23 And [Peter and John] being let go, they went to their own company, and reported all that the chief priests and elders had said unto them.

24 And when they heard that, they lifted up their voice to God with one accord, and said, Lord, thou art God, which hast made heaven, and earth, and the sea, and all that in them is:

25 Who by the mouth of thy servant David hast said, Why did the heathen rage, and the people imagine vain things?

26 The kings of the earth stood up, and the rulers were gathered together against the Lord, and against his Christ.

27 For of a truth against thy holy child [servant] Jesus, whom thou hast anointed, both Herod, and Pontius Pilate, with the Gentiles, and the people of Israel, were gathered together,

28 For to do whatsoever thy hand and thy counsel determined before to be done.

29 And now, Lord, behold their threatenings: and grant unto thy servants, that with all boldness they may speak thy word,

30 By stretching forth thine hand to heal; and that signs and wonders may be done by the name of thy holy child [servant] Jesus.

31 And when they had prayed, the place was shaken where they were assembled together; and they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and they spake the word of God with boldness.

32 And the multitude of them that believed were of one heart and of one soul: neither said any of them that ought of the things which he possessed was his own; but they had all things common.

33 And with great power gave the apostles witness of the resurrection of the Lord Jesus: and great grace was upon them all.—Acts 4:23-33, KJV

has had its being, and thrived in an atmosphere of prayer. In the upper room, leading up to Pentecost, the apostles continued "in *prayer and supplication*, with the women, and Mary the mother of Jesus, and with his brethren" (Acts 1:13,

14). Those baptized on the day of Pentecost "continued stedfastly in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship and in breaking of bread, and in *prayers*" (Acts 2:42). "Peter and John went up together into the temple at the *hour of prayer*" (Acts 3:1). Now in the 4th chapter of Acts, having been arrested and threatened by the same high court that condemned Jesus to death, they return unto "their own" and immediately engage God in prayer (as we read in the Scripture printed at the beginning of this article). The mention of prayer is found throughout the book of Acts. In his epistles, Paul admonished, "Pray without ceasing" (1 Thessalonians 5:17; Romans 12:12; Colossians 4:2).

In view of all of this, it would be well for us to take a good look at this prayer prayed by the early church. There are good lessons to learn here. They were confronting hostility and intolerance from the Jewish authorities that would go from threatening to beatings; then from beatings to martyrdom. What they should do next, and how, was approached with prayer. It has been said that until a Christian has prayed, the most important thing that a Christian can do is to pray. In their prayer we can see their concept of God and what they were really praying about. From their example we can better direct our prayers to God.

Those Who Prayed

After being threatened, having been released by the Jewish authorities, Peter and John return to "their own company." No doubt this refers to the other apostles, with possibly others in attendance. They report their experience with the high court of the Jews and their being commanded not to preach or teach anymore in the name of Jesus. When they heard this, all with "one accord" went to God in prayer. We are reminded of the upper room gathering before Pentecost (Acts 1:13, 14).

PUTTING THE KINGDOM OF GOD FIRST AND CHURCH ATTENDANCE

E WISH to consider the following two Scriptural statements in conjunction with one another. The Lord Jesus Christ declared in the Sermon on the Mount, "But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you" (Matthew 6:33). The writer of the book of Hebrews admonished, "Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is; but exhorting one another: and so much the more, as ye see the day approaching" (Hebrews 10:25).

The word "church" means assembly, and the church is the kingdom of God. Therefore, a Christian's faithfulness in church attendance is a good indicator as to whether he or she is really seeking first the kingdom of God. One's priorities and values are made evident here. If Christ is first in our lives, we will meet on the first day of every week to remember the Lord's death in the Lord's Supper (Luke 22:19,20; Acts 20:7). If we are indeed disciples of Christ, disciples meaning learners, we will meet with other disciples (learners) of Christ to learn all that we can about Christ and his teachings (about God's Word, the Bible). Remember Acts 2:42. Recall that "the disciples [learners] were called Christians first in Antioch" (Acts 11:26) in connection with being assembled for that very purpose, learning. We are not to forsake the assembly. It is the church of Christ. To forsake the assembly is to forsake Christ. And if we find ourselves in a situation locally where there is no faithful New Testament church, we therewith are that church and should begin assembling as such.

