(Matthew 28:18-20)

The Preamble:

"And JESUS came and spake unto them, saying, All power [authority] is given unto me in heaven and and in earth..."

THE TERM "CHURCH" AS USED IN THE NEW TESTAMENT SCRIPTURES

DMITTEDLY the term "church" was not the best translation of the Greek word *ekklesia* (as initially "church" had reference to a building). But the word is solidly a part of our language now. So we go from here in making practical use of it in the light of the meaning of the word it represents and what the context implies in its New Testament usage.

Of course the meaning of *ekklesia* as we break the word down into its stems, *ek* (out) + *klesia* (*kaleo*, to call), has reference to those called out, an assembly. In the New Testament it is almost exclusively used in the context of Christianity. However, Stephen speaks of the "church in the wilderness" (Acts 7:38) in talking about Israel, and the word is used in describing the multitude that came together in the theater at Ephesus, being translated "assembly" (KJV, Acts 19:32,39,41).

In connection with Christianity we find the word *ekklesia* (church) used in at least three different ways. It is used in (1) a *universal sense*, in (2) a *local sense*, and in (3) a *local assembled sense*. Let us look into this.

- (1) Jesus declared, "Upon this rock I will build my church" (Matthew 16:18); here it is easy to think of this in terms of the universal church. Then when the Ethiopian on his way back to Ethiopia was baptized in Acts 8, he certainly was not a part of a local church yet, but he was in the universal church (I Corinthians 12:13; Colossians 1:18). Contrasting the Old Testament system and the New, and speaking of the New Testament, the writer of Hebrews states in Hebrews 12:22,23, "But ye are come...to the general assembly and church of the firstborn [Greek plural, firstborn ones], which are written in heaven..."
- (2) Next, the term church is used to speak of a community of believers in one location, bound together as a single unit; the local church. This is quite evident in the New Testament, whether reading the book of Acts or the epistles that follow. Paul addressed the epistle of I Corinthians to the "church of God which is at Corinth" (I Corinthians 1:2).
- (3) Finally, the term church is used of the public assembly of Christians in one locality. Paul speaks of the church coming together at Corinth (I Corinthians 5:4; 11:17,18,34) and coming together in one place (I Corinthians 11:20; 14:23). It is in this context that this coming together is called the "church,"



when Paul said, "Let your women keep silence in the *churches*" (14:34), meaning they were not to teach or usurp authority over the man (I Timothy 2:11-14). "Church" refers to the assembly, not church in a general sense, otherwise the prohibition would be universal (which is unthinkable). In this same 14th chapter of I Corinthians, Paul, in regulating the assembly so everything would be "done decently and in order," asserted, "For God is not the author of confusion, but of peace, as in all *churches* [assemblies] of the saints" (14:33). Likewise the term church seems to refer to the assembly in Colossians 4:16.

The universal church is not organized, nor is it to be organized. We are to "love the brotherhood" (I Peter 2:17), not organize it. The extent of the organization of the church is the local, autonomous church. That is all that there is to it. Local bodies of believers were organized under the oversight of men called elders. Paul and Barnabas "ordained them elders in every church" (Acts 14:23), i.e. in every local church, as they visited the new body of believers in each city. In talking to "the elders of the church" at Ephesus, a local church in Asia, Paul admonished them, "Take heed therefore unto yourselves, and to all the flock, over the which the Holy Ghost [Spirit] hath made you overseers, to feed the church of God, which he hath purchased with his own blood" (Acts 20:17,28). Peter admonished the elders in I Peter 5:2 to "feed the flock of God which is among you, taking the oversight..." This is referring to a local church. The jurisdiction of the elders is not beyond the local body of Christians. The simplicity of the local unit is likewise seen in Philippians 1:1. Paul and Timothy were preachers who had been sent out from local churches (Acts 13:1-3; etc.), and with others had been instrumental in starting this church. The only ecclesiastical organization started beyond the local church was other local churches.

