speaks of the "idea" of God in the Old Testament and the New Testament. But the love of God is expressed in the Old Testament. Certainly He had patience with such a stiff-necked people as the Jews under Moses. He spared and showed mercy unto the Gentiles when they turned from idolatry. It is hard for us to conceive how degenerate their idolatry was. God wants everyone to go to heaven, and if they don't it will be in spite of what He has done.

God is unchangeable in His attitude toward sin. God is the embodiment of all that is pure and good. He has a holy distaste and hatred for all that is evil and wicked. He cannot tolerate sin in any form. Sin always brings separation from God, which is death. Sin does not go unpunished, although it may seem that way upon earth at times. The Day of Judgment is coming for all of mankind. God is Holy, and He says, "Be thou Holy for I am Holy." The wages of sin is death (Romans 6:23), and only the pure in heart will see God.

II. CHRIST IS UNCHANGING

The Hebrew writer declares, "Jesus Christ the same yesterday, and today, and for ever" (Hebrews 13:8). This verse shows the unchanging nature of Christ, the only begotten Son of God. Christ took the form of man, being clothed in flesh, as he lived upon this earth and identified with mankind. He lived life just as human beings, yet without sin. He likewise experienced death like every man, but for every man on the cross of Calvary. But unlike man. he was victorious over the grave and was not confined long to the abode of the dead. Christ was the Son of God and the son of man. Now he is back in heaven, living forever to make intercession for the Christians. He came, proving his deity, to save the human family from the awful consequence of sin. That is still his purpose on the earth. Christ is unchanging, and the part about him that is unchangeable is his divine nature and purpose.

Therefore, inasmuch as Christ is unchanging, that means the gospel in changeless. Christ is the gospel (good news), and the good news involves his death, burial and resurrection (I Corinthians 15:1-4). (Thus to "preach Christ" is also to preach bap-

tism since that pertains to his death, burial and resurrection, Acts 8:35,36; Romans 6:3-6).


However, many today say, in essence, "Let's streamline the gospel, and bring it up to date." They claim that we have too much of a "slaughter house" religion (how blasphemous!). A man dying on an old rugged cross for the sins of the world is just too crude for the modern mind, we are told. Let us hear "nice" things. So, it has been replaced by a "social gospel," which has been defined as the gospel of soap, soup, and science; a moral, do good religion without the blood of Christ.

But, dear friend, the gospel of Christ does not need streamlining. It is far ahead of this age, or any age to come, for Jesus said it would be "unto the end of the world." Degenerate and fallen man's needs are still the same; man needs to be transformed and to conform his life to the streamline pattern of Jesus. The world is out of step with that which is right, not the Christian. Perhaps we are using the wrong words when we talk about the "old fashioned gospel" or "old time religion." There is nothing old fashioned about the gospel of Christ. It does not have the mark of time upon it. (Religions of men do, though). It is always new, vital, and the timeless good news. It is just as fresh as if the apostles had penned the message this morning. Men only need to bring their lives up to date with the unchanging gospel of the unchanging Christ.

III. THE WORD IS UNCHANGING

Jesus said, "Heaven and earth shall pass away, but my words shall not pass away" (Matthew 24:35). He further stated, "...the Scriptures cannot be broken." In I Peter 1:25 we read, "But the word of the Lord endureth for ever. And this is the word which by the gospel is preached unto you." Yes, friend, when God speaks, it is for time and eternity. God cannot lie (Titus 1:2). If God is eternal, His Word is eternal. If God is perfect, His Word is perfect. We have no doubts about the Bible being the Word of God. We have the divine promise that the Word of the Lord would be with us forever. God has communicated His will to man, and He preserves the record for all generations.

But men have brought reproach upon God and His Word. Men imply that God's Word is not plain. Usurping the authority of the Bible, they crystalized their religious prejudices into man-made creeds and books to keep their followers in line. These manmade creeds are around to inflict oncoming generations. Preconceived dogmas and immature thinking



linger to stifle further study of the Scriptures. By loved ones dying in such religions, false doctrines have been canonized and rendered dear to the hearts of those embracing them. Thereafter their descendants have a closed mind to any new truth or further investigation of the Bible. Then how sad the situation has become when men seek to justify denominational divisions, saying that it doesn't actually matter what one believes.

Then modern "theologians" have disgraced God's Word in another way. Along came the theory of evolution. "Theologians" made havoc of the Bible as they adapted their thinking to fit this human theory. Many are so obsessed with the idea that they are trying to make the Bible itself fit into an evolutionary pattern. Most decidedly, evolution is a theory, and by its very nature can never be proved. Although a few diehards are still around, it is falling into the background as unproved and irrational. Liberal "theologians" are left holding an empty bag. The Word of God is unchanging.