Let us further scrutinize ourselves in reference to the assembly and its teaching program (and it indeed should involve real teaching, and not just some little "devotionals" and meaningless sweet nothings). Recognition of God and religion has been pushed out of our public schools by the secular humanists. Consequently, young people, as they study and prepare themselves for life day after day, get the impression that God and religion are unimportant and have nothing to do with life. It is sad to say, but many professing Christians subconsciously have absorbed this godless (and ungodly) way of thinking. They would not think of their children being absent from public school, nor tolerate it, but when it comes to Bible study at church, any truancy is allowable (whether it be staying home to study for public school, sports, scouts, going to the beach, or whatever comes up). Studying the Bible and Christianity are irrelevant to real life

(that is what they in essence are saying, in spite of what the Lord said in Matthew 6:33). God is not first, if at all, in their lives. At other times visitors may come. The assembly is missed. Who comes first? The assembly is missed again (especially on Sunday evenings and the midweek). "Members" are seen absorbed in their watching of television or have gone to "take in" some worldly entertainment (or to be with their worldly friends). What has taken first place in their lives? In those "perilous times" of the last days that the apostle Paul said were coming, he states that people would be "lovers of pleasures more than lovers of God" (2 Timothy 3:1,4). And he is talking about religious people, too, for he said that they would be "having a form of godliness, but denying the power thereof" (3:5).

We could go on with this little dissertation and even enlarge upon our thoughts derived from Matthew 6:33 and Hebrews 10:25. But church attendance is only the edge of the iceberg. Faithfulness in this respect would lead us to believe that a person is likewise conscientiously trying to be faithful in other areas of his life. Absence in church attendance indicates there are problems in a person's life greater than missing church. Considering everything, is God really first in our lives?

ROCK 'N' ROLL REVISITED

(This article appeared in THE SWORD AND STAFF back in the mid 1980's, but we believe it is still relevant today.)



Most older adults know little about rock 'n' roll music except that it is loud and unpleasant to their ears. To them the volume of the instruments is so loud and intense that the lyrics cannot be understood. It is dismissed as undesirable nonsense without even trying to consider the message of the music.

But is this just so much innocent noise listened to by so many young people?

I had always thought rock music was not exactly right, had discouraged young people from listening to it, but had not really looked into the matter with depth. So, when I read a book recently, *Why Knock Rock*, I was provoked to do what they said.

They suggested that parents "get smart." If you don't know what you are talking about, young people will call your bluff. Check out the record department of the local variety store, then a rock record shop. You will be shocked (as a Christian) at what you see. Looking at the album covers will make you feel as if you are flipping through the pages of *Playboy* magazine. You will see sex, violence, drugs, hedonism, along with Satanism, being peddled. Drug paraphernalia (at the rock record shops) may be for sale along with the records.

Obtain and browse through magazines that give the latest on rock music and rock groups; magazines that are prepared for, aimed at and read by young people. Such magazines are *Rolling Stone*, *Hit Parader*, *Circus*, *Musician*, and *Creem*. Here you will see what is going on with the rock groups and be able to read the lyrics of songs you could not understand.

I did this, and I became educated really fast! You get it straight from the "horse's mouth" here. No second hand "stuff." I was very uncomfortable with a lot of the "gutter" talk about sex by the rock stars, but I was determined to become informed.

There were two words which kept surfacing in these magazines in talking about the rock 'n' roll world. They were *hedonistic* and *androgynous*.

"Hedonistic"

In the November, 1984, issue of *Hit Parader* (page 12), a mother wrote this publication: "I'm getting sick and tired of reading about the lewd and lascivious lifestyles that every heavy metal performer seems to lead. I'm the mother of a 14-year old son, and I'm thinking about preventing him from reading about rock and roll until he learns that not every rock star is only concerned with drugs, alcohol and premarital sex. Would you please write something that would explain this to my son?" The straight-forward answer to the letter (by the magazine) is very revealing: "Unfortunately, rock and roll is perhaps the most hedonistic of all entertainment forms. Bands like Motely Crue, Quiet Riot and Van Halen truly do lead lives that would make Julius Caesar green with envy. Thankfully, from what I've been able to observe, the use of illegal drugs among rock performers has dropped

sharply in recent years—but their love for booze and sex remains as strong as ever."