However, apostasy came early to the original church in their getting away from the simplicity of the local church, setting up district and national organizations, and finally a universal one with the pope at the head of it. Men have never learned their lesson, and the unending cycle continues with each generation and with each denomination in varying degrees. To get away from the local church is to head back toward Rome and denominationalism. It is to presumptuously assume authority beyond what has been given. It is to usurp the responsibil-

ity and prerogative of the local church. We need to beware. Even in the name of co-operation men set up denominational organizations and agencies that are antagonistic to God's plan for the local, independent, and autonomous church. Then unindoctrinated people always take things a step further and solidify a denominational structure. It is always just a matter of time. Even in having religious conventions and gatherings beyond the local church men are presumptuous and speak with audacity when they would appendage and name their gatherings with district, state, or national designations. The universal church is not organized, and no one has the authority to put a name for anything beyond the local assembly in an organizational context. The implication is that they have the authority to do this and are in some sense representing Christians nationally or regionally. It is intimidating to those who do not choose to be part of such gatherings, implying they are out of step. The unindoctrinated think so. It is denominational and represents a denominational mindset (further promoting division).

We humbly admonish you to consider these things. Let us have the New Testament concept and understanding of the term "church" and how it is properly used. Then let us accordingly comply with it if we claim to be the New Testament church.

ARE WE UNDER LAW?

HE FOLLOWING material was recently presented by the editor in an inter-computer, e-mail exchange of thought. Here we amplify and enlarge upon it for purposes of clarity and explanation. There are two extremes that may be taken on this subject. (1) One is a sterile "letter of the law" legalism that limits us to the mechanics of what is written in God's commands and misses out on the very spirit behind the words (and thus the great principles and implications accompanying the teaching). (2) The other is to unscripturally emphasize grace to the point of there being no law, and thus no personal responsibility and accountability. In either case, in a sense, God's commands are circumvented, nullified, or watered down as far as practice is concerned. The question before us is: Are we under law?

1. Obviously we are not under the Law of Moses (John 1:17; Ephesians 2:15; Colossians 2:14; Galatians 5:4). (Continued on Next Page)

- 2. But this does not negate law as such (Romans 3:31).
- 3. We are under the law to Christ (I Corinthians 9:21; Hebrews 7:12; 9:15-17).
- 4. It is called the perfect law of liberty (James 1:25).
 - 5. It is the law of the Spirit (Romans 8:2-7).
- 6. It is the law of Love (Galatians 5:14; 6:2; Romans 13:8-10).

Paul asks in Romans 6:1 and 2, "What shall we say then? Shall we continue in SIN, that grace may abound? God forbid. How shall we that are dead to sin, live any longer therein?"

May I ask? What is SIN? I John 3:4 reads, "Whosoever committeth sin transgresseth also the law: for SIN IS THE TRANSGRESSION OF THE LAW." These words are a representation of the Greek word *anomia* (from *anomos*, A + NOMOS, literally "no law"). Do a word study of this in the New Testament.

So, Paul is saying, "Shall we continue in SIN [no law, lawlessness], that grace may abound?" His answer is quite apparent. "GOD FORBID!" *Anomia*, this word for lawless, is commonly translated "iniquity" throughout the New Testament. Even in Romans 6, it is found in verse 19. The falling away from the original church was characterized as the "mystery of INIQUITY [anomia, lawlessness]", which was already at work (II Thessalonians 2:7). And at the summit of all of this would be the "man of SIN [one who transgresses the LAW, I John 3:4]."

Let us say that we are not under law in the sense of the Law of Moses. The Law per se cannot be a system of justification, for "all have sinned II John 3:4] and come short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23). We are under the law to Christ (the law of Christ). That law is LOVE. Love is the fulfilling of the law (Galatians 5:14) for the essence of the law is accomplished through love (Romans 13:8-10). That being the case, we don't have to have the law like a club hanging over our heads to be coerced into doing right. We are not under law in the sense that we are not under the penalty of the law. Now in the context of love and grace we render obedience. Paul said, "There is therefore now no condemnation to them which are in Christ Jesus, who walk not after the flesh, but after the Spirit. For the law of The Spirit of life in Christ Jesus hath made me free from the law of sin and death" (Romans 8:1,2). Paul further said that Christ "gave himself for us, that he might redeem us from all iniquity [anomia, lawlessness],

and purify unto himself a peculiar people, zealous of good works" (Titus 2:14). It makes us wonder about some people's concept of grace when they start emphasizing it, then let up on their devotion and consecration to the Lord. Notice also Titus 2:11 and 12.

Jesus said, "If you love me, keep my commandments" (John 14:15). John echoed, "For this is the love of God, that we keep his commandments: and his commandments are not grievous [burdensome]" (I John 5:3). Love is the fulfilling of the law in that the law is fulfilled in love and through love.