Remember. The wrath of heaven is pronounced on any who would add or take away from the words of the Bible (Revelation 22:18,19). It is a very, very serious matter. Paul declared, "But though we, or an angel from heaven, preach any other gospel unto you, let him be accursed" (Galatians 1:8). Yes, God's Word is unchanging (and unchangeable), and it

shall be opened on the Day of Judgment. The unlearned and unstable wrest the Scriptures to their own destruction (II Peter 3:16).

Concluding Admonitions

So, in the midst of uncertainty and change let us stay on the Rock. The whole social pattern of civilization has been and is in process of change. People change constantly. They may say one thing today and do another tomorrow. But in the midst of a restless, moving, and even uprooted world, let us ever keep in mind that God is unchanging. He is still in heaven, and His purpose is still the same on earth. And the earth still moves on its axis. While man may think that the gospel needs streamlining, and that he is his own savior, there is no getting around the fact of Christ. He is the unchanging Son of God and the only way under heaven whereby we can be saved (Acts 4:12). Men need to streamline their lives to fit into the plan of Christ, which is way ahead of this age, looking to the age to come. Men may say that they no longer believe the Bible, that it is a book of fables, but real Christians believe it. What kind of deity would it be that could not or would not communicate with His intelligent creation? The Bible is still that grand old Book setting forth God's road map to heaven. If we anchor our souls to its truths, we will find ourselves fitted for eternity with a home that fadeth not away reserved in heaven for us. If we sincerely believe these things, we will find ourselves being obedient unto every good work. The cares of this life will seem as nothing in view of God's eternal plan. These are unchanging things in a changing world.

RELIGIOUS MOVEMENTS AND DENOMINATIONAL MONUMENTS

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THE TROUBLE with religious movements is that they usually become denominational monuments. When the freshness and vitality of the truth that gave them their initial impetuous and thrust begins to wane, this takes place. Monuments are erected to the movements. This is likewise true of the so-called "Restoration Movement." Several monuments stand today as a testament to this. Actually, monuments are grave markers. And on these particular markers may be found engraved in stone names like "Disciples of Christ," "Christian Church," and even "Church of Christ." Too many times these are denominational monuments standing as memorials to the decease and demise of undenominational Christianity. However, in some local cases the monuments have not been fully

erected yet. There is still some healthy movement and evidence of life. There are people who still would be identified simply with the church of the New Testament and that alone. This is to be highly commended. May self-defeating monuments be removed and disregarded.—*J.E.G.*



How to Accept Christ

Ф.

How that the apostles told sinners to accept Christ in the first century is found in Acts 2:38; the "altar call" and "praying through" are the product of the revival movements of the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries and were unknown to any Christians before that time (Paul didn't even "pray through," Acts 9:11; 22:16; 9:18; Romans 6:1-6; Read Acts 8:35-39).

NOTES ON I TIMOTHY 2:9,10

"In like manner also, that women adorn themselves in modest apparel, with shamefacedness and sobriety; not with broided hair, or gold, or pearls, or costly array; But (which becometh women professing godliness) with good works."

- Christianity has to do with all things that pertain to life and godliness, and in every way we are to glorify God—II Peter 1:3 (II Timothy 3:16,17; Colossians 3:18,23; I Corinthians 10:31; 6:19,20).
- A Bible principle is that in the mouth of two or three witnesses every word is to be established; truth is truth if only spoken by one witness, but it is made more emphatic in this matter of modest apparel because there is more than one witness—II Cor. 13:1 (I Timothy 2:9,10; I Peter 3:1-6).
- In our day the modern church has become pretty much integrated with the world (which is materialistic, sensuous, and vainglorious), and consequently these truths have been greatly neglected.
- Inasmuch as these Scriptures have been largely neglected, we should be patient one with another as we study them to see what they really mean (and they do mean something, or they wouldn't be in the Bible).
- The purpose of this inquiry is not controversy, or to be picky, but understanding and godly edification in humility and love.
 - Keep these Scriptures in mind: I John 2:15-17; Romans 12:1,2; II Corinthians 6:14-18.

ώσαύτως (in like manner)...

- With the same care that the men are to take in carrying out their responsibilities as leaders in the public assembly (I Timothy 2:1-8) the women are to adorn themselves appropriately in the public assembly, not detracting from the glory that is the Lord's (I Timothy 2:9,10; James 2:1-4).
- This modesty of dress is not limited to the public assembly, but it is for life in general (I Peter 3:1-6); it characterizes "women professing godliness."