In case "hedonistic" is not one of your words, it comes from a Greek word that means pleasure. It is used in English to describe a lifestyle; the self-indulgent pursuit of pleasure, any kind, as a way of life. It is fleshly and animalistic and has no hangups in reference to morals. Anything goes. If it brings sensual gratification, do it.

Unrestrained illicit sex, liquor and drugs are marks of the trade in the rock world. Gene Simmons of KISS is quoted in *Entertainment Week* (*Winston-Salem Journal*, January 5, 1985) as saying, "Rock 'n' roll is all about promiscuity, you know." He continues, "Rock 'n' roll literally means sex. The term comes from a Leadbelly song saying, let me rock you all night long.' He wasn't talking about reading Nietzsche to her."

Nikki Sixx of Motley Crue in the October 31, 1984, issue of *Circus* (page 66) ties in their hedonistic lifestyle with their success, "The kids who come to see us want to identify with that. They see us living a reality that's just fantasy for them." Then Dee Snider of Twisted Sisters says his music is like psychotherapy. Appealing to rebellious youth, he said, "If you can't afford to go to a doctor to find out why you're _____ up, then listen to metal. Dance around and you wanna go home and kill your parents!" (page 111 of same issue of *Circus*).

"Androgynous"

Also in the November, 1984, issue of *Hit Parader* magazine (page 29) upcoming rock groups are singled out for consideration. One group is said already to be "an international press favorite due to their hard rock sound and androgynous image," and they were expected to make a go of it. The word "androgynous" keeps reoccurring as the common denominator of successful rock groups, and is considered as one of the necessary ingredients to bring this about. What does it mean?

Actually it is weird! The term "androgynous" is a compound word formed from two Greek words, andros plus guné. The meaning of andros is man, and guné means woman. So, the word "androgynous" means male and female in one person. Hermaphrodite would describe it, or the practice of functioning either heterosexually or homosexually (being bisexual).

This explains a lot of things. It explains the image the rock groups are trying to project, as well as

many times living it out in their lives. Look at the very appearance of the rock singers. In one sense they look crudely masculine, but at the same time they may have long effeminate hair, be wearing makeup, ear rings, and other jewelry commonly associated with women. Some of their clothing would be more appropriate on the opposite sex (if appropriate is the word we should use).

The names they choose by which to identify their groups projects the androgynous image. What about the AC/DC group? This is said to mean either heterosexual or homosexual (bisexual). There is a group called the "Iron Maiden" (and it is composed of men). Another one is called "Twisted Sisters" (men!). This is seen in the KISS group, Alice Cooper and Boy George.

Even if they don't pick such names, they try to project a mystic to keep you guessing about their sexual identity. Such an aurora surrounds Michael Jackson. The Prince in his "Purple Rain" says, "I'm not a woman, I'm not a man, I am something that you've never had..." (*Entertainment Week*, *Winston-Salem Journal*, November 3, 1984).

Recently as I was leafing through a magazine while waiting in a doctor's office, I saw this writeup about this rock group. It had a picture of them in concert. When they came out to perform, two of the macho-looking guys passionately kiss one another in the mouth. In another magazine, two fellows are seen pawing one another.

It is not a lovely picture, is it? In fact, it is sick. And to think that somewhere along the way music has done a flip-flop. When a lot of us were younger, pop music referred to the easy listening kind. Not any longer. Now pop means rock. It is the music commonly listened to by the younger generation, and is it any wonder that there are so many mixed up people today? Looking to these rock stars, and identifying with them (even with their androgynous image), it is no wonder that so many are confused about their personal, sexual identity.

I am convinced that the field of rock 'n' roll music has largely become the devil's playground. Diabolical influences seem to be behind these performers as they preach their hedonistic philosophies of life to our young people as entertainment. Rock music broke down the middle class' abhorrence to drugs, which theretofore had been kept in the ghettoes of the larger cities. So much of the music is anti-Christian, anti-marriage, and anti-family. One recent song asked, "WHAT'S LOVE GOT TO DO WITH IT?" Neither do we need any more Pink Floyds with their nihilistic fatalism.

The book that I mentioned earlier in this article gives four questions to ask about rock music (or any other kind of music) in determining whether it is right or wrong.

- 1. What are the lyrics saying?
- 2. What kind of lifestyles have the musicians chosen?
- 3. What do the graphics on the album covers indicate?
- 4. What are the goals of the songs and the performers?