Notice the Sermon on the Mount; especially Matthew 5:21 and following. The kind of righteousness Christ wants includes the letter of the law, but is not limited by it; it goes further. It involves the heart. There is nothing righteous about disregarding the letter of Christ's teaching, and calling those who want to carefully follow it LEGALISTS. But the letter of the commandment is not enough. We must from our hearts practice the very spirit of what Christ taught, and with what he taught there are principles and ramifications tied in with each command that cannot be ignored. God's law said, "Thou shalt not kill" (Cf. Matthew 5:21-26). The New Testament teaches that we can be guilty of murder in the heart by hating our brother (I John 3:15), and anger and name calling are put in the same category. God's law said. "Thou shalt not commit adultery" (Cf. Matthew 5:27-32). The Pharisees, the old "letter of the law" legalists, probably felt self-righteously pleased with themselves. They were not guilty of breaking this commandment. However, Jesus taught that there was more involved than just the letter of the law, "But I say unto you, That whosoever looketh on a woman to lust after her hath committed adultery with her already in his heart." The law as such would not prohibit watching the garbage on television or the movies, but the teaching of Christ goes beyond the letter of the law, and would prohibit anything that would ensnare us in this way. Immodesty of dress, and many other things, would fall under this command. Yes, the spirit behind the command, with the ramifications and principles, cannot be ignored.

Men, throwing the term around in a derogatory way, may call Christians who wish to follow the Scriptures closely LEGALISTS, but we don't want to be ILLEGAL, do we? To be without law is to be like a leaf falling from a tree, unattached. No, Christ is not teaching the abandonment of law. To be without law, and to have no respect for law, really, in the final analysis, is to be an outlaw.

Actually many who call others LEGALISTS, in the way they use the term, are more legal than A Series Involving the Bible and Prophecy...

those upon whom they heap the appellation. They hold to the letter, and won't be bounded by thought beyond the mechanics of what is said. Then some are only legal with the prohibitive commands, and the positive ones they throw to the wind. Let us recognize the spirit and principles that go with all of God's teaching.

What kind of obedience do we render to the Lord? Is it only a bare bone's, "letter of the law," legalistic obedience like that of the scribes and Pharisees in the Sermon on the Mount? Or, do we go beyond the rattling of the dry bones of a skeleton to add muscle and sinew? With muscle and sinew on the bones, it would be like recognizing the principles and implications that accompany the command. We are posed for movement and action. However, there must be more than bones, muscle, and sinew. There must be the heart and vital organs within. The very spirit of the command must be obeyed from the heart. With

all the components of the body "fitly" joined together, there now is life, and we are ready for concerted movement, obedience, and action.

Let us look to, yea, we point you to, the person and personality of Christ to obey the LAW OF CHRIST, which is the LAW OF LOVE. It is a different kind of obedience from that of the LAW OF MOSES, but nonetheless obedience, and of the highest order.

Hearts that are right with Christ are quick to obey (and will not gainsay).

Hospitality, A Forgotten Practice

WITH ALL the turmoil, bitterness, danger and decay swirling about in the world, it is no wonder that families like to hide themselves away in the privacy of their dens and patios. We note an increasing pattern of isolationism behind the walls of our houses. We seem to be saying, "This is my own little lair. I want none to enter. There is only room for me here. If you want to see me, I'll come *out* to you."

Forgotten is one of the oft mentioned Christian attributes [and practices] of the New Testament. This is the Christian grace of hospitality.

In Paul's list of Christian responsibilities (and immediately following upon the mention of sharing with those who are in need) is the admonition to be "given to hospitality" (Romans 12:13). Hebrews 13:2 admonishes us to "be not forgetful to entertain strangers: for thereby some have entertained angels unawares." Peter told Christians to "use hospitality one to another without grudging" (I Peter 4:9).

We need to open our hearts and our homes to the stranger and to our brethren. We need to share our tables and our comforts with others. This is Christianity in action. This is love demonstrated. Many a soul began his journey to the Lord from the friendship originated at the dinner table. Hospitality will open many doors to greater service in the Lord. Let us resurrect this forgotten grace.—Selected

become. I am nobody's friend. Once I tarnish your reputation, it is never quite the same. My name is gossip.—Selected



The "Old Rugged Cross" Versus

The New Polished Cross

ID YOU KNOW that the words of the song, "The Old Rugged Cross," when first published were unpopular? The author asked a friend why this was. He said, "You've never gone through any great time of suffering. That would make a difference." The time came when this man did go through a time of great trials. It was after this that he rewrote the words as they now appear in "The Old Rugged Cross." It has become one of the most loved and well known of all gospel songs.