καὶ τὰς γυναϊκας [γυνή] (also the women)...

- Although this matter of modest apparel applies also to men, it seems to be more of a problem with women than men as the apostles always mention women when writing about it.
- The person all wrapped up in style, and the person all wrapped up in sports, many times has a problem even considering, let alone accepting, what the Bible has to say about modesty.

$\vec{\epsilon} V \kappa \alpha \tau \alpha \sigma \tau o \lambda \tilde{\eta}$ (in apparel)...

- This word translated "apparel" (kata-stolé) literally means down (kata) to send (stolé); it is just the opposite of sending up, to make short (shorts).
 - "Long robe"—Young's Analytical Concordance
- "Unto Adam also and to his wife did the LORD God make coats of skins, and clothed them" (Genesis 3:21; also notice 3:7-10).
- Meaning of this Hebrew word translated "coats": "a tunic, long coat"—Young's Analytical Concordance; "tunic, a long shirt-like garment..."—Theological Words of the Old Testament; "A tunic...generally with sleeves, to the knees, but seldom to the ankles, Gen. 3:21"—Wilson's O.T. Word Studies.

- The purpose of clothing is to cover, to conceal; not to reveal.
- Exodus 20:26; Revelation 3:17; 16:15.
- Matthew 5:27-30; Job 31:1; II Samuel 11:2-4.

κοσμιφ [κόσμιος] (modest)...

- The words translated "modest" and "adorn" have the same root origin and are cognate with the word translated "world" (kosmos) elsewhere in the N.T.; the word kosmos, for world, literally signifies that which has been arranged.
 - The word translated "modest" here means "decorous, well-ordered"; moderate, orderly, seemly.
 - Webster's New Collegiate Dictionary gives the following definitions of modest:
 - (1) Placing a moderate or low estimate on one's own merits; not forward or boastful.
 - (2) Evincing, or arising from lack of boldness, presumption, display, etc.; moderate, unpretentious; as a modest request or home.
 - (3) Observing the proprieties of sex; chaste; decent.
 - All of these meanings seem to be inherent in the word "modest" in I Timothy.

μετὰ αἰδοῦς [αἰδως] (with shamefacedness)...

- What is the meaning of the word translated "shamefacedness"? Thayer's lexicon has this to say about this Greek word *aidos* as compared with a synonym: "Aidos is prominently objective in its reference, having regard for others...It is often said that aidos precedes and prevents the shameful act...Aidos would always restrain a good man from an unworthy act."
- It is a sense of virtuous shame which has a special regard and respect in reference to others. The other kind of shame is a shame of guilt; but the good kind of shame is that which would prevent the occurrence of guilt.
- In view of this, it is shocking to realize that the actual styles of dress in the woman's world to-day are much of the time based on sex appeal (trying to look sexually alluring and enticing). Also, this has come down into the children's world (NEWSWEEK, April 26, 1993, "Showing Too Much, Too Soon," "What ever happened to jumpers and overalls?" page 59; July 26, 1993, "Sex, Kids and the Slut Look," page 8).
- Mary Quant, the originator-designer of the miniskirt of the 1960's, said quite frankly that the purpose of the miniskirt was intended "to bring men to bed." That is, the miniskirt was to say to every man, "look at these legs. What do they make you think of?"
- The whole theory behind lipstick and the use of makeup is wrong from the Christian view-point. Quotations from cosmetic advertisements:
 - "We help American women stay sexy."
 - "Intriguing eyeshadows...Luscious lipsticks."
 - "Creates color with all-out sizzle, all-out shimmer...today's new mood of excitement for you."
- "For lips just born to be kissed, a sensuous flavored lip glosser with an all-out shine... Use on naked lips for a blush of color or over lipstick...so sexy, juicy, shiny. It's almost sinful."
- JEREMIAH 4:30, "And when thou are spoiled, what wilt thou do? Though thou clothest thyself with crimson, though thou deckest thee with ornaments of gold, though thou rentest THY FACE WITH PAINTING, in vain shalt thou make thyself fair; thy lovers will despise thee, they will seek thy life."
- EZEKIEL 23:40,41, "And furthermore, that ye have sent for men to come from far, unto whom a messenger was sent: and, lo, they came: for whom thou didst wash thyself, PAINTEDST THY EYES, and deckedst thyself with ornaments. And satest upon a stately bed, and a table prepared before it, whereupon thou hast set mine incense and mine oil."
- PROVERBS 6:25, "Lust not after her beauty in thine heart; neither let her take thee with her EYELIDS."