The Story Continued Many Years Later

That is the end of the article this writer put together back in the 80's, but it is not the end of the story. The story goes on. We can't help but think of the words attributed to men of wisdom from ancient times until now. It is said that Plato said, "Watch music. It's a very important art form. Rulers should be careful about what songs are allowed to be sung." To Plato, music was "the movement of sound to reach the soul for the education of its virtue" (Plato's Republic). Andrew Fletcher, a Scottish politician of years leading up to more recent history, is said to have asserted, "I knew a very wise man that believed that if a man were permitted to make all the ballads, he need not care who should make the laws of a nation." Thus, he was supposed to have said, "I don't care who writes a country's laws; I just want to know who writes a country's songs."

With these words in mind, consider rock 'n' roll "music." It is our firm conviction that our society is experiencing fall-out from a whole generation that has been "brought up" on this kind of "music."

Times were more modest and restrained when rock 'n' roll was first introduced into our society. Therefore years ago when the "godfather" of rock music, Elvis Presley, first appeared on the Ed Sullivan variety show, they seemed to not know what to do with him. The television cameras would not show the lower part of his body as it "gyrated" indecently with his music. This was tame as to what would follow later in the name of this kind of "music." In fact, go back and review the first section of this column as to the meaning of the expression, "rock 'n' roll" (the reprint article). The expression has reference to the sex act itself, as the DJ's dubbed this music.

Then as rock 'n' roll gained momentum and massively impacted our society, *Columbia Encyclopedia* says, "All aspects of the music—its heavy

beat, loudness, self-absorbed lyrics, and raving delivery—indicated a teenage defiance of adult values and authority." Rebellion, the hedonistic and the sex element always seemed to be there. Reread the first part of this article that we have reprinted. Besides the unsavory element of promiscuous sex, generally speaking, the androgynous image projected by the rock performers always hits us in the face. There was a crude and eerie mystic about them that left one questioning. What about these fellows? Are they male or female? They appeared crudely masculine, but at the same time, with their long hair and makeup, feminine. Who would have ever thought that their mixed-up and dual sexual identity would spill over into a whole society of human beings? It is our conviction that their music, their songs, their mixed-up sexual identity (and behavior) overwhelmingly impacted a whole generation of young and formative lives. Remember our quotation from Plato and the other one. "I don't care who writes a country's laws; I just want to know who writes a country's songs." People are so mixed up today, that some would even try to impose same-sex marriage on us. (And politicians could care less, except to get votes). We point our finger at rock 'n' roll music as a strong and contributing factor to the mixed-up modern world in which we find ourselves living today. This is our indictment.

"Hold fast the form of sound words..."



"...Sound speech, that cannot be condemned" (2 Timothy 1:13; Titus 2:8).

AVING reference to Christianity, the apostle Paul stated, "Which things also we speak, not in the words which man's wisdom teacheth, but which the Holy Ghost [Spirit] teacheth..." (1 Corinthians 2:13). Christianity is not geared to the high sounding and artifical language of philosophy, or even theology, but simply to the simplicity and purity of the Scriptures. When we talk about Bible things, and Bible doctrines, we should use the terminology of the inspired Word of God. And didn't Jesus say, "For out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaketh" (Matthew 12:34)? Anyway

that you look at it, words are indicative of our hearts. If our hearts are right, our words will be right. Our commitment to the teachings of the Scriptures likewise will be reflected in our use of the language of the Scriptures. We call Bible things by Bible names (and use Bible terms in a Scriptural way).

Ekklesia, "Church"

Ekklesia, represented in our language by the word "church," is the primary term that God has chosen to designate His New Testament people. Ekklesia is a compounded word, ek (out) + kaleo(to call), meaning assembly. It is found over 100 times in the New Testament Scriptures, one time referring to the children of Israel in the Old Testament (Acts 7:38) and three times to a non-Christian public assembly (Acts 19:32,39,41 = heretranslated "assembly," KJV). All other references, beginning with Christ's declaration in Matthew 16:18, have reference to Christian believers. The apostle Paul starts many of his letters, addressing a church. In the book of Revelation we read of the seven churches in Asia. It never refers to a building, but to a people. Scripturally speaking, it is never appropriate to call the building a church. And as it refers to a people, it is used in three different ways in the New Testament, (1) the church universally in the world (Matthew 16:18; Colossians 1:18), (2) the church in one given city or locality (1 Corinthians 1:2; 1 Thessalonians 1:1), and (3) the church in an assembled sense (1 Corinthians 14:34; Colossians 4:16). Although other figures are used collectively referring to Christians, such as kingdom and body of Christ, church is the most common and standardized way of talking about New Testament believers (especially after the church came into being).