FIRST BLEED, THEN BLESS

This is how it took place in the life of Jesus. "The Spirit of Christ...did signify, when it testified beforehand the sufferings of Christ, and the glories that should follow them" (I Peter 1:11). This is the order: first you suffer, then you can be a blessing to others. The apostle Paul experienced the same thing. "I have been crucified with Christ, and Christ now lives in me" was how he described himself (Galatians 2:20).

The original "Old Rugged Cross" of the New Testament had NO agreements with the world. To the proud flesh of man, the cross meant the END of the journey. The apostle Paul could say the world had been KILLED (crucified) as far as he was concerned (Galatians 6:14). Likewise he was DEAD to the world. It was the cross of Christ that made the difference in his life.

NOW A NEW POLISHED CROSS

The new "polished" cross is a pal and a buddy with the ways of the world. It lets the fleshly nature of life be UNDISTURBED. Then it "enjoys" short SERMONETTES all about birds, bats, bees, bugs, and butterflies. The accent is on entertainment. This is why LOUD music, fun, and feeds draw a much larger crowd than the preaching of the CROSS and the Word that it upholds. This modern "new" cross has an entirely new approach to evangelism. The new modern preacher tries to "motivate" his hearers with psychology. He tries to key into public interest by showing that his "new polished cross" makes no unpleasant demands on the sinful nature of man. Whatever the sinful world is

clamoring after at the moment is cleverly shown to be the thing the gospel offers, only the new way is nicer. The new "cross" does not kill the old man of sin (Romans 6:6). Rather it says, "Come and assert yourself for Jesus. Come enjoy the fun and THRILLS of religion." The NEW message is slanted in the direction of whatever is popular in order to make it acceptable to the crowds.

THE OLD RUGGED CROSS

The cross of the New Testament was a symbol of death. It stood for the abrupt end of human sufficiency. The man who took up his cross and started down a Roman road had already said good-bye to his friends. He had made NO provisions for coming back. His life was not going to be redirected—it was going to be ENDED! There was to be NEW LIFE in its place. We who preach the gospel must not think of ourselves as "public relations" men sent to make Christ acceptable to worldly business men or carnally minded religionists.

CHRIST AROSE!

Wicked men could nail Jesus to a cross, but they could not keep him in the grave. "This Jesus did God raise up, whereof we all are witness" (Acts 2:32). Baptism is into Christ's DEATH (Romans 6:3). Even as Christ was buried and came forth victorious from the grave, so we too are buried with him in baptism to rise with him and walk in NEWNESS OF LIFE (Romans 6:4; Colossians 2:12; etc.). But this glorious "resurrection" will not take place unless we have accepted Christ as our LORD and repented of all sin PRIOR to our baptism. Salvation is not by baptism only any more than it is by faith only!

What does all of this mean to the guilty sinner who wants to find life in Christ Jesus? Simply this: he must believe in Christ as his Savior and Lord. He must forsake ALL sin, making NO COMPROMISE with the world, the flesh, or the devil. He must be baptized into Christ's death so that he may receive salvation and the gift of the Holy Spirit.

WALK BY THE SPIRIT

It is not right for a Christian to sit down on the edge of the baptistery and DRY UP! Baptism is the beginning of the new walk, NOT the end. "But this I say, Walk in the Spirit, and ye shall not fulfill the lust of the flesh...And they that are of Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with the passions and the lusts thereof. If we live by the Spirit, by the Spirit let us also walk" (Galatians 5:16,24,25).

After Peter had written the very powerful and helpful list of II Peter 1:3-9, he was inspired to write, "Wherefore, brethren, give the more diligence

to make your calling and election sure; for if ye do these things ye shall never stumble: for thus shall be richly supplied unto you the entrance into the eternal kingdom of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ" (II Peter 1:10,11).

I don't know about you, but I'm going to pin my faith on the Christ of the "Old Rugged Cross." He is alive forevermore, and he lives to make intercession for those who come to him the Bible way (Hebrews 4:15,16 and Hebrews 7:25). You can have your "New Polished Cross," for anyone who understands both the Bible and human nature doesn't want it! It can neither save nor give strength to the pilgrim who is on his way to the PROMISED LAND.