- "Paint used by the Hebrew women, a powder producing a black colour, commonly prepared from antimony, or from lead ore and zinc, which they mixed with water, and spread upon the eyelids in such a way that the white of the eyes might appear more white by being surrounded by a black margin."—Wilson's O.T. Word Studies
 - Why paint (makeup) was used:
 - (1) To aggrandize their appearance so as to imposingly impress themselves on others (vainglory).
 - (2) To make them look more sexually enticing, alluring, and seductive (sensuous).
 - Consequently seriously consider Matthew 5:27-30; 18:6 (I Corinthians 8:12).
- As a matter of illustration and interest, in the centuries following the apostles early church leaders quoted I Timothy 2 and I Peter 3 in opposing immodesty of dress and cosmetics of every kind; reading their writings, it seems women used every imaginable cosmetic, very much like today (such writers were Tertullian, 140-230 A.D.; Clement of Alexander, 150-200 A.D.; Cyprian, 200-258 A.D.).

καὶ σωφροσύνης [σωφροσύνη] (and sobriety)...

- This word translated "sobriety" is a compound word, sos (sound) + phrén (mind).
- "For whether we be beside ourselves [crazy], it is to God: or whether we be sober [sane], it is for your cause" (II Corinthians 5:13).
- "But he said, I am not mad [crazy], most noble Festus; but speak forth the words of truth and soberness [sanity]" (Acts 26:25).
- Also, a variation of the same word is translated in Mark 5:15, "And they come to Jesus, and see him that was possessed with the devil, and had the legion, sitting, and clothed, and in his right mind: and they were afraid."
- Let us be in our right mind. The Lord wants us to have some sense about us (be sane, sober); to dress immodestly, whether from the viewpoint of indecent exposure (trying to look sexy) or simply being vainglorious, doesn't make much sense for the real Christian.

κοσμείν [κοσμέω] (to adorn)...

• As already pointed out, this comes from the same root as the word translated "modest," and "world" (*kosmos*) and basically signifies to arrange, and that which is arranged. The back side of this command is that we will arrange, or adorn, ourselves (and it will be in a neat and decent way); its very meaning prohibits appearing sloppy.

έαυτάs (themselves)...

μη ἐν πλέγμασιν [πλέγμα] (not in broided)...

- "NOT" is prohibitive. Moderating steps are in the right direction. Prohibitive action is conclusive. This is the kind of "moderation" that Paul is talking about here. "Women professing godliness" are NOT to be adorned with "broided hair, or gold, or pearls, or costly array [expensive clothing]."
- Juvenal ("Satire," vi.): "The attendants will vote on the dressing of the hair as if a question of reputation or of life were at stake, so great is the trouble she takes in quest of beauty; with so many tiers does she load, with so many continuous stories does she build upon on high her head. She is tall as Andromache in front, behind she is shorter."
 - Gold was interwoven in the broided hair.
 - Christian women should avoid extreme hairdos.

ή χρυσῷ [χρῦσος] (or gold)...

- The Old Testament was a materialistic system, an antitype of the New Testament, which is spiritual. The Old Testament promised a land flowing with milk and honey; the Old Testament featured a physical, political kingdom; physical blessings were evidence of God's favor; in this material system, the display of gold would seem to indicate evidence of God's blessing and favor. The New Testament is spiritual, and its emphasis is just the opposite of the Old Testament.
 - The appearance of a visitor in their assembly wearing gold was a novelty (James 2:2,4).
- An honorable use of gold is in purposes of utility, as signet ring and chain with symbol of authority (Genesis 41:42; Luke 15:22).

ή μαργαρίται**s** [μαργαρίτη**s**] (or pearls)...

• Christians rather are concerned about the pearl of great price (Matthew 13:45,46), which involves the kingdom of heaven, not the physical.

ή ίματισμῷ [ίματισμος] πολυτελεῖ

[πολυτελήs] (or garments expensive)...

• I Peter 3:3,4; James 5:1-3.

ἀλλ [ἀλλά] ὁ πρέπει (but the becomes)...
γυναιξὶν (women)...

ἐπαγγελλομέναι**s** (professing)...

θεοσέβειαν (godliness, the fear of God)...

δί [διά] ἔργων (with works)...