Therefore, let us "nail down" some conclusions in this consideration.

- (1) It is highly inappropriate to call the building, or meeting place, a church. Scripturally speaking, only the people of God are a church. Christ did not purchase a building with his own blood (Acts 20:28).
- (2) In the New Testament, "church" is not used to designate one denominational body as distinguished from another denominational body. Christ said, "I will build *my* church" (singular). Paul said there is "one body" (one church) (Ephesians 4:4). Division and doctrinal error are not of God (1 Co-

rinthians 3:4; Romans 16:17,18; 2 John, verse 9). Religiously to use the term in such a manner is to besmirch its original significance.

(3) It is strange that some religious bodies meeting in assembly do not even call themselves a church anymore. Some designate themselves as "Ministries" and other novel expressions. What are they trying to say, anyway? Christ said, "I will build my church." Ministry is what the church should be doing, not what the church is. Did Christ "purchase" ministries with his own blood?

Prayers are most effective when there is "one accord" among those involved in prayer. Paul wrote to Timothy, "I will therefore that men pray everywhere, lifting up holy hands, without wrath and doubting [disputing]" (1 Timothy 2:8). Peter admonished that husband and wife dwell together harmoniously "that your prayers be not hindered" (1 Peter 3:7). Then, the Lord Jesus, coming at this from much the same angle, said, "Again I say unto you, That if two of you shall agree on earth as touching anything that they shall ask, it shall be done for them of my Father which is in heaven" (Matthew 18:19).

And this is how they prayed in this prayer that was prayed by the early church. Their agreement was such that it was like they had "lifted up their voice to God with one accord" (Acts 4:24). And their prayer was heard and answered.

Their Concept of God

Next, let us notice how they addressed God in their prayer. This will tell us much about their concept of the Being to whom they are praying. Their concept of God reflects what they actually believed about God and, consequently, the inherent potential and possibility of Him answering their prayer. A limited concept of God would put limits on what they would expect from God.

Two great truths stand out in their concept of God. God is almighty. God is omniscient.

They *first* address God in their prayer, by saying, "Lord, thou art God, which hast made heaven, and earth, and the sea, and all that in them is..." The word translated "Lord" is not the one most commonly used in the language of the New Testament, but is *despota*, found only four times in the entire New Testament referring to Deity. It means one who is absolute, sovereign. It has come over into English in the word "despot," and, as such, it

has acquired a negative connotation. But, as used in the New Testament in connection with God, it simply refers to an almighty, absolute and sovereign Being. He is the mighty Creator who made the heavens and the earth, having brought everything into being, as acknowledged here. He made it all and is over all. He is the almighty Elohim.



The **second** great truth that impacts us as we examine their prayer is that God is omniscient; He is all-knowing. What had happened in reference to Christ was no accident. It was all according to the Divine plan and foreknowledge of the One who in one panoramic glance from eternity could see the end from the beginning. Yes, when the rulers set themselves against the LORD and his Anointed, it was accordingly, as they prayed, "For to do whatsoever thy hand and thy counsel determined before to be done." It was of this Christ, as Peter later would pen in his first epistle, "Who verily was foreordained before the foundation of the world, but was manifest in these last times for you" (1 Peter 1:20).

A consideration of God's omniscience is mindboggling and it simply overwhelms us. We believe that He knows everything that is, everything that was, everything that will be, and that He even knows what might have been. He knows who the saved would be from eternity. Jesus said that even "the very hairs of your head are all numbered" (Matthew 10:30). Interestingly, the Lord also said, "Woe unto thee, Chorazin!... Bethsaida!... Capernaum... for if the mighty works, which have been done in thee, had been done in Sodom, it would have remained until this day" (Matthew 11:20-24). Yes, God even knows what might have been.

So, to approach the (1) Almighty God of eternity, (2) who has total knowledge of anything and everything, is to be assured that our petitions will be heard, and if they are in accordance with His will, there is no reason that they cannot and will not be answered. God unquestionably has the power and knowledge about our situation to bring it about. That was the basis on which the early church prayed in Acts chapter 4.

That for Which They Prayed

Most of their prayer now having been prayed in magnifying the greatness of God, and the basis upon which they are assured to have their prayer answered, they now get around to the asking part of their petition. "And now, Lord, behold their threatenings: and grant unto thy servants, that with all boldness they may speak thy word, by stretching forth thine hand to heal; and that signs and wonders may be done by the name of thy holy child [servant] Jesus." The report of Peter and John accented what they were up against. While with them, Jesus had attempted to get them ready for what was ahead. He told them, "And when they bring you unto the synagogues, and unto magistrates, and powers, take ye no thought how or what thing ye shall answer, or what ye shall say: For the Holy Ghost [Spirit] shall teach you in the same hour what ye ought to say" (Luke 12:11,12). Also, the apostles had already been endowed with power to do miraculous things. It spite of all this, they still felt it necessary to go to God in prayer. In a sense, they pray about that which is already theirs. However, realizing potential human weakness, an extra element enters into this prayer for the apostles, "that with all boldness they may speak thy word." Years later, the apostle Paul in prison at Rome makes the same prayer request involving boldness (Ephesians 6:19,20; Colossians 4:3,4).

And another interesting episode takes place later in the 12th chapter of Acts having to do with the apostle Peter. Herod had the apostle James put to death, and seeing it pleased the Jews, he had Peter apprehended with the intention of him meeting the same fate after the Passover. We read, "Peter therefore was kept in prison: but prayer was made without ceasing of the church unto God for him" (Acts 12:5). Although chained between soldiers in maximum security, the angel of the

Lord with little disruption intervenes in the darkness of the night. Peter is set free, and makes his way to the house of Mary, the mother of John Mark, "where many were gathered together praying" (12:12). He knocks on the door, and the young girl who went to the door leaves Peter standing on the outside as she runs to tell everyone. Their decided response to what she said was, "Thou art mad" (12:15). This has always been a puzzle to this writer. For what were they praying? Evidently, the prayer was not for Peter's safety, or release. Otherwise they would not have reacted this way. Perhaps we are safe in saying they were praying that Peter would be bold; that he would not deny the Lord; that he would be "faithful unto death" (Revelation 2:10), if he must die.

In all of these cases, and in the prayer before us in Acts 4, obviously selfish concerns about personal suffering had not entered the picture. Their overriding concern is getting the message of Christ across, and getting it across with boldness. That for which they prayed takes place. Their prayer is resoundingly answered. We read, "And when they had prayed, the place was shaken where they were assembled together; and they were all filled with the Holy Ghost [Spirit], and they spake the word of God with boldness...And with great power gave the apostles witness of the resurrection of the Lord Jesus: and great grace was upon them all" (Acts 4:31,33). Later, when beaten by the Jewish authorities and released, their utter lack of regard for self stands out. It's Christ that counts. We read, "And they departed from the presence of the council, rejoicing that they were counted worthy to suffer shame for his name" (Acts 5:41).

Closing Comments

In closing, ponder this prayer again. There is much for us to learn here. Our prayers need to be with one accord. We need to really believe that God is Almighty and all-knowing, which has everything to do with our prayers being answered. Our prayers need to be unselfish as we seek the things of God first, even overriding concerns about personal well-being. Let us be bold, and unashamed, in our stand for truth and righteousness.

The Cross Back Then

THE CROSS today has become a piece of jewelry, a beautiful decoration in a church, a symbol of faith. It is difficult for us to pass back through the centuries of tradition to see crucifixion as a form of capital punishment so horrible that polite people would not so much as mention it. If the idea of crucifixion was abhorrent to decent people in the ancient world, imagine the difficulty of trying to convince them that a god—indeed, THE God—had willingly endured such a punishment.—*Thomas Schmidt*

The amount of time in punishment is based on the degree of sinfulness the person has lived outside of Christ. This leads to the idea of degrees of both rewards and punishment. I would like very much to have your thoughts on the question of whether punishment is everlasting or there comes a time when the body and soul no longer exist in hell. Thank you for your consideration of this subject." (E-mail).