 $\alpha \gamma \alpha \theta \widetilde{\omega} v \text{ (good)}.$

- Look into the mirror of God's Word to see if you are spiritually adorned (James 1:21-25).
- In baptism we put on Christ (Galatians 3:27); we are clothed in his righteousness. The Holy Spirit produces his likeness in our lives as we live for him (Galatians 5:22,23).
- HYMN: "Let the beauty of Jesus be seen in me; All his wonderful passion and purity; May his Spirit divine all my being refine; Let the beauty of Jesus be seen in me...From the dawn of the morning to close of day; In example, in deeds, and in all you say; Lay your gifts at his feet; ever strive to keep sweet; Let the beauty of Jesus be seen in me."
- Carefully consider I Peter 3:4; Luke 10:38-42; Acts 9:36-41; Philippians 4:3; I Timothy 5:10; II Timothy 1:5; Titus 2:3-5; etc.
- "Women professing godliness," physically and spiritually, should adorn themselves in a very different way from the ungodly women of this world; how you dress is a reflection of your self-image, just who you think you are, or what message you wish to convey to the world. Does the world see in you a vain, materialistic person? a painted sex object? or, a "woman professing godliness" (whose physical adornment appropriately corresponds with her spiritual adornment)?
 - Remember I John 2:15-17; Romans 12:1,2; II Corinthians 6:14-7:1
 - Don't let the world brainwash or intimidate you.

THE DAYTONA INTERNATIONAL SPEEDWAY AND THOSE 31 DEGREE TILTED TURNS

THE FACILITIES of the DAYTONA INTER-NATIONAL SPEEDWAY, appropriately dubbed the "World Center of Racing," are very interesting. We are told the whole area takes in 450 acres. The massive grandstands, overlooked by a 15-story tower, will seat 100,000 people. NASCAR conducts two races here each year, while 8 are run altogether. There is a 2.5 mile trioval and a 3.56 mile road course. On the race track, turns like 2 and 4 have an awesome 31 degree high bank. Racing cars have to be going at least 75 miles an hour just to keep from turning over. When the turn is completed, the bank tilts back to 9 degrees, which one would think would be less intimidating. Not so; this is a very dangerous part of the track as it drops off so fast. There is not as much air pressure underneath the car. The driver must be on his toes to avoid disaster. He must indeed be a careful driver. (And as a footnote thought, there are between 42-44 laps before pit stops).

Being a Christian, this information immediately drew our attention to another race. No, we are not talking about the materialistic rat race that we witness every day. Rather, thoughts come to mind of the race every Christian must run in living the Christian life. Paul uses the illustration of racing more than once, and says, "Let us run with patience the race that is set before us" (Hebrews 12:1). This race is not run in competition with others; rather, all who finish the course are winners (II Timothy 4:6-8). The race must be successfully completed.

Carrying this illustration of a race a step further, and finding a parallel in the DAYTONA INTER-NATIONAL SPEEDWAY, we find there will be many tilted turns. Like the 31 degree turns that require a continued speed of 75 miles an hour or more, lest the car turn over, we must press on in the Christian life. If we slow down or stop when the going gets rough, or is less than smooth, it will be disastrous. To stop is to flop. We will turn over, fall. and crash in our Christian life. Then when we are coming out of such rugged experiences, we must keep a level head to keep from veering off the track (even as the race car driver enters the less tilted 9 degree bank). The pit stops are necessary too, if we are to run the rugged course of this life as a Christian. We need the Lord's church, the Word, and one another to win the race.

Let us press on (Philippians 3:13,14; I Corinthians 9:24-27). Victory is for all who actually finish the Christian race (Revelation 2:10).—J.E.G.

The Seven Beatitudes in the Book of Revelation

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THE BOOK of Revelation contains many references to the number seven. The number seven is connected with completeness, unity, fullness, totality, perfection or bringing to an end. A careful study of the seven beatitudes of Revelation reveals this.

- 1. "Blessed is he that readeth, and they that hear..." (Revelation 1:3).
- 2. "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord..." (Revelation 14:13).
- 3. "Blessed is he that watcheth..." (Revelation 16:15).
- 4. "Blessed are they which are called unto the marriage supper of the Lamb..." (Revelation 19:9).
- 5. "Blessed and holy is he that hath part in the first resurrection..." (Revelation 20:6).
- 6. "Blessed is he that keepeth the sayings of the prophecy of this book" (Revelation 22:7).
- 7. "Blessed are they that do his commandments..." (Revelation 22:14).

The word blessed is the same word that is used in the beatitudes in Matthew 5 and Luke 6. It is translated from the Greek word *markarios* and promises happiness and the highest good to the characters who are thus blessed.—Selected

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