Answer:

There are many things that we do not fully understand and of which we would like to know more. We tread lightly in trying to answer your question. The apostle Peter said, in reference to matters like you brought up, the "unlearned and unstable" wrest the Scriptures to their own destruction (2 Peter 3:16). Therefore, removing the element of absolute dogma and having our words clothed in humility, here are some thoughts to consider. But we don't want to be "wiser" than what is written.

The only Scripture that I know that some might possibly think would give comfort to such a view (and views), as you mentioned above, is Luke 12:47 and 48. But it doesn't include all of the elements of the article of which you spoke (that is more like wishful thinking). Let us look into Luke 12, verses 47 and 48.

47 And that servant, which knew his lord's will, and prepared not himself, neither did according to his will, shall be beaten with many stripes.

48 But he that knew not, and did commit things worthy of stripes, shall be beaten with few stripes. For unto whomsoever much is given, of him shall be much required: and to whom men have committed much, of him they will ask the more. KJV

In our efforts to fully understand this Scripture, we need to look back and frame all of this in the full context, beginning with verse 35 and going through verse 48. Read this carefully. All of this is in the language of a parable. Also, although the principle of responsibility is universally true, the application here seems to be to servants (those who are servants of Christ, not unbelievers—verse 46). The emphasis is not on the duration of punishment, but upon the severity of judgment. Whipping or stripes are not part of the New Testament or the eternal way of looking at things, but calls to mind the carnal Old Testament system (Deuteronomy 25:2, 3; 2 Corinthians 11:24). Nor will the sword be used as in verse 46 (Luke 12:46). This was adapting the circumstances and language (parabolic) to things experienced in their "today's world." The time element is not involved as in the plain language of Matthew 25:46 where the same Greek word, aionios, is used to speak of "everlasting punishment" and "life eternal." (i.e., "And these shall go away into everlasting punishment: but the righteous into life eternal.") (Also, consider 2 Thessalonians 1:7-9 and Revelation 20:10-15 [Matthew 25:41]). The thought of severity in judgment is seen in the words, "For unto whomsoever much is given, of him shall be much required: and to whom men have committed much, of him they will ask the more" (Luke 12:48). The greater the commitment (and privileges), the greater the responsibility and accountability. We see parallel thoughts in other Scriptures. Notice. This can be seen in simply being Christians in contrast with the Law of Moses. Hebrews 2:1-3 reads, "Therefore we [Christians] ought to give the more earnest heed to the things we have heard, lest at any time we should let them slip. For if the word spoken by angels [the O.T. Law, Acts 7:53] was stedfast, and every transgression and disobedience received a just recompense of reward: How shall we escape, if we neglect so great salvation...?" Likewise, we see this principle in the words of James (James 3:1), "My brethren, be not many masters [teachers], knowing that we shall receive the greater condemnation [more severe judgment]." The emphasis in Luke 12:47 and 48 is not duration of punishment, but severity of judgment (and thus punishment). There is so much that we do not fully understand, but this seems to be the Lord's point, as we live our lives in anticipation of his second coming (and being accountable). God is perfect and righteous, and His judgment will be the same way.



Love Everyone Freely

DON'T BE afraid to love everyone freely, not showing partiality (acting as if there would not be enough love to go around). Real love is of such a nature that the more we love, the greater our capacity to love becomes. God's boundless love is so great that it is as if He loved only you, but the same love is for everyone.



YOU have to live right to die right.

It is good to know the truth of God, but it is even better to know the God of truth.

A person is not a Christian unless he has become a Christian (Acts 2:36-41; Galatians 3:27), regardless how religious he may be.

If God is not first in your life, He is not in your life (Matthew 6:33; Deuteronomy 6:5; 1 Cor. 6:19,20).

A person may talk about baptism "for the remission of sins" all he wants to, but if he hasn't repented of his sins and trusted the Lord, remission of sins does not take place when he is baptized.

Take CHRIST out of CHRIST-ian and you have I-A-N left—I Am Nothing.

Don't let the devil use the thief on the cross to steal your salvation, thinking you can be saved without being baptized when his situation doesn't even apply to you (his situation is entirely different from ours today—Luke 23:43; Hebrews 9:16,17; Romans 6:2-5; Acts 2:37-40).

If you leave out part of God's plan of salvation, you forfeit your part in God's plan of salvation.

The fact that there is such a thing as hypocrites is a compliment to the superiority of Christianity, as something highly to be desired (but in the case of the hypocrites, only pretended).

People who "live it up" may have a hard time "living it down" (if they live that long).

You may travel near and far, but if you are not on the road that goes to heaven, you will never get there (John 14:6; Matthew 7:13, 14).

Heaven is a prepared place for a prepared people; hell is a prepared place for an unprepared people.

If everybody is "doing it," that is no reason for us to "do it," but it is a good reason for us to question whether we should be "doing it" (Matthew 7:13, 14; 1 John 5:19).

It is a strange phenomenon, but some who are the most zealous about their religion have the least to be zealous about.

If something is "cut and dried," it is usually dead; there is no life (and with some who think they have all the answers, and are not open to further study, the situation is the same).

The somber admonition of God is to "preach the Word" (2 Timothy 4:2), not give book reports.

It has been said that preachers "mellow" as they get older, but "mellow" in some cases is the last stage before becoming "rotten."

Much of modern music is not only noise pollution, it is moral pollution.

When family ties, blood ties and friendship ties are stronger than ties in the Lord and the blood of Christ, it can tie a lot of knots in the Lord's work.

A society controlled by humanism, with no higher authority, becomes a headless monster as far as direction and purpose are concerned.

People try to find fault with the Bible and discredit its teachings because its teachings find fault with their sinful lives (and they don't want to face up to it).

People don't like a bossy boss; so, if you are "too" assertive, beware.

The "official priests" in our modern, godless and secular society are the so-called scientists (the modern Gnostics, the "knowing ones"), before whom all are expected to unquestionably bow and do obeisance to the supposed infallible intellect of man (while at the same time ignoring or denying the Supreme Intellect that is behind everything).

The trials of life will either make you bitter or better; it's up to you.

Disrupting the Process

DR. JOSEPH FORT NEWTON once told of an amateur naturalist who watched an emperor moth slowly making its laborious way from the chrysalis stage. Day after day it struggled and squirmed to emerge from its cocoon. Thinking to help the butterfly, he took his penknife and cut a large opening for it. The struggle was ended and the moth emerged. But its wings were imperfect, the body was weak. Being unable to make its way in its environment, it fluttered feebly until it died. He had robbed it of the privilege to grow strong and beautiful through struggle.

By being too kind and soft-hearted, the naturalist unwittingly harmed that which he wanted to help. Parents and teachers can do the same to their children or students if they fail to recognize that work and effort are a part of God's plan for achieving excellence.—Denver Sizemore

Acts 1:3; 24. James and Jude; 25. Revelation 1:8,11; 21:6; 22:13.

Reasons for Being a Christian

THERE IS no evidence that Agrippa ever became a Christian (Acts 26:28). There is even a question about his sincerity when he made the remark about "little persuasion." Many others since that time have questioned the value of becoming a Christian. They want to know what reason(s) there might be to take such a step. Let me share three GOOD reasons for one's being a Christian.

1. One's past.

"...for all have sinned, and fall short of the glory of God" (Rom. 3:23). "For the wages of sin is death; but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Rom. 6:23).

2. One's present.

We have only the promise of this present time. What we would accomplish for now and eternity must be accomplished today.

"Come now, ye that say, Today or tomorrow we will go into this city, and spend a year there. . .ye know not what shall be on the morrow. . .ye are vapor that appeareth for a little time, and then vanisheth away" (James 4:13,14).

One's life should be enriched with joy now.

"...and he went on his way rejoicing" (Acts 8:39). "...and rejoiced greatly, with all his house, having believed in God" (Acts 16:34).

Both the eunuch's and the jailor's rejoicing came about because they were Christians. Such rejoicing comes because of the peace that accompanies Christianity.

"And the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall guard your hearts and your thoughts in Christ Jesus" (Phil. 4:7).


It comes to us by promise from God, who cannot lie.

"...whereby He hath granted unto us His precious and exceeding great promises" (II Pet. 1:4).

3. One's future.

"And I saw the dead, the great and the small, standing before the throne...And if any was not found written in the book of life, he was cast into the lake of fire" (Rev. 20:12-15). "...what shall be the end of them that obey not the gospel of God" (I Peter 4:17). (See also Mark 8:36, 37; Matt. 25:31-46; Rev. 21.)
